

A New Head Honcho to Fight **White Collar Crime**

On June 13 2015, Mr David Chew Siong Tai was appointed Director of the Commercial Affairs Department (CAD). Police Life was warmly invited into the office of the CAD's new director, who spoke about his new role, and some of the challenges he's coming up against.

efore joining CAD, Mr Chew wore two hats at the Financial & Tech Crime Division (AGC), one as the Senior Director of the General Commercial Crime Directorate, and the other as Deputy Chief Prosecutor.

Same Brush, Different Strokes

When asked to draw comparisons between his time at the AGC and his new role, he said, "As the Deputy Chief Prosecutor I was familiar with the training and development of the prosecutors and staff under me - including the annual ritual of staff ranking and assessments. So the work that I now do at the CAD is quite similar to the work I did as a prosecutor. However, it is different in that I am a member of a much larger organisation that operates in a larger eco-system of the Home Team."

The lessons learnt training and mentoring young prosecutors at the AGC are equally applicable to his work as Director CAD where he oversees the recruitment, training and development of young Commercial Affairs Officers (CAOs). His legal training has also been most helpful to guide the assessment of complex CAD cases and the exercise of police powers by the CAD. "I have been doing white-collar crime prosecutions for the last 10 years and have a practitioner's grasp of the legal issues surrounding such complex cases," Mr Chew added.

Familiar Faces

Mr Chew's previous time at the AGC means that he has already had useful insights into the CAD's processes, policy, and personnel, thus making his transition to the new role a smooth process. "I was attached to the CAD as the resident Deputy Public Prosecutor between June 2007 and April 2009. Coming back here after 6 years, I am gratified to see some of my CAD IOs take on the mantle of leadership as assistant directors and Heads of Divisions. The excellent team of Deputy Directors, Assistant Directors and Heads has been a great help in my acclimatisation process. Their commitment to the mission of the CAD to prevent, deter and detect financial crime was apparent to me as DPP prosecuting their cases and this same dedication to duty helped me ease into my new role as Director CAD," he remarked.

Mr Chew shared that he had become acquainted with the man he replaced at the helm of the CAD, Mr Tan Boon Gin, when they worked together on a high profile soccer match-fixing case in 2001. Mr Tan advised him that his new post requires him to not just have an eye on the legalities of the CAD's action but to also bring the law to bear on the policy objectives of the CAD and the Home Team.

What made Mr Chew decide to take up this post? A mixture of familiarity with the role of Director CAD and a chance to fight crime as part of the Police Force. "Having served under former Director CAD, Mr Tan Siong Thye in 2007-2008 when the CAD were investigating Ren Ci's CEO, the National Kidney Foundation's Richard Yong, and the Sunshine Group at about the same time, I became well aware of some of the challenges and heavy responsibilities of the post. I was also well-served as a prosecutor by the CAD and the Commercial Crime Section (CCS) teams in the Land Divisions. I took this appointment as an invaluable opportunity to be part of the financial crime fight team," he added.

Getting to Work

Mr Chew's immediate challenge is to keep up the momentum of change that his predecessor set

in motion. The CAD has, since 2013, been on a recruitment drive for CAOs. Mr Chew explained, "It takes at least two years to train and equip new CAD officers – the learning curve for CAD cases is very steep and the tsunami of e-commerce cases, along with floods of unregulated investment scams, makes it all the more urgent that we consolidate our manpower resources to get the new CAD officers up and running as soon as possible. This requires us to collaborate more closely with our stakeholders like the AGC, the Monetary Authority of Singapore, the Commercial Crime sections in the Land Divisions and the Home Team Academy to focus the training and deployment of our investigative resources."

White Collar, e-Dollars

As technology continues to advance, it has become more heavily embedded in our everyday activities. This has given the white collar criminals unprecedented levels of access to civilian lives and property. At the same time, the anonymity afforded by technology makes criminals elusive and difficult to bring to justice. Mr Chew believes that dealing with e-commerce enabled crime will prove to be a challenge during his time as Director CAD.

Discussing the emergence of such cases and the CAD's plan for action, Mr Chew said, "These crimes are easy to commit but hard to investigate and prosecute. Many of these crimes come from overseas and the money trail often leads to overseas accounts. The CAD has sought to deal with such crimes concurrently on three broad fronts: firstly to educate the public to protect themselves against e-commerce scams; secondly to investigate, arrest and prosecute the offenders to deter accused persons; and lastly to interdict the system of money-mules who are laundering the criminal proceeds."



The SOC for instance had its troops deployed at the NDP key activity areas. They were geared up and stood ready to respond to public Security and Public Order Incidents.


The Public Transport Security Command (TransCom) officers were deployed mostly at MRT stations in close proximity to the Padang such as Raffles Place, City Hall, Clarke Quay, Esplanade, Promenade, Bayfront and Marina Bay MRT stations. 
delivered a unique feel to the tunes played using the combination of both Chinese and Scottish instruments.

Uplifting a Family in Need

After finding a missing elderly man, Nanyang Neighbourhood Police Centre (NPC) officers went the extra mile to clean up the home he shares with his son.



Then Staff Sergeant (SSgt) Koh Seo Kuan attended to a case involving an elderly man who appