COMMISSIONER'S REPORT

Singapore remains one of the safest cities in the world. In 2024, Singapore ranked second in the World Justice Project Rule of Law Index for Order and Security and in the Gallup Global Law and Order Index. Gallup also reported that 94% of Singapore residents felt safe walking alone at night. Singapore has consistently maintained these high scores since 2015. Beyond international accolades, the Singapore public continues to hold the Singapore Police Force (SPF) in high regard and maintains high trust in the SPF – 97% of respondents to the SPF's 2024 Public Perception Survey indicated trust in the SPF. This high level of public trust enables us to better serve and protect the public. The international and local recognition is a testament to the SPF's hard work and dedication, strengthened by the steadfast support from our volunteers, stakeholders and community partners.

CRIME AND ROAD TRAFFIC SITUATION

In 2024, the total number of reported physical crime cases remained stable at 19,969, compared to 19,966 in 2023.

Scams and cybercrime cases continued to be a key concern, having increased by 10.8% to 55,810 cases in 2024, with the total amount lost to scams increasing by 70.6% to over \$1.1 billion in 2024. Of the total reported scam cases, 82.4% involved self-effected transfers. Scammers continued to reach out to victims through messaging platforms, social media, phone calls and online shopping platforms. The SPF remains committed to fighting scams and cybercrime and will continue to work with government agencies, private entities and community partners to engage and educate the public in building community vigilance and resilience towards scams.

Regarding the road traffic situation, both the number of traffic accidents and those resulting in fatalities have increased in 2024. There is a need to take a tougher enforcement stance on our roads. The Police will double down on our efforts to educate and encourage the public to practise good road safety habits and play their part in making Singapore's roads safer for everyone.

FIGHTING SCAMS AND CYBERCRIME

In 2024, the Anti-Scam Command (ASCom) recovered more than S\$182 million in scam losses. ASCom also expanded its network of partnerships and intensified its outreach efforts. ASCom established the cross-border anti-scam collaboration platform, FRONTIER+, with anti-scam outfits from ten jurisdictions to strengthen international real-time information-sharing and asset recovery efforts.



Establishing alliances with like-minded partners remains crucial in our fight against scams and cybercrime. To this end, we co-organised the inaugural Global Anti-Scam Summit (Asia) 2024, in partnership with the Global Anti-Scam Alliance and leading private industry stakeholders such as Mastercard, Amazon and Google. Over 900 participants from the public and private sectors convened to strengthen global cooperation, exchange best practices, and advance collective strategies against scams. The SPF's Cybercrime Command also successfully hosted the ASEAN Cybercrime Conference 2024, bringing together law enforcement officers from the ASEAN Member States, Timor-Leste, United States and Australia.

Strengthening the public's ability to prevent and detect scams and cybercrime also remains a priority. Together with the National Crime Prevention Council and Open Government Products, we launched the ScamShield Suite on 27 September. The launch marked the expansion of the ScamShield brand from an app to a suite of anti-scam resources, enabling members of the public to better protect themselves against scams. We also launched the Cyber Guardians on Watch and Cyber Crime Prevention Ambassadors programmes. These flagship volunteer programmes against cybercrime enabled volunteers to serve as our additional eyes, ears and voices in cyberspace.

ENFORCEMENT AGAINST MONEY LAUNDERING

The SPF also targets money laundering, especially for complex cases, and focuses on asset recovery to strip criminals of illicit gains and deter financial crime. In Singapore's largest money laundering case, ten foreigners were convicted of offences including money laundering and forgery and were sentenced to between 13 to 17 months' imprisonment. S\$944 million of their assets were forfeited to the State, and an additional S\$1.85 billion of assets seized from their accomplices were recovered to the State.

ENHANCING CRIME-FIGHTING AND OPERATIONAL CAPABILITIES

As crime becomes more complex, we must continually enhance our crime-fighting capabilities. With the launch of the National Service Cybercrime Operator (NSCO) vocation in August, we now tap into the expertise of full-time Police National Service officers to support operational roles within the SPF to detect and disrupt scams and cybercrime. We also leveraged technologies such as Artificial Intelligence (AI) and Robotic Process Automation (RPA) to enhance our capabilities. In 2024, we disrupted more than 57,700 mobile lines, 40,500 WhatsApp lines, 33,600 online monikers and advertisements, and 44,900 websites that were scam-related. RPA was utilised in six joint operations between the Anti-Scam Centre and the partnering banks (such as OCBC, UOB and DBS), sending more than 77,100 SMSes and alerting more than 55,600 victims. This proactive victim-centric approach averted over S\$420 million in potential losses.

At the Marina Bay Singapore Countdown, we deployed drones and applied video analytics to analyse the crowd size based on the drones' real-time footage, enabling us to assess the situation and respond appropriately throughout the event. In April, the Next-Generation Fast Response Cars were commissioned. These vehicles, custom-engineered to meet our unique operational requirements, ensure that we remain at the forefront of public safety and security. Patrol robots were deployed to augment patrol at Changi Airport and will be deployed at multiple operational terrains progressively. CODY, our Community Engagement Robot, employs its AI capabilities to interact with members of the public and propagates crime prevention advisories based on the detected age profile.

PARTNERING THE COMMUNITY

Community policing remains another enduring strategy of the SPF. 2024 saw the expansion of our partnerships and the celebration of successes with our community partners. The Point-to-Point Transport Industry Safety and Security Watch Group (iSSWG) was formed on 19 February with the National Private Hire Vehicles Association and National Taxi Association, allowing us to engage taxi and private hire drivers who play a crucial role in supporting the Police on the road. The new iSSWG members will receive training in road safety issues and be invited to regular engagement and information-sharing platforms. We presented 45 deserving stakeholders with Outstanding Community Partnership Awards in recognition of their strong collaboration and commitment towards preventing and deterring crime. Additionally, 173 exceptional volunteers received the Outstanding SPF Volunteer Award for their invaluable contributions to the SPF and our community.

Several milestone community partnership events were held in 2024. The inaugural SPF Volunteer Networking Session, held on 8 March, brought together volunteers from various SPF volunteer schemes, volunteer scheme managers and SPF officers. On 2 August, around 140 guests, comprising Victim Care Officers, SPF officers, and both internal and external partners such as the Home Team Volunteer Network, Singapore University of Social Sciences, KK Women's and Children's Hospital and more, celebrated the Victim Care Cadre Programme's 10th anniversary. Through the inaugural Global Community Policing Conference, which attracted about 200 participants from 31 countries to exchange leading practices in community policing and stakeholder engagement, the SPF contributed to international thought leadership in community policing.

STRENGTHENING THE SPF CORE

Beyond technology and partnerships, the SPF recognises the key role that our officers play in ensuring we deliver on our mission. We continually celebrate our milestones while building an environment that enables our people to thrive. On 13 April, we honoured the contributions of our female officers, marking over 75 years of Women in Policing. This significant milestone in our history celebrated our female officers at all levels of the Force, from leading Land Divisions and Specialist Units to frontline patrol, tactical operations and investigative duties.

At the organisational level, we were honoured to receive the Silver Ribbon Award under the Employers category at the Silver Ribbon Mental Health Awards Ceremony 2024. This prestigious award acknowledges our commitment to promoting mental health and fostering a mentally friendly and healthy work environment.

A FORCE FOR THE NATION

Singapore remains one of the safest cities in the world, a testament to the SPF's united and steadfast commitment to our mission and vision.

To conclude, I would like to express my deepest appreciation to our officers and their families, our stakeholders, partners, volunteers and the community for the strong support in our mission. Together, we will make Singapore the safest place in the world.

STRIVING FOR OPERATIONAL EXCELLENCE

As we reflect on 2024, the Singapore Police Force (SPF) stands proud of its accomplishments in the face of an increasingly complex global security environment. Throughout the year, we continued to achieve operational excellence, bolstered our operational readiness and further advanced our operational capabilities.

OPERATIONAL EXCELLENCE

SECURING MAJOR EVENTS AMIDST A HEIGHTENED THREAT ENVIRONMENT



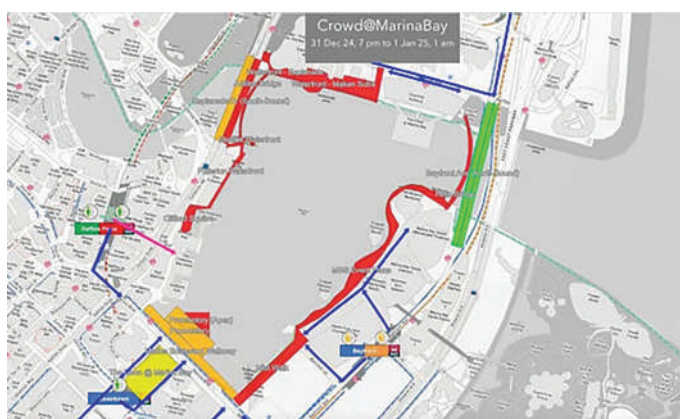

In light of geopolitical conflicts worldwide, the SPF implemented heightened security measures throughout various periods in 2024. Our officers answered the call of duty to ensure Singapore's safety and security.

Amidst the challenging security landscape, 2024 saw the deployment of officers for high-profile events involving international leaders such as the Working Visit by Ukraine President Volodymyr Zelenskyy in June 2024 and the State Visit by Pope Francis in September 2024 (the first papal visit to Singapore since 1986). Together with annual fixtures like the Shangri-La Dialogue and the Singapore Grand Prix, our officers maintained a high operational tempo throughout the year.

For major events such as the National Day Parade and New Year's Eve celebrations, the SPF published crowd information portals that provided information on real-time crowd levels and closure areas to members of the public. The portals also displayed crowd levels at MRT stations, enabling the public to better plan their journeys. These initiatives reduced overcrowding and allowed the SPF to better manage public safety.

FIGHTING CRIME

Curbing Cases of Housebreaking

In August 2024, the SPF responded swiftly to a spate of house-breaking cases in private residential estates. Officers stepped up patrols in affected areas and engaged residents. They also deployed more Police cameras as well as drones retrofitted with blinkers at susceptible locations within the estates. These helped to enhance deterrence and detect suspicious activities for prompt Police response.

Consolidating Anti-scam Channels and Initiatives

Scams continue to be a key concern. In September 2024, the [ScamShield Suite](#) was jointly launched by the SPF, Open Government Products and the National Crime Prevention Council (NCPC). The Suite comprises the 24/7 ScamShield Helpline, an enhanced app, a new website and social channels to support government efforts to raise public awareness and improve access to anti-scam resources.

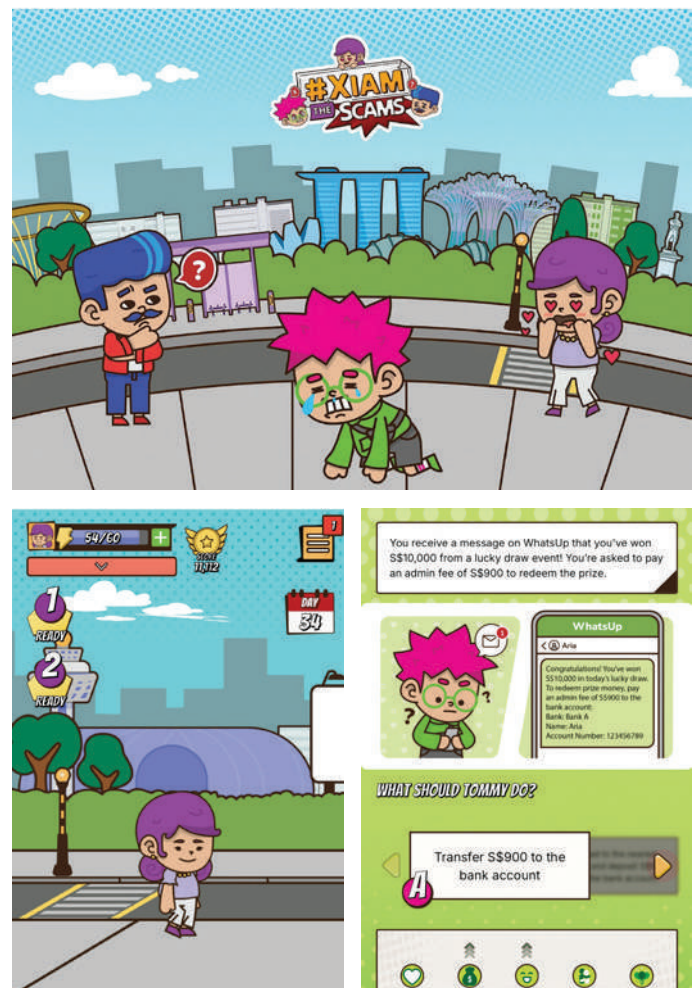

Between October 2024 and January 2025, the SPEO worked with the NCPC on #XiamTheScams, a web-based life simulation game that helps players learn about scams and protective measures through gameplay. The game attracted more than 519,000 participants. The SPEO also worked with Clementi Police Division to gamify the acquisition of scams knowledge and protective measures through #HuntTheMouse, which attracted 1.1 million players.



OPERATIONAL READINESS

EXERCISES

The SPF maintained a high tempo in the conduct of readiness exercises in 2024, ensuring that our frontline capabilities are continuously updated and validated. Gearing up for the major events' deployments, the SPF also made extensive preparations and conducted large-scale exercises to validate our operational plans in managing public order incidents.

From 30 April to 1 May 2024, the SPF conducted Exercise Nexus Resolve with the Singapore Armed Forces (SAF), the Immigration & Checkpoints Authority and the Singapore Civil Defence Force.

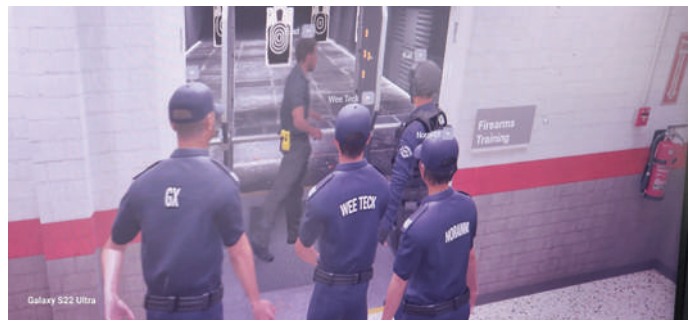
This is a counter-terrorism ground deployment exercise involving more than 600 personnel to test and validate Singapore's multi-agency response plan in the event of terrorist attacks.

TRAINING

The SPF also introduced innovations to enhance training effectiveness and realism. To raise officers' competencies in operational tactics, the SPF is developing the Tactical Law Enforcement Simulator (TALES) that allows officers to train tactically in a broad range of immersive and high-stress scenarios with realistic simulation gear and weapons, minimising physical risks associated with live weapons.

To enhance the use of force and marksmanship capabilities of officers, the SPF is developing the Mobile Use of Force Simulation (MUFS) Training System. The system's realistic, video-based scenarios and simulated weapons enhance officers' decision-making and engagement skills during incidents. Both the TALES and MUFS have robust after-action review features to identify officers' strengths and areas for improvement.

In 2024, the SPF launched the Tactical Training School (TTS) to equip officers with tactical skills and leadership training in public order and public security operations. By establishing standardised training methods and streamlining the learning process, the TTS ensures that officers from different units can work together seamlessly when responding to public order or public security incidents.

OPERATIONAL DEVELOPMENT

LEVERAGING TECHNOLOGY TO ENHANCE OUR CAPABILITIES

In addition to extending Police Camera (PolCam) coverage to new housing estates, the SPF completed the installation of PolCam at 298 sites at the ingress, egress and intersections of expressways, to track vehicles of interest. Since June 2024, these cameras were commissioned with livestreaming capabilities to provide Police Command Posts with live video feeds that enhance situational awareness and aid decision-making during incident management.

The SPF also leveraged drones and Artificial Intelligence (AI) to support operations at major events. During the Marina Bay Singapore Countdown, the SPF collaborated with the Home Team Science & Technology Agency (HTX) to analyse real-time drone footage using an AI video analytics tool, Q-Crowd Counter. This tool allowed the SPF to better sense-make crowd sizes and respond as needed during the event.

UPGRADING EQUIPMENT AND INFRASTRUCTURE

In April 2024, the SPF marked a significant milestone with the full commissioning of the Next-Generation Fast Response Car (NGFRC). These vehicles are custom engineered to meet the SPF's unique operational requirements. The NGFRC's Automated Number Plate Recognition capability marked its first successful case in June 2024 when a stolen vehicle was detected during a routine patrol. This led to the arrest and prosecution of the driver for motor vehicle theft.

The SPF also made substantial progress in the Redesigned Neighbourhood Police Post (NPP) initiative. Fifty-three existing NPPs were successfully redesigned by end-2024 with another eight new NPPs planned for end-2025. These unmanned NPPs offer round-the-clock self-help options, improving public access to Police services and optimising our manpower resources.

As part of ongoing efforts to streamline operations and achieve greater efficiency, in December 2024, Yishun North Neighbourhood Police Centre (NPC) and Yishun South NPC were merged, consolidating operations into the unified Yishun NPC.

FUTUREPROOFING OUR OPERATIONS

Looking ahead, the SPF remains committed to adapting to the evolving security landscape. The SPF will continue to invest in data analytics, sensors, autonomous systems and AI to enhance our operational capabilities. The focus on building citizen-centric services, leveraging cutting-edge technology and enhancing readiness for public security threats will enable the SPF to safeguard Singapore's safety and security in an increasingly complex environment.

MAINTAINING OPERATIONAL EXCELLENCE THROUGH INVESTIGATION AND INTELLIGENCE

The total number of physical crime cases reported remained stable at 19,969 in 2024 as compared to 19,966 in 2023.

Scams and cybercrime continue to be a key concern. The number of scam and cybercrime cases increased by 10.8% to 55,810 in 2024, compared to 50,376 cases in 2023. Scams accounted for 92.3% of these 55,810 cases. The total number of scam cases increased by 10.6% to 51,501 in 2024, from 46,563 cases in 2023.

CLOSE COLLABORATION BETWEEN INVESTIGATION AND INTELLIGENCE COMMUNITIES

Close collaboration between the investigation and intelligence communities, supported by operational units, remains integral to strengthening the ability of the Singapore Police Force (SPF) to effectively disrupt organised crime networks.

Between 30 June and 1 July 2024, officers from the Criminal Investigation Department (CID), Police Intelligence Department (PID), Special Operations Command and Land Divisions conducted a successful joint [gambling suppression operation](#) with the Royal Malaysian Police (RMP).

The joint effort dismantled an organised criminal group involved in illegal transnational gambling and led to the arrest of 43 members under the Gambling Control Act. With the RMP's assistance, four suspects were arrested in Johor and the operations of two betting information centres were terminated. More than S\$14 million worth of assets were also seized and prohibited from disposal.

In October 2024, officers from the CID and PID executed a [successful operation against a foreign vice syndicate](#) leading to the arrest of 17 subjects for their suspected involvement in various offences, including vice-related and illegal drug activities.

Criminal proceeds amounting to S\$6,100, mobile phones and vice paraphernalia were seized in connection to the case. More than six suspicious bank accounts holding more than S\$19,000, allegedly used to facilitate vice-related activities, were frozen.

The year 2024 also saw significant developments in a major [anti-money laundering case](#). Ten foreign nationals were convicted of offences including money laundering and forgery, and sentenced to 13 to 17 months' imprisonment, with S\$944 million in assets forfeited to the state.

Another 15 foreign nationals who had left Singapore while investigations were ongoing, surrendered assets worth about S\$1.85 billion to the state. These continued developments highlight the SPF's commitment to combat against such crimes and recovering illicit assets.

FIGHTING TRANSNATIONAL CRIME

With growing global connectivity, criminal syndicates are increasingly using offshore bases to conceal their operations. In response, the SPF prioritises strong partnerships with foreign law enforcement agencies to swiftly bring transnational criminals to justice.

In 2024, the Anti-Scam Command (ASCom) collaborated with foreign law enforcement agencies to dismantle 16 transnational scam syndicates, leading to the arrest of more than 160 subjects linked to at least 2,300 cases, with losses exceeding S\$58 million. The ASCom participated actively in INTERPOL operations, seizing over S\$72 million and investigating over 2,600 subjects involved in scam activities.

The ASCom also formed FRONTIER+ with anti-scam units from five countries to strengthen international asset recovery efforts, helping Malaysia's National Scam Response Centre recover more than S\$114,000 from a scam.

As part of the SPF's commitment to combat against crime, 110 money mules were prosecuted under newly operationalised money laundering offences, reinforcing efforts to punish and deter criminals who facilitate scams.

In April 2024, the Cybercrime Command (CCC) continued to collaborate with the United States Homeland Security Investigations (HSI) to co-organise the HSI-SPF Cybercrime Workshop, fostering regional collaborations in fighting cybercrime.

In May 2024, the CID held the inaugural Organised Crime and Financial Investigation Symposium, which focused on enhancing collaborations between with international law enforcement and regulatory agencies, as well as on developing new investigative strategies.

In November 2024, the CCC organised the ASEAN Cybercrime Conference to foster regional cooperation and address cybersecurity challenges specific to ASEAN. The conference allowed ASEAN and Timor Leste to develop targeted strategies and enhance regional cybercrime-fighting capabilities.

BUILDING CAPABILITIES AND STAYING AHEAD OF THE CURVE

The SPF remains committed to building investigative and intelligence capabilities beyond traditional crime-fighting areas.

The [Online Criminal Harms Act \(OCHA\) Office](#) was established in February 2024 to operationalise the OCHA. Following its operationalisation, directions were issued to online service providers to disrupt online criminal activities. [Codes of Practice](#) were also introduced in June 2024, requiring designated online services to implement measures to prevent scams and malicious cyber activities.

Cybercrime-fighting capabilities were also strengthened with the launch of the National Service Cybercrime Operator (NSCO) vocation in August 2024. The NSCO vocation taps on the expertise of full-time Police National Service officers to support operational roles within the CCC and ASCom to detect and disrupt scams and cybercrime.

In October 2024, the Commercial Affairs Department, the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and His Majesty's Revenue and Customs (HMRC) of the United Kingdom jointly organised a capacity-building workshop on trade-based money laundering, where insights on the prevention, detection and investigation of trade-based money laundering were shared.

ENHANCING OPERATIONAL EXCELLENCE

Training remains essential in equipping Investigation Officers with the skills to tackle the evolving criminal landscape.

In 2024, the Home Team School of Criminal Investigation (HTSCI) made significant strides in strengthening leadership development for Investigation Managers and formalised the Training and Development Units (TDUs) within Land Division Investigation Branches. The leadership courses were revamped to include profiling tools, coaching skills and tailored modules.



The inaugural Investigation Management Forum was held in May 2024 as part of HTSCI's training plan to support the development of Investigation Managers.

The newly introduced Senior Investigation Manager Development Programme equips senior managers with competencies to navigate emerging challenges, while the inaugural Investigation Management Forum, held in May 2024,

encouraged collaboration within the investigation community. TDUs further enhanced training capabilities by providing structured onboarding, team-based training approaches and standardised curricula to ensure consistency and quality in training.

The HTSCI held its inaugural Trainers' Day in November 2024 to highlight key training priorities for the future and share the latest development in training systems and methodologies.

To prepare and upskill SPF officers to better deal with cybercrime-related challenges, the SPF has also implemented the Cybercrime Competency Framework to equip all officers with the requisite cybercrime knowledge and skills for their respective roles in the SPF cybercrime ecosystem.

SUSTAINING OPERATIONAL EXCELLENCE

Close coordination between the SPF's investigation and intelligence communities remains essential for advancing crime-solving capabilities and disrupting organised crime operations.

Such efforts ensure that Singapore remains safe and free from criminal activities. The SPF will continue to ensure operational excellence in an ever-changing landscape through rigorous training, strategic partnerships and continuous innovation.

In 2024, the Singapore Police Force (SPF) honoured the unwavering dedication of our officers and created more advancement and career opportunities for officers.

Our officers are at the heart of our operational excellence. Working alongside our regular officers and civilian officers are our Police National Service (PNS) officers and Volunteer Special Constabulary (VSC) officers. They work as a team across different functions, from enforcement to crime prevention, to ensure the smooth running of daily Police operations.



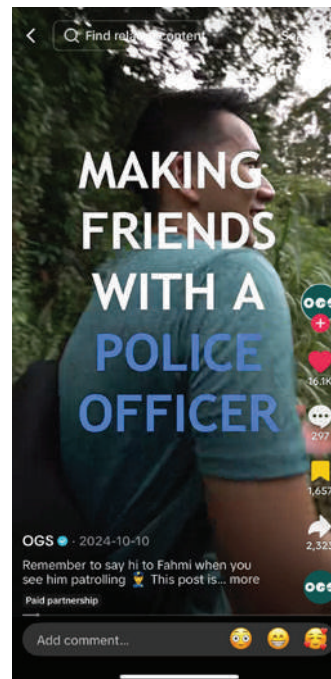
Working alongside our officers at the National Day Parade are the Volunteer Special Constabulary (Community) officers in their distinctive, bright-blue uniforms.

In addition to carrying out their primary roles, our officers provided security coverage for major public events such as the Istana Open House, [F1 Singapore Grand Prix](#), [National Day Parade](#) and Marina Bay Singapore Countdown, to ensure a safe experience for all participants.

With the rising number of scams in today's technology-driven world, the timely introduction of National Service Cybercrime Operators (NSCOs) as a new PNS vocation has enhanced the SPF's cybersecurity capabilities.

BUILDING A BIGGER FAMILY IN BLUE

The SPF remains dedicated to growing our team of officers, to ensure we stand ready to keep Singapore safe and secure.

The SPF continues to drive recruitment efforts to maintain our position as an employer of choice and attract high-calibre candidates to join our family in blue. Building on the success of past collaborations with popular social media platforms, the SPF partnered with content creators such as Our Grandfather Story (OGS) and TheSmartLocal (TSL) to produce engaging content that resonates with our target audience. One such collaboration has even amassed over 11 million views on TikTok.

On the VSC front, the SPF has intensified recruitment efforts to attract more people to volunteer with the Force. In addition to major events like the Volunteer Festival 2024, our Recruitment Team partnered with officers from various units to bring recruitment roadshows to the heartlands, including venues such as neighbourhood malls and town centres. These initiatives have been successful, with the SPF receiving over 2,000 applications in 2024.

DEVELOPING AND RECOGNISING OUR OFFICERS

The SPF continues to provide opportunities through structured development pathways and supportive workplace enhancements. In 2024, the SPF leveraged the Public Service Division's platform, One Talent Gateway (OTG), to provide greater growth opportunities for civilian officers in the SPF.

In addition to the annual posting exercises for civilian officers, the SPF tapped into the Structured Job Rotation programme in the OTG, to create more avenues for civilian officers to explore secondments out of the Home Team, but related to their domain areas.

To better support pregnant officers, the SPF trialled transitional postings, offering those on night shift duties the option to switch to non-night shift roles with full job scopes for up to 24 months post-partum.

The SPF also invests heavily in our officers through training and development. In 2024, the VSC provided modular developmental training programmes to upskill VSC officers in their competencies and raise their current knowledge. VSC supervisors also underwent training to hone their people management skills in order to provide better care for their officers.

In addition to developing our officers, the SPF also greatly values our officers' contributions to the Force. The NS Key Appointment Holder and Responsibility Appointment Holder (KAHRAH) Appointment Ceremony held on 26 April 2024 was a significant NS leadership recognition event officiated by Commissioner of Police (CP) Hoong Wee Teck. The event honoured outgoing NS KAHRAHs for their exemplary leadership and command abilities, and inducted incoming NS KAHRAHs. The event also served as a platform for sharing leadership insights and experience amongst the attendees.

CARING THROUGH GIVING

The children of officers from the SPF and members of the Police Central Welfare Fund are eligible for the SPF-Lee Foundation Study Award. There are three categories of the award, namely the CP Scholastic Achievement Award for children who have achieved academic excellence; the CP Study Award to help support education costs and the Study Grant for children with special education needs.

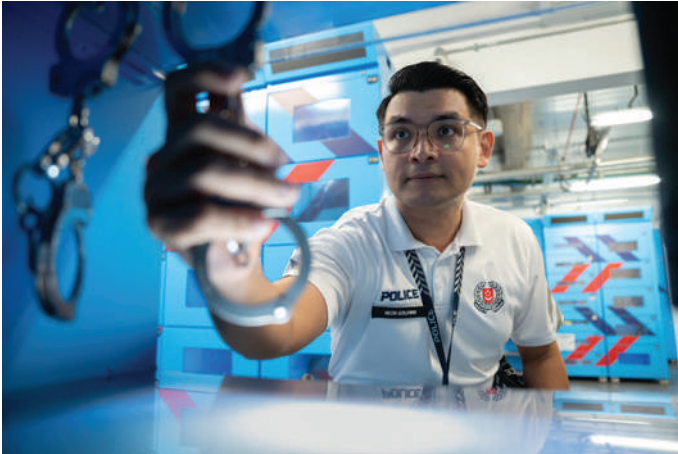

HAVING OUR OFFICERS' WELFARE AT HEART



SPF officers dedicate themselves to serving the nation round the clock. In turn, the SPF is committed to looking after their well-being through comprehensive care initiatives so that they can continue to fulfil their demanding roles. In 2024, the SPF expanded access to health screening services, empowering more officers to take charge of their health and well-being.



In 2024, the SPF developed and launched the Work-Life Harmony Guide to help supervisors and staff navigate work-life boundaries more effectively. The guide introduces two key strategies, **SMILE** and **CARE** to support this effort.

The SMILE strategies guide supervisors in facilitating effective work-life practices:

- Set expectations and boundaries
- Manage work performance
- Initiate conversations and stay connected
- Lead by example
- Encourage personal care and development

Staff can use the CARE strategies to develop a work-life plan that meets their individual needs and expectations:

- Communicate
- Adhere to the plan
- Review and report
- Embrace personal care and development

By providing practical guidance to both supervisors and staff, the guide aims to enhance morale and improve job satisfaction among officers. Officers can easily access the SPF Work-Life Harmony Guide and information on wellness initiatives from SPF's Wellness-In-Policing microsite on the SPF intranet.

SUPPORTING OUR OFFICERS' TRANSITION BEYOND THE FORCE

With the raising of the retirement age for Police officers from 56 to 57, the SPF has revised the career transition roadmap accordingly. Enhancements include additional transition days and expanded criteria for transition dollars, providing officers with more opportunities to prepare for their post-retirement careers.

In 2024, our partnership with SkillsFuture Singapore helped map out relevant job opportunities and skills gaps, guiding 437 officers in their job search. In addition, the SPF's Career Transition Office (CTO) collaborated with the Lifelong Learning Institute's Skills Ambassadors to provide 149 officers with personalised career consultations, tailored to their individual profiles to enhance their career prospects with potential employers.

The SPF CTO also continued to facilitate a range of initiatives including targeted certification courses, workplace attachments and the Ministry of Home Affairs' train-and-place initiatives across various sectors to support our officers' career transition. These efforts let officers explore an array of career paths and qualifications, empowering them to choose a path that aligns with their skills and interests as they transition into new careers beyond retirement.

OUR COMMITMENT TO OFFICERS

The strength of our organisation lies in our officers, each contributing unique skills and value to our mission success. The SPF remains committed to attracting talent, developing officers and prioritising their well-being – empowering them to perform their duties with distinction and pride.

BUILDING AND STRENGTHENING TRUST WITH THE COMMUNITY

Community policing was introduced in Singapore in 1983, focusing on the Singapore Police Force's (SPF) proactive engagement with local stakeholders to prevent crime and address security concerns.

This close collaboration has led to high levels of public trust in the SPF, as reported in the SPF Public Perception Survey 2024. The survey also found that in-person Police engagements at events with the public are regarded as the most common form of Police interaction, underscoring the ongoing importance of community engagement.

A GLOBAL LEADER IN COMMUNITY POLICING

Trust between the Police and public is crucial for effective policing, especially in today's interconnected world. Globally, community policing has been proven to reduce crime, enhance perceived safety and boost trust in law enforcement. When trust exists, the public is more likely to cooperate with the Police and work together to create solutions to prevent crime.

In addition to door-to-door engagements with the public, the SPF continues to hold large-scale roadshows and events to engage the community on various crime prevention topics.

Youth engagement is crucial for building a safer society. Early outreach helps create a community that understands and supports law enforcement. Youth engagement activities also foster positive Police-youth relationships and instil civic responsibility from a young age.

This initiative marks the expansion of the Police Pal programme to include preschoolers, offering age-appropriate resources to help children understand Police roles and learn more about crime prevention. The SPF and the National Library Board also collaborated on "Police Pal@Libraries," which are storytelling sessions conducted by Community Policing Unit officers at public libraries.

ANTI-SCAM STUDENT CHAMPION (ASSC)

Launched in 2020, the ASSC initiative mobilises secondary school students to advocate anti-scam awareness. In 2024, over 200 Student Champions from various schools researched and shared anti-scam messages with their friends and families, completed online quizzes and created educational videos, as part of the ASSC competition. These videos were subsequently shared on the social media platforms of Neighbourhood Police Centres.



FORGING NEW PARTNERSHIPS AND REINFORCING EXISTING NETWORKS

Strong partnerships with community partners are crucial for enhancing public safety. These engagements extend Police effectiveness and foster a shared sense of responsibility for the community.

LAUNCH OF POINT-TO-POINT TRANSPORT ISSWG

The SPF launched the [Point-to-Point Transport Industry Safety and Security Watch Group](#) (iSSWG) with the National Private Hire Vehicles Association and National Taxi Association. The iSSWG engages taxi and private hire drivers as the Police's eyes and ears on the road, reinforcing road safety and crime prevention efforts.

SINGAPORE CHEMICAL INDUSTRY COUNCIL (SCIC) – JOINT AGENCIES DIALOGUE

To engage partners from the Chemical iSSWG, the SPF organised the annual SCIC – Joint Agencies Dialogue on 11 October 2024. It was a fruitful discussion on developments that may potentially affect the industry, such as global terrorism trends as well as licensing and regulatory matters.

The Cyber Guardians on Watch interest group under the CWS was introduced on 24 May 2024 to allow members to receive cybercrime alerts and advisories via the Police@SG app. In turn, members can help to amplify these messages and report suspicious cyber activities to the Police. As of 31 December 2024, there are more than 31,000 Cyber Guardian on Watch members.

ENGAGEMENTS WITH OUR SSWG MEMBERS

The SPF regularly engages Safety and Security Watch Group (SSWG) members on security threats, crime concerns and Police initiatives. For example, the Anti-Scam Screen Saver initiative, developed in collaboration with the National Crime Prevention Council (NCPC), was launched at the annual SSWG Seminar, held by Bedok Police Division on 26 January 2024.

Similarly, Clementi Police Division held its inaugural Retailers' Network with its SSWG members, VivoCity and Harbourfront Centre under the Mapletree Commercial Trust, to share good practices and how to prevent and deter crime in shopping malls.

As of 31 December 2024, there are more than 1,900 SSWG members and a total of nine iSSWGs have been established.

ENHANCING EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS IN OUR COMMUNITY

The VCCP celebrated its 10th anniversary on 2 August 2024. At the event, outstanding Victim Care Officers were also recognised for their efforts. The theme "Building Care: Brick by Brick" highlighted the collective efforts of volunteers in supporting victims of crime over the past decade.

RECOGNISING OUR COMMUNITY PARTNERS

Recognising community stakeholders and volunteers motivates and sustains the community's interest in partnering with the Police to achieve its mission.

OUTSTANDING COMMUNITY PARTNERSHIP AWARD (OCPA)

On 19 February 2024, 45 stakeholders received the OCPA in appreciation for their strong collaboration and commitment towards preventing and deterring crimes in their premises.

NATIONAL SAFETY AND SECURITY WATCH GROUP (NSSWG) AWARD CEREMONY 2024

The biennial [NSSWG Award Ceremony](#), jointly organised by the SPF and SCDF, was held on 27 December 2024. It recognised 191 SSWG members for their exceptional efforts in enhancing workplace safety and security.

HOTEL SECURITY AWARDS AND CONFERENCE 2024

SPF VOLUNTEER APPRECIATION DAY 2024



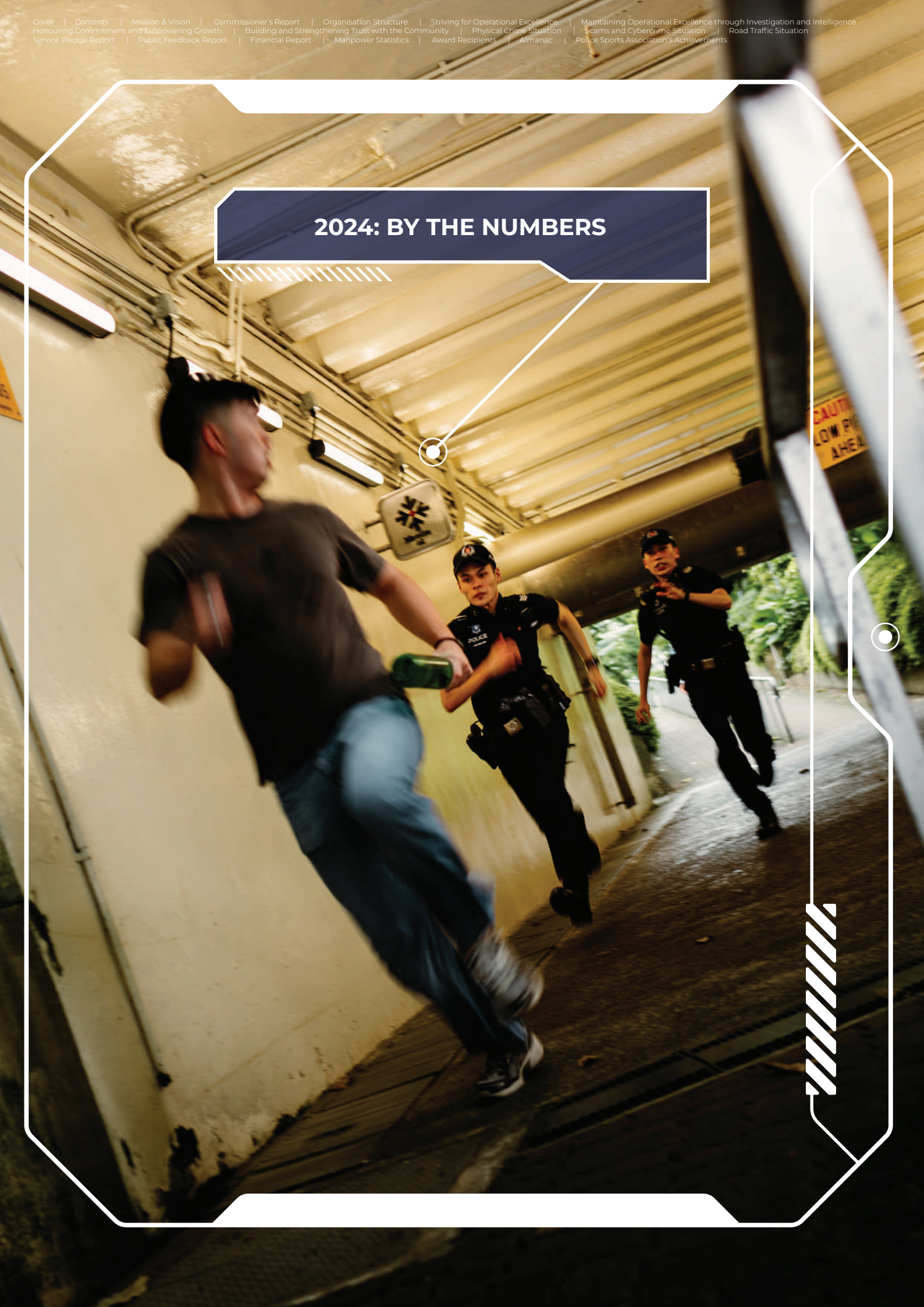

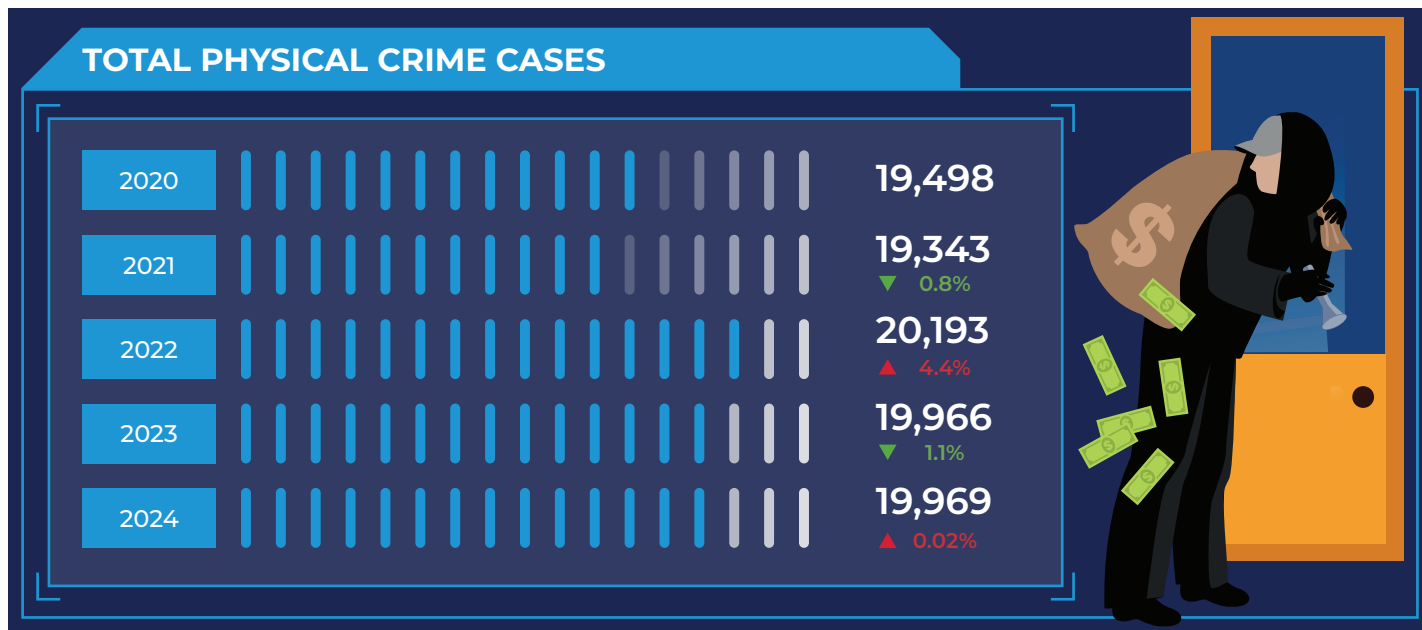

PHYSICAL CRIME SITUATION

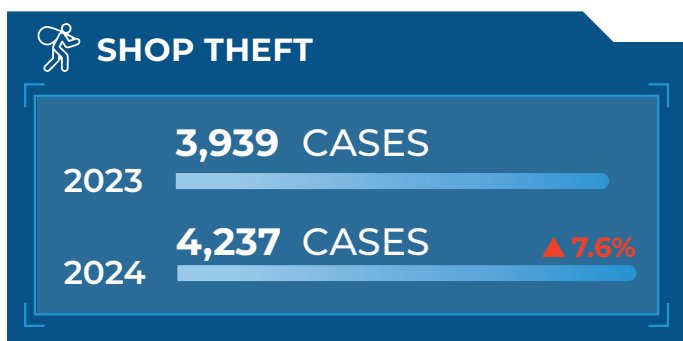
Physical crime cases remained stable in 2024.

The total number of physical crime cases reported remained stable at 19,969 in 2024, from 19,966 in 2023.



CRIMES OF CONCERN

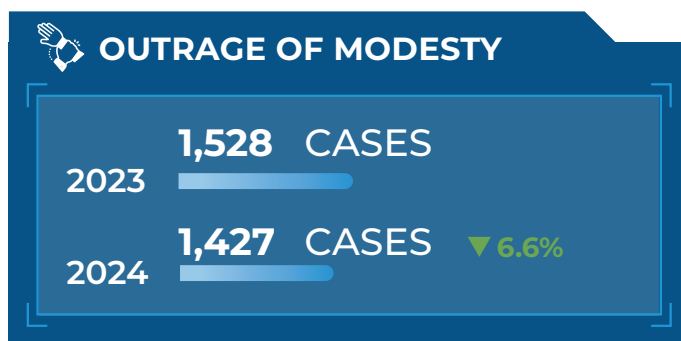
In 2024, the top crimes of concern included **shop theft**, **outrage of modesty** and **voyeurism**.



Shop theft cases increased to 4,237 cases in 2024 from 3,939 cases in 2023 and accounted for 21.2% of total physical crime cases. Shop theft remains one of the **top offences for youths arrested** in 2024.

The widespread adoption of technology by retailers (such as CCTV systems) has enhanced the retailers' ability to detect shop theft and assist the SPF in apprehending offenders. This ensures that even if offenders evade immediate detection, they will still face consequences for their actions.

The SPF has also expanded its collaboration with retailers for the Shop Theft Awareness for Retailers (STAR) Programme, with more than 1,000 retailers on board. Under the Programme, the SPF works with retailers to analyse their stores' risk factors and vulnerabilities to shop theft, and jointly identify effective crime prevention measures for adoption. **All retailers are encouraged to join the STAR Programme** and take preventive measures to protect their businesses from shop theft.



Outrage of Modesty (OM) cases decreased to 1,427 cases in 2024 from 1,528 cases in 2023 and accounted for 7.1% of total physical crime cases. There was a decrease in the number of cases in Public Entertainment (PE) outlets and the public transport network, with more than half of the cases involved **culprits known to the victims**.

The top four locations where OM offences were committed were:

Residential premises – a decrease to 356 cases in 2024 from 374 in 2023.

Public transport network – a decrease to 158 cases in 2024 from 169 in 2023.

Shopping complexes – an increase to 135 cases in 2024 from 132 in 2023.

Public entertainment outlets – a decrease to 103 cases in 2024 from 135 in 2023.

The SPF will continue to work closely with stakeholders to raise awareness of OM. Ongoing initiatives include the Safe Clubbing Campaign with PE sector stakeholders and the prominent display of crime prevention advisories along the public transport network in collaboration with the Land Transport Authority and public transport operators. The Riders-on-Watch Scheme also empowers commuters to partner with the SPF in preventing crime.

VOYEURISM

2023 **476 CASES**

2024 **519 CASES** ▲ 9.0%

Voyeurism cases increased to 519 cases in 2024 from 476 cases in 2023 and accounted for 2.6% of total physical crime cases.

The top three locations where voyeurism cases were committed were:

Residential premises – an increase to 162 cases in 2024 from 151 cases in 2023.

Shopping complexes – a decrease to 80 cases in 2024 from 84 cases in 2023.

Public transport network – an increase to 69 cases in 2024 from 56 cases in 2023.

76.5% of cases at residential premises were committed by perpetrators known to the victims, such as partners or ex-partners and household members or fellow tenants, while cases at shopping complexes and on the public transport network typically involved perpetrators not known to the victims.

The SPF will continue to collaborate with community stakeholders to deter voyeurism through public education efforts. Under the "Spot It. Report it." campaign, crime prevention advisories are prominently displayed on Police standees located at MRT interchanges. The SPF also collaborated with stakeholders such as the Restroom Association (Singapore) to introduce security design guidelines for public toilets, including strategic CCTV cameras placement at toilet entrances and enhanced lighting systems.

EVERYONE HAS A ROLE TO PLAY IN FIGHTING CRIME

The SPF would like to thank all our community partners and stakeholders for their strong support in helping to keep Singapore safe and secure. In 2024, the SPF presented 47 Public Spiritedness Awards, 33 Community Partnership Awards and 45 Outstanding Community Partnership Awards. 191 awards were also presented to organisations that played a part in the fight against crime.

Everyone can contribute to the safety and security of Singapore. Individuals can sign up as a [Community Watch Scheme](#) member and download the Police@SG mobile app to receive the latest crime information, alerts and advisories from the SPF. Business operators can approach their nearest Neighbourhood Police Centre for more information on various anti-crime initiatives. Preschoolers can also look forward to the Police Pal storybook series launched at over 1,000 pre-schools and join storytelling sessions conducted by Community Policing Unit officers at libraries!

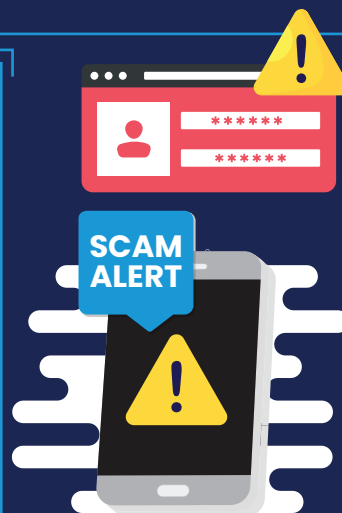
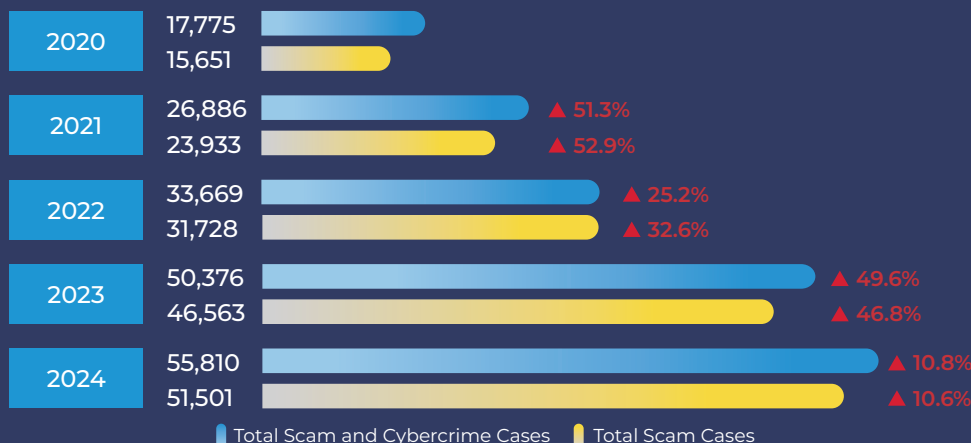

SCAMS AND CYBERCRIME SITUATION

Scams and cybercrime remain a pressing concern. Cases increased by 10.8% to 55,810 cases in 2024 from 50,376 cases in 2023.

TOTAL SCAM AND CYBERCRIME CASES



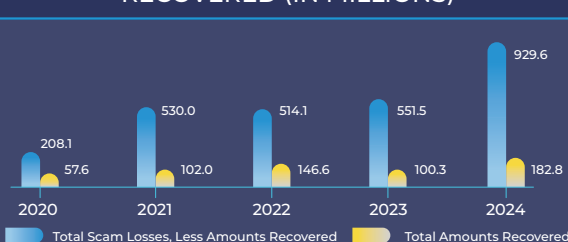
Of these 55,810 cases, scams accounted for 92.3%. The number of scam cases increased by 10.6% to 51,501 cases in 2024 from 46,563 cases in 2023.

TOTAL SCAM LOSSES AND AMOUNTS RECOVERED



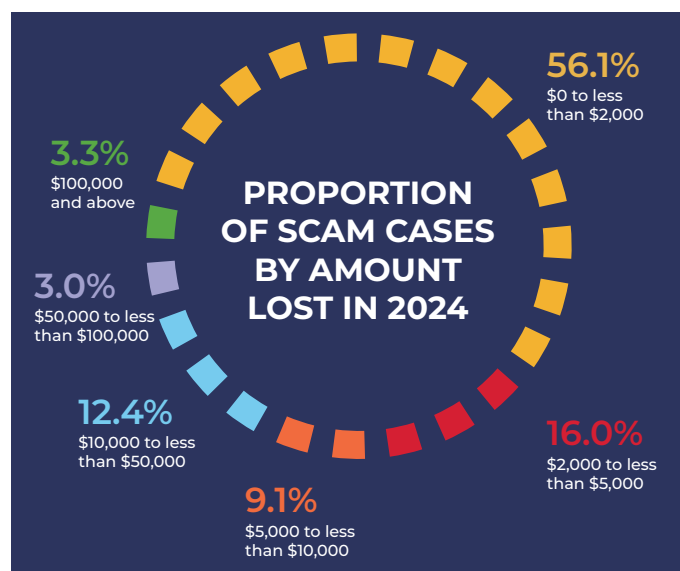
The total amount lost increased by 70.6% to at least \$1.1 billion in 2024 from at least \$651.8 million in 2023. Through proactive interventions with victims at various stages of being scammed, the Anti-Scam Command (ASCom) and its partners had averted potential losses of at least \$483 million and recovered more than \$182 million of scam losses.

PROPORTION OF SCAM CASES BY AMOUNT LOST

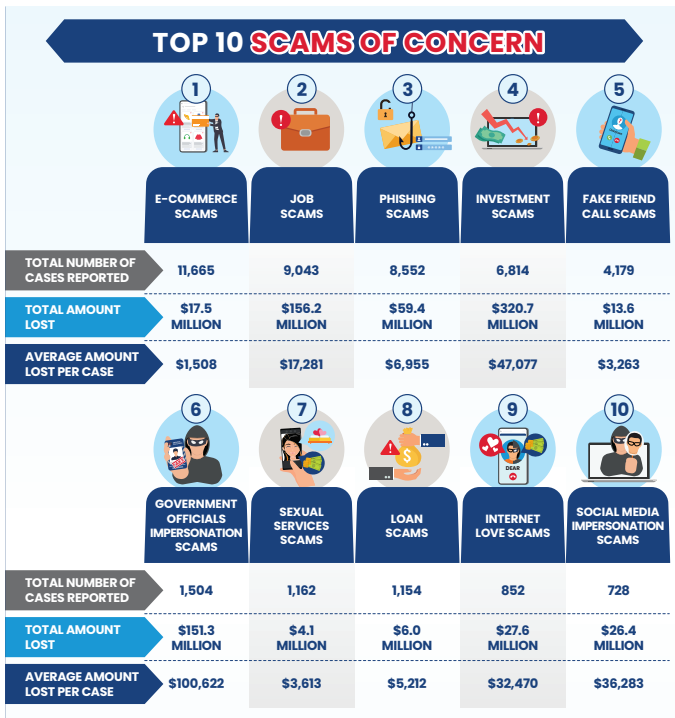
More than 70% of the cases saw less than \$5,000 in losses. The median loss per case fell 12.6% to \$1,389 in 2024 from \$1,590 in 2023. The increase in the total amount lost was driven by a small number of cases with very high losses. Scam cases with losses of at least \$100,000 made up 3.3% of the scam cases in 2024 but accounted for 70.8% of the total amount lost.



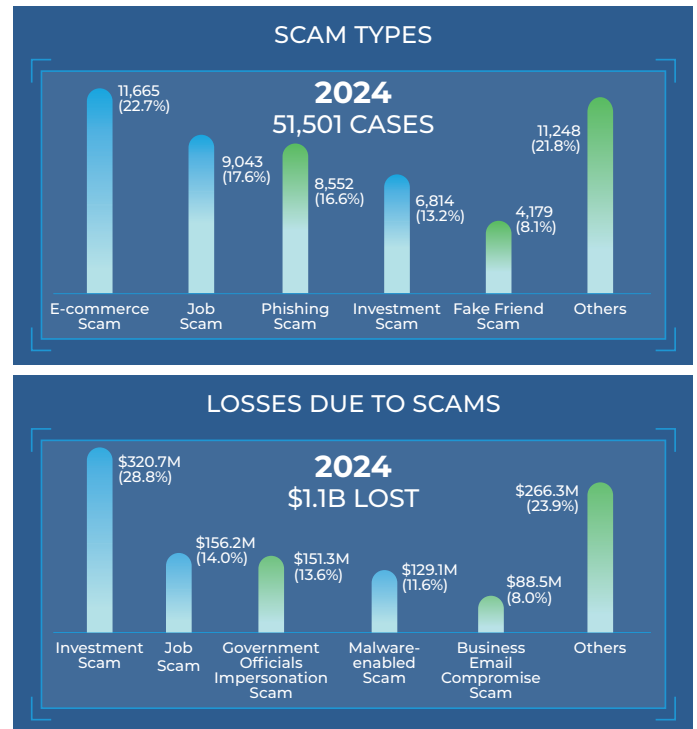
HIGH NUMBER OF SELF-EFFECTED TRANSFERS

In 2024, self-effected transfers accounted for 82.4% of total reported scam cases. In most of these cases, the scammers did not gain direct control of the victims' accounts, but manipulated victims into performing the monetary transactions, by means of deception and social engineering.

The top five scam types in 2024 by number of cases were E-commerce Scams, Job Scams, Phishing Scams, Investment Scams and Fake Friend Call Scams.



The top five scam types in 2024 by total amount lost were Investment Scams, Job Scams, Government Officials Impersonation Scams, Malware-enabled Scams and Business Email Compromise Scams.

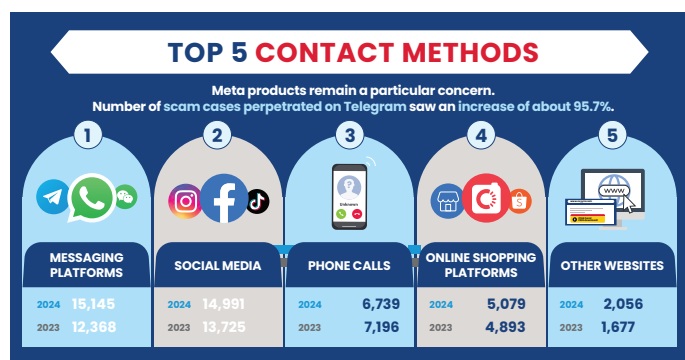

TOP CONTACT METHODS

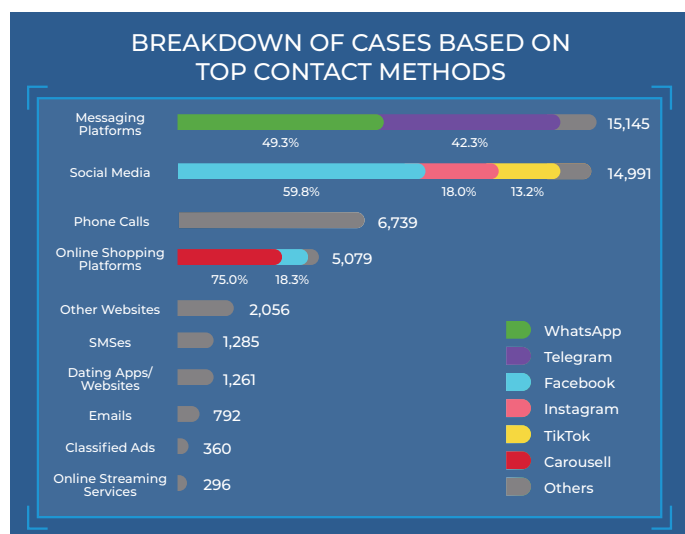


Three products from Meta (Facebook, WhatsApp, Instagram) and Telegram remain particularly concerning, consistently being over-represented among the platforms exploited by scammers to contact potential victims and conduct their scams.

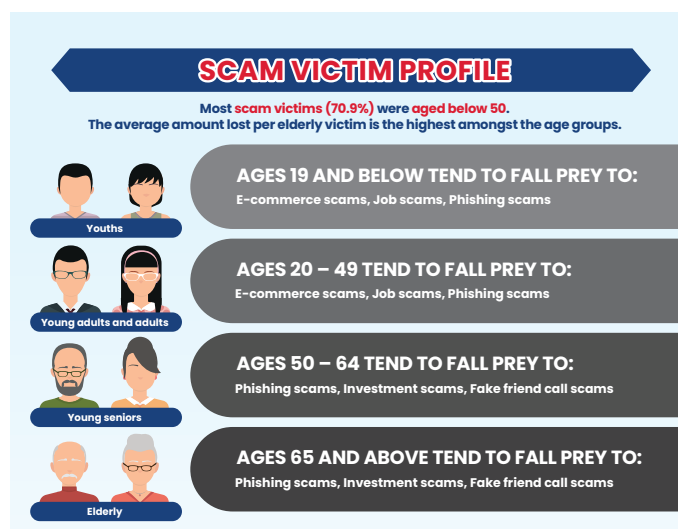
WhatsApp and Telegram were the top two messaging platforms exploited by scammers. The number of scam cases perpetrated on Telegram saw an increase of about 95.7% in 2024.

Of the cases where scammers contacted victims through social media, 59.8% were contacted through Facebook.

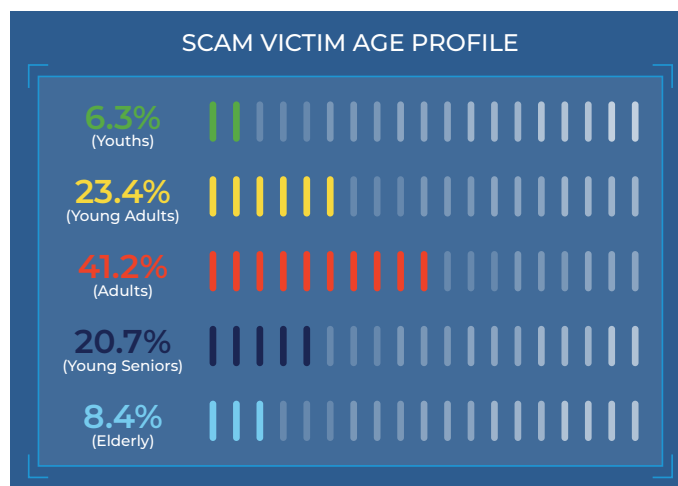
Another contact method of concern is online shopping platforms, with 75% of the cases occurring on Carousell.



SCAM VICTIM PROFILE



In 2024, 70.9% of scam victims were youths, young adults and adults aged below 50. As for the elderly, while they made up only a small proportion of the scam victims but the average amount they lost per victim is the highest among the various age groups.



A MULTI-PRONGED APPROACH TO COMBAT SCAMS

STRENGTHENING LEGISLATIVE LEVERS

The Corruption, Drug Trafficking and Other Serious Crimes (Confiscation of Benefits) Act and the Computer Misuse Act

New offences were introduced to curb the facilitation of scams and the movement of criminal proceeds, as well as the abuse of Singpass. Since the amendments took effect on 8 February 2024, the Police have been charging accused persons in Court under the new offences for scams-related money mule activities.

Amendments to Miscellaneous Offences Act to Criminalise the Misuse of Local SIM cards

This enhanced the Police's ability to enforce against those who abuse local SIM cards to perpetrate scams:

- Irresponsible SIM card subscribers who give away their local SIM cards or provide their particulars to others to be used to sign up for local SIM cards
- Middlemen involved in procuring or providing local SIM cards to scam syndicates
- Errant retailers who facilitate fraudulent local SIM card registrations

Operationalisation of the Online Criminal Harms Act (OCHA)

Since the operationalisation of the OCHA, online service providers have acted on all the directions issued, resulting in faster disruption of online criminal activities.

Two Codes of Practice for online communication and e-commerce services were introduced, requiring providers of designated online services to take proactive measures to prevent and counter scams. For example, Meta and Carousell have implemented verification against Government-issued records for selected users on Facebook and Carousell.

LAW ENFORCEMENT INTERVENTIONS AND OPERATIONS

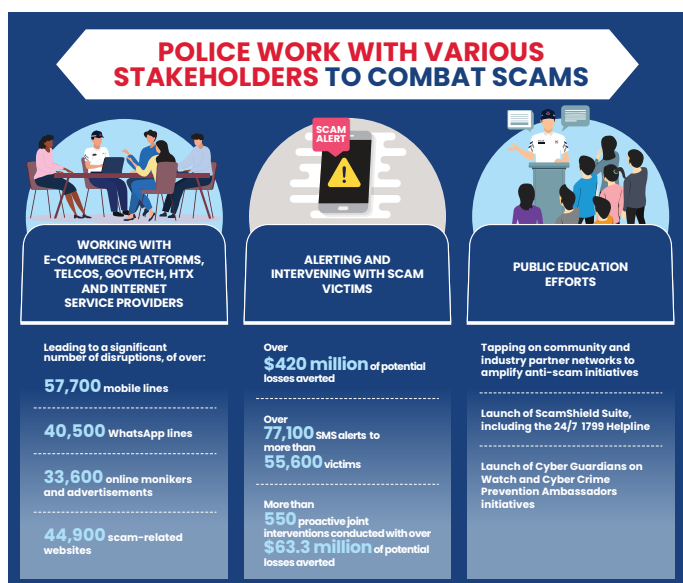
Enforcement operations against scammers and money mules

In 2024, the ASCom, together with the Scam Strike Teams in the seven Police Land Divisions, conducted 25 island-wide anti-scam enforcement operations, leading to the investigation of more than 8,000 money mules and scammers.

Enforcement operations against the misuse of SIM cards

The ASCom launched a series of enforcement operations in 2024 to address the misuse of SIM cards in scam activities, resulting in the seizure of over 31,000 SIM cards and the arrest of 13 individuals.

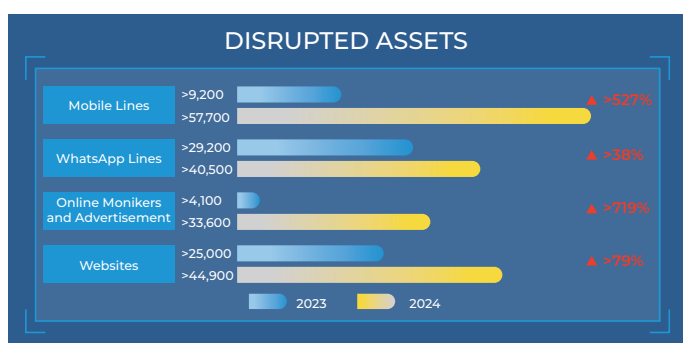
PARTNERSHIPS TO DISRUPT AND ENFORCE AGAINST SCAMS



Partnerships with Public and Private Agencies

The SPF collaborated with Government Technology Agency of Singapore (GovTech) and Home Team Science and Technology Agency (HTX) to develop the Scam Analytics and Tactical Intervention System (SATIS), which leverages artificial intelligence and machine learning to triage, assess and disrupt scam-related websites swiftly.

In 2024, the SPF disrupted more than 57,700 mobile lines, more than 40,500 WhatsApp lines, more than 33,600 online monikers and advertisements, and more than 44,900 websites that were scam-related. This was done through collaborations with major industry stakeholders such as Meta, Carousell, Google and the telecommunications companies.



The ASCom has also expanded its partnerships to more than 120 institutions, including financial institutions, card security groups, fintech companies, cryptocurrency houses, remittance service providers, INTERPOL and overseas law enforcement agencies from jurisdictions such as Hong Kong

SAR and Malaysia, to facilitate the swift freezing of accounts and recovery of funds and mitigate victim losses. In 2024, the ASCom froze more than 21,000 bank accounts and recovered more than \$182 million.

The co-location of Carousell and Shopee staff within the ASCom in 2024 was instrumental in supporting the swift intervention of scam cases on these platforms and proactively detecting and taking down scam-tainted online monikers and suspicious advertisements.

Collaboration with Foreign Law Enforcement Agencies

In 2024, the close collaboration between the SPF and overseas law enforcement agencies resulted in the successful takedown of 16 transnational scam syndicates. More than 150 persons based overseas who were responsible for more than 2,300 transnational scam cases involving losses of more than \$58 million, were arrested.

The SPF participated in INTERPOL's Operation HAECHI V, where more than 1,600 subjects involved in scams were investigated and more than 5,100 bank accounts were blocked, seizing more than \$54.8 million. More than 1,000 virtual accounts were blocked, resulting in the seizure of more than \$798,000 in virtual assets.

In October 2024, the SPF formalised "FRONTIER+" with the anti-scam units of five countries and jurisdictions, namely Hong Kong SAR, Malaysia, Maldives, South Korea and Thailand, to galvanise an alliance to step up collective efforts in asset recovery. This initiative will significantly strengthen international efforts in combating cross-border scams and recovering illicitly transferred funds.

ENGAGEMENT EFFORTS BY THE POLICE

Project A.S.T.R.O: Leveraging Mass Distribution of SMSes to Alert Scam Victims

To complement its enforcement efforts, the ASCom also focused on upstream interventions to identify and alert victims. Through six joint operations in 2024 between the ASCom and partnering banks, more than 77,100 SMSes were sent to alert more than 55,600 victims. This proactive victim-centric approach averted over \$420 million of potential losses.

Proactive Interventions with Potential Scam Victims

The ASCom and the Community Policing Units of the Police Land Divisions regularly conduct proactive interventions with potential scam victims referred by the financial institutions as they had attempted monetary transfers observed to be suspicious. In 2024, more than 550 such interventions were conducted, averting more than \$63.3 million of potential losses.

PUBLIC EDUCATION EFFORTS



Increasing Accessibility to Self-Help Anti-Scam Resources

ScamShield was expanded from an app to a suite of four anti-scam resources that enable members of the public to better protect themselves against scams. The newly launched 24/7 ScamShield Helpline (1799) receives around 500 calls daily. The enhanced ScamShield app saw a 25% increase in downloads from before the enhancement.

**A DISCERNING PUBLIC IS THE
FIRST LINE OF DEFENCE AGAINST SCAMS**

Campaigns to Raise Anti-Scam Awareness

Launched in January 2023, the current national anti-scam campaign is the "I Can Act Against Scams" campaign. Using the acronym "Add, Check and Tell", the campaign encourages the public to adopt anti-scam protective measures such as the ScamShield application and MoneyLock to enhance their resilience against scams.

In November 2024, the new phase of the campaign focused on the "Check" part of the ACT framework, to encourage individuals to "Stop and Check" before making monetary transfers in potential scam situations. This serves as a cognitive break, potentially helping individuals better identify the situation he or she is in and whether a scam was likely present. The campaign promotes key official resources like the 27/4 ScamShield Helpline (1799), that the public can check with when they are uncertain if something is a scam.

In addition to the timely dissemination of information on the latest scam trends, the SPF has been working with media agencies on monthly media campaigns to raise public awareness of "high loss" scam types like Government Officials Impersonation Scams, Investment Scams and Job Scams, targeted at demographic segments vulnerable to these scam types.

RALLYING THE COMMUNITY TO FIGHT AGAINST SCAMS

The SPF has been engaging community and industry partners to help amplify public education on scams. By tapping on their networks, the SPF is able to reach out more effectively to different population segments.

#XiamTheScams Web Game by the National Crime Prevention Council (NCPC)

Designed as a fun, educational and easy-to-play life simulator, the game sought to raise public awareness of common scams in Singapore and anti-scam protective measures. The game engaged over 519,000 players over the three-month game period.

"Cyber Guardians on Watch" Interest Group of the Community Watch Scheme

Members of the "Cyber Guardians on Watch" come from all walks of life and are encouraged to be the SPF's eyes and ears to safeguard cyberspace. As of 31 December 2024, there were more than 32,000 members in the Cyber Guardians on Watch interest group.

Cyber Crime Prevention Ambassador Programme

Launched by the NCPC, this group of volunteers have undergone training and are deployed at roadshows and community events to disseminate cybercrime prevention messages. They have reached out to more than 8,000 members of the public across 21 events.

E-commerce Marketplace Transaction Safety Rating (TSR)

E-commerce marketplaces that have implemented the recommended safety features under the TSR (such as Amazon and Lazada) have seen significantly fewer scams than other platforms.

EVERYONE PLAYS A PART IN FIGHTING SCAMS

Everyone has a part to play in keeping Singapore safe and secure. Individuals should proactively adopt anti-scam measures to enhance their resilience against scams. 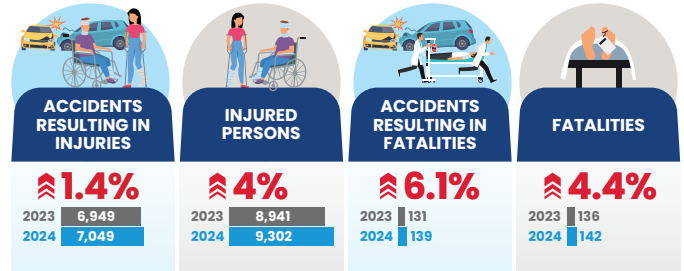

Traffic accidents increased in 2024, along with a significant rise in speeding violations.

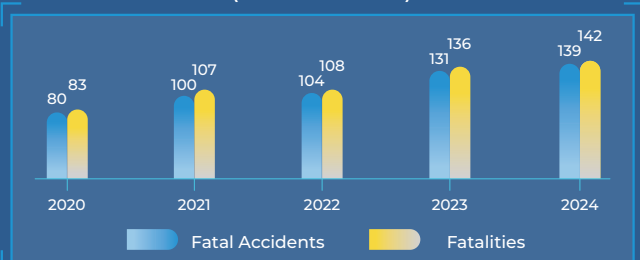
**SPEEDING VIOLATIONS SAW A

The number of traffic accidents resulting in fatalities increased to 139 cases in 2024 from 131 cases in 2023. The number of fatalities increased to 142 persons in 2024 from 136 persons in 2023.

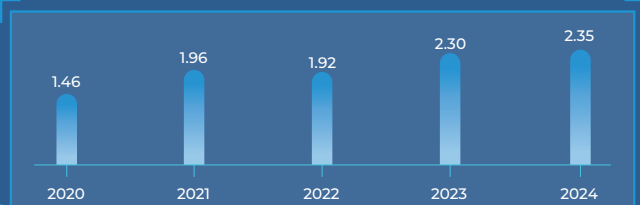
FATAL ACCIDENTS & FATALITIES (2020 TO 2024)

The road traffic fatality rate per 100,000 population increased to 2.35 in 2024 from 2.30 in 2023.

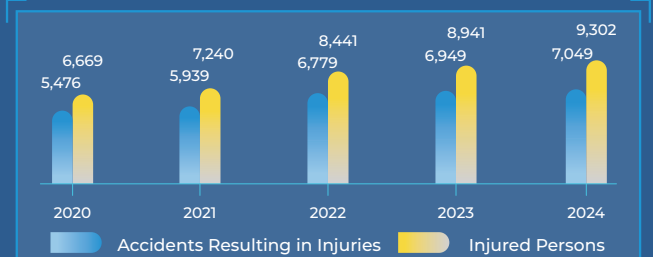
ROAD TRAFFIC FATALITY RATE PER 100,000 POPULATION (2020 TO 2024)



INCREASE IN ACCIDENTS RESULTING IN INJURIES AND NUMBER OF INJURED PERSONS

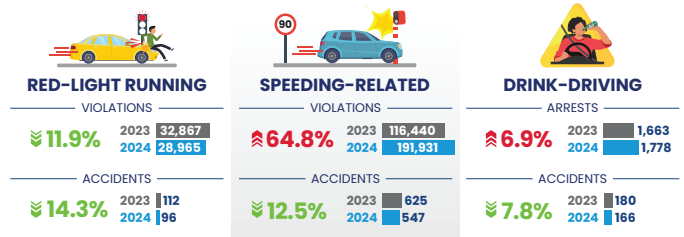
The number of accidents resulting in injuries increased to 7,049 cases in 2024 from 6,949 in 2023. Consequently, the number of injured persons increased to 9,302 in 2024 from 8,941 in 2023. The primary causes of accidents were motorists' failure to keep a proper lookout, lack of adequate vehicle control and lane changing without due care.

INCREASE IN SPEEDING AND DRINK-DRIVING VIOLATIONS AND FATAL ACCIDENTS

The number of speeding-related fatal accidents increased to 46 cases in 2024 from 32 cases in 2023, while the number of fatal drink-driving accidents increased to 12 cases in 2024 from 11 cases in 2023.



ENFORCEMENT

The Traffic Police (TP) will step up enforcement operations and penalise irresponsible road users.

SPEED ENFORCEMENT FUNCTION IN RED-LIGHT CAMERAS (RLCS)

The speed enforcement function in RLCs was activated progressively from 1 April 2024. The RLCs are conspicuously painted in orange and white, accompanied by clear warning signs that indicate the speed limit of the road, and their locations are listed on the SPF website. Despite this, the 100,720 cases of speeding violations detected by cameras in 2024 indicate a lack of regard for speed compliance among motorists.

TP will continue to progressively activate the speed enforcement function in RLCs across the island, especially at locations that are accident-prone or violation-prone.

REVISION OF COMPOSITION SUMS AND DEMERIT POINTS FOR SPEEDING OFFENCES

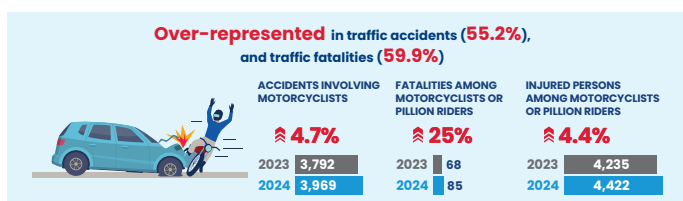
The TP will also be increasing the composition fines and demerit points for speeding offences. The composition sums will be increased by \$50 to \$150 and demerit points will be increased by up to six points. These increased penalties will take effect on 1 January 2026.



VULNERABLE ROAD USERS

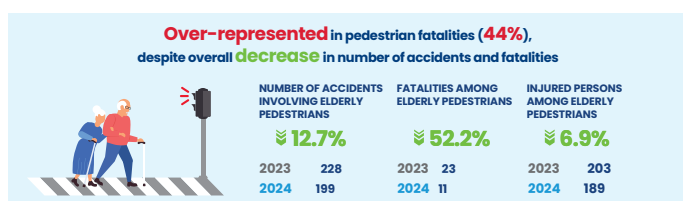
There continues to be a disproportionate number of road traffic accidents involving motorcyclists and elderly pedestrians resulting in injuries or death.

MOTORCYCLISTS AND PILLION RIDERS



While motorcycles made up only 14.7% of Singapore's total vehicle population in 2024, motorcyclists or pillion riders were involved in 55.2% of all traffic accidents and accounted for 59.9% of traffic fatalities. Of these fatalities, 44.7% were due to self-skid fatal accidents.

ELDERLY PEDESTRIANS



The elderly population made up 12.5% of the overall Singapore population in 2024 but the elderly were involved in 42.3% of all fatal traffic accidents involving pedestrians, and accounted for 44% of pedestrian fatalities.

NUMBER OF ACCIDENTS INVOLVING PEDESTRIANS WHO JAYWALKED



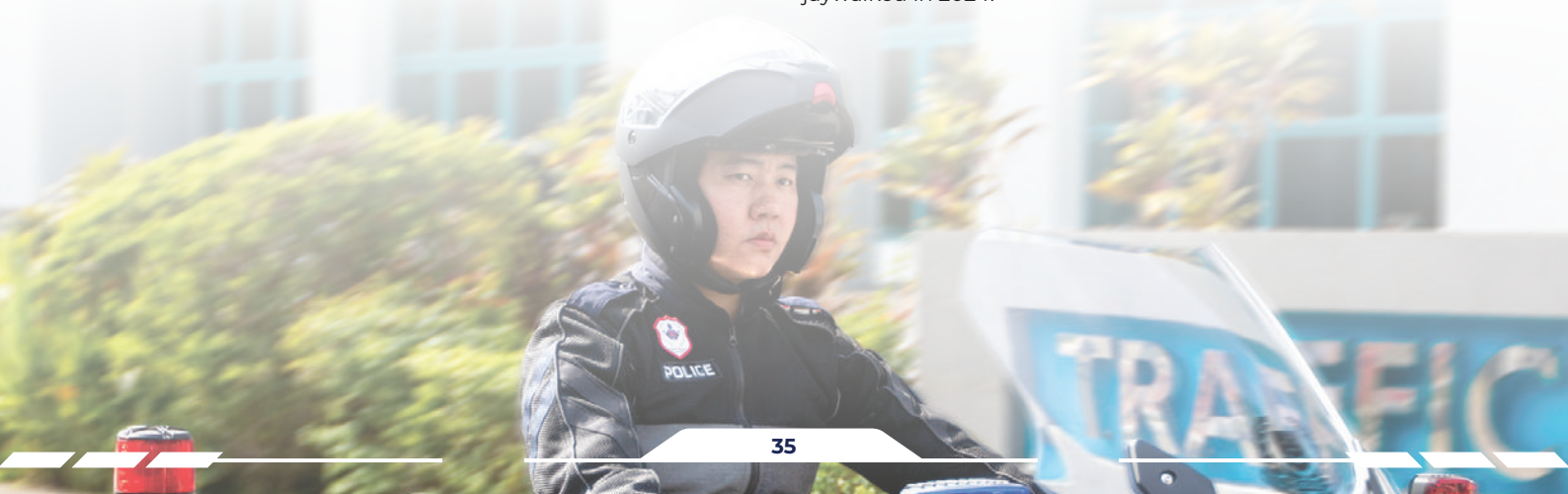
NUMBER OF CASUALTIES AMONG PEDESTRIANS WHO JAYWALKED

Jaywalking continues to be a concern, with a rise in number of accidents, casualties and fatalities. Elderly pedestrians also continue to be overrepresented as they accounted for 38.9% of the total number of fatalities involving pedestrians who jaywalked in 2024.



EDUCATION AND ENGAGEMENT

In 2024, the TP intensified its education and engagement efforts to promote road safety through targeted campaigns and initiatives aimed at specific road user groups. This was done through collaboration with various stakeholders and partners, including other government agencies, public transport operators, educational institutions and industry associations.

Despite increased efforts to improve road safety, the overall traffic situation has worsened, as seen in the sharp rise in speeding violations, speeding-related fatal accidents, and fatal accidents involving motorcyclists. There is an urgent need for all road users to improve compliance to road traffic rules and remain vigilant.

SERVICE PLEDGE REPORT

PLEDGE TO ARRIVE AT URGENT INCIDENTS WITHIN 15 MINUTES AT LEAST 87% OF THE TIME

In 2024, the SPF received a total of 91,779 "urgent" calls, of which 83,330 were responded to within 15 minutes of the call. This brings the SPF Urgent Incident Response Time to **90.8%**.

PLEDGE TO ANSWER "999" CALLS WITHIN 10 SECONDS AT LEAST 90% OF THE TIME

In 2024, a total of 1,261,341 "999" calls were received by the Police Operations Command Centre, of which **1,142,680** or **90.6%** of the calls were answered within 10 seconds.

PLEDGE TO RESPOND TO LETTERS FROM THE PUBLIC WITHIN 5 WORKING DAYS AT LEAST 90% OF THE TIME

In 2024, members of the public sent in 16,338 letters, of which, **16,305** or **99.8%** received a response within 5 working days.

PLEDGE TO UPDATE VICTIMS OF CRIME ON THE PRELIMINARY STATUS OF CASES WITHIN 7 WORKING DAYS AT LEAST 90% OF THE TIME

In 2024, there were 64,565 victims for the crimes reported at the seven Land Divisions, Police Coast Guard, Criminal Investigation Department and Airport Police Division. **64,564 (99.9%)** victims of crime were informed of the preliminary status of their cases within 7 working days.

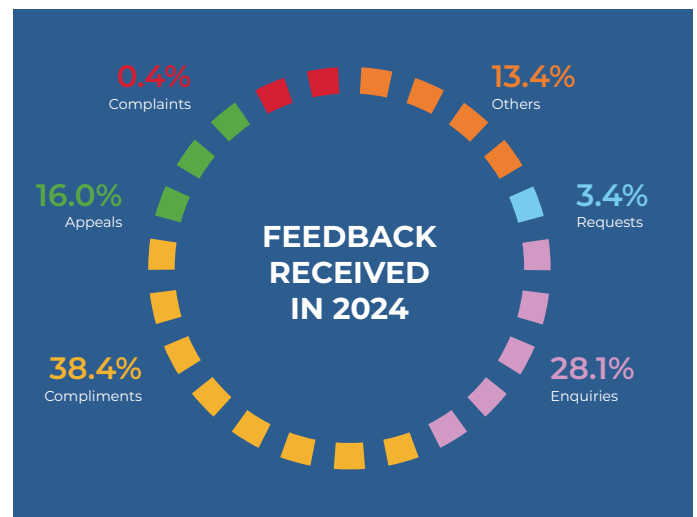
PUBLIC FEEDBACK REPORT

In 2024, the SPF received a total of 140,742 feedback from members of the public, a decrease of 19,132 (11.9%) compared to 159,874 feedback in 2023. The SPF values feedback from the public, which provides useful customer insights for our continued improvement. The SPF consistently reviews more convenient and efficient ways to deliver our services to our customers without compromising the customer service experience.

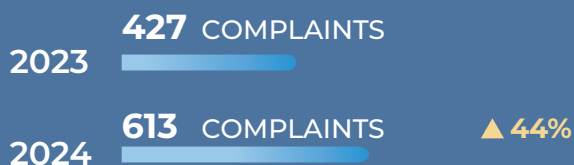
Feedback received in 2023 and 2024



Feedback was received mainly via email (32.7%) and was broadly classified under seven categories, namely Complaints, Compliments, Suggestions, Enquiries, Requests, Appeals and Others.



COMPLAINTS



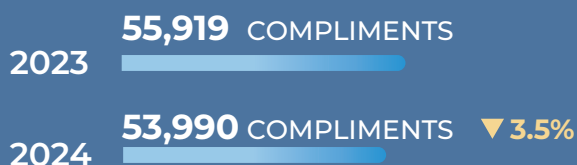
There were 186 more (44%) complaints against Police officers, increasing from 427 in 2023 to 613 in 2024. On the other hand, the number of substantiated complaints decreased by 19%, from 85 in 2023 to 69 in 2024.

ENQUIRIES



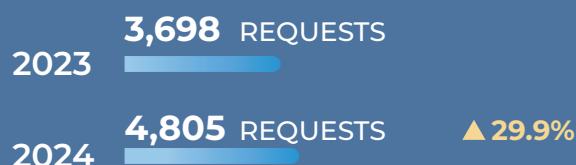
The SPF received 22,746 fewer (-36.5%) public enquiries, from 62,236 in 2023 to 39,490 in 2024. Most of these enquiries were about licensing and traffic-related matters, as well as the application process for Certificate of Clearance.

COMPLIMENTS



The SPF received 1,929 fewer (-3.5%) compliments, from 55,919 in 2023 to 53,990 in 2024. The bulk of the compliments come from customers' service experience at the Neighbourhood Police Centre service counters. Generally, members of the public were impressed with the professionalism of our Police officers and commended the officers for their professional attitude and behaviour.

REQUESTS



There were 1,107 more (29.9%) requests received from the public, from 3,698 in 2023 to 4,805 in 2024. Most of these requests were for updates on the investigation progress for Police reports lodged and for more frequent Police patrols in the neighbourhood.

SUGGESTIONS



There were 314 more (83.9%) suggestions received from the public, increasing from 374 in 2023 to 688 in 2024. Most of these suggestions were on crime prevention measures, as well as traffic-related issues such as enforcement against errant motorists.

APPEALS



There were 3,747 more (20.3%) appeals received from the public, from 18,500 in 2023 to 22,247 in 2024. Appeals against traffic summons comprised the bulk of the appeals received by the SPF. Other appeals included appeals to initiate or expedite Police investigations, as well as appeals for leniency in investigations.



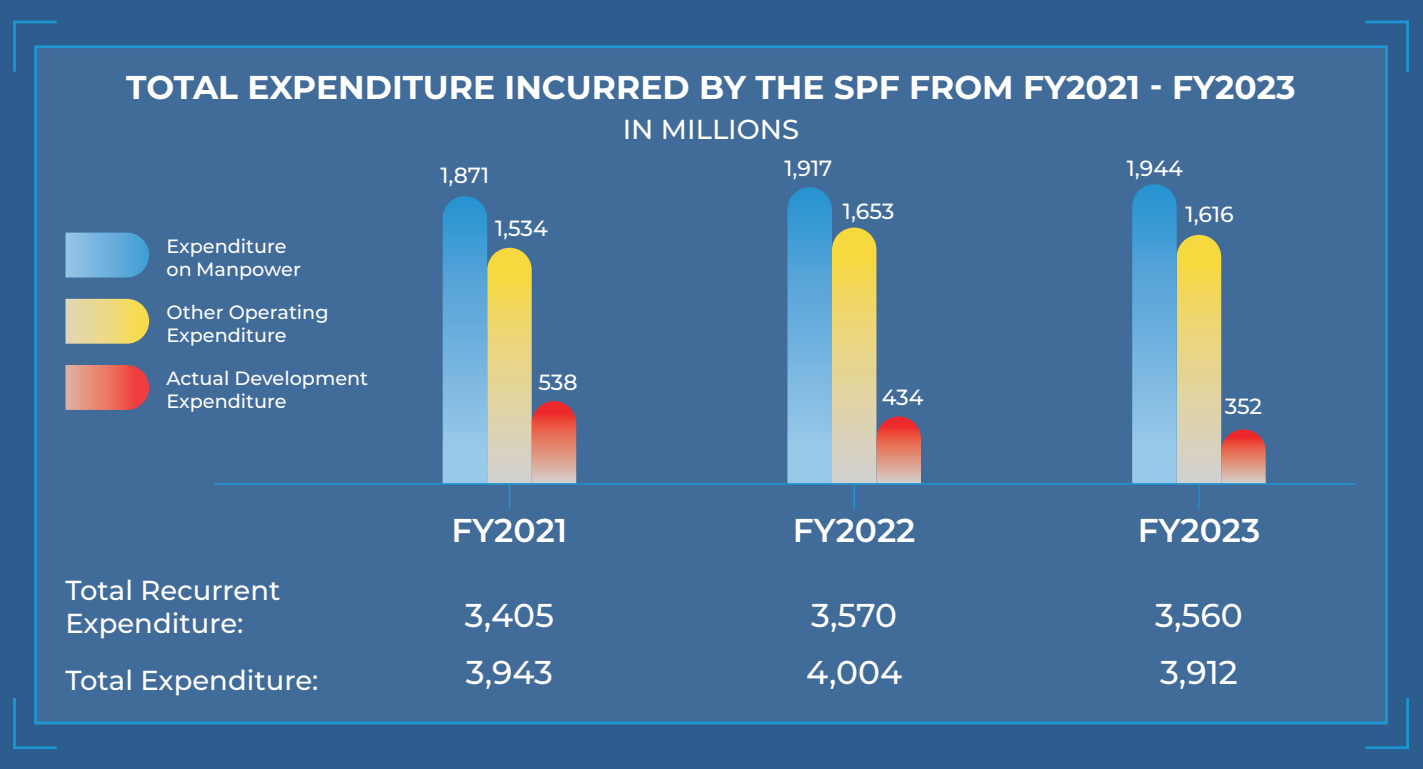
FINANCIAL REPORT

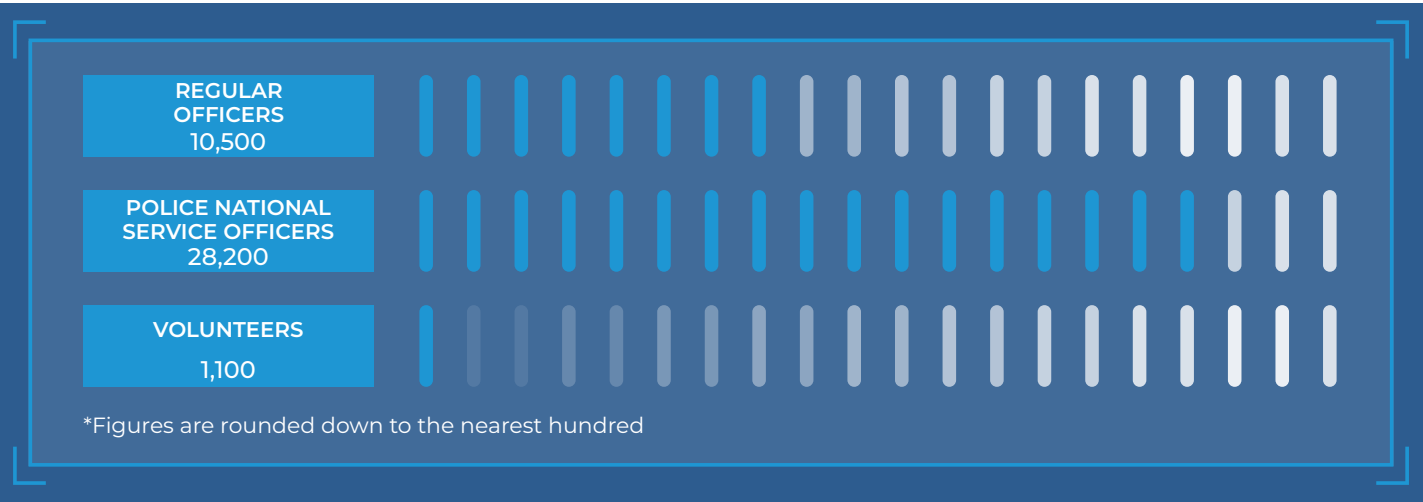

The total actual recurrent expenditure incurred in FY2023 was S\$3,560 million. It comprised EOM amounting to S\$1,944 million and OOE amounting to S\$1,616 million. The total actual development expenditure in FY2023 was S\$352 million.
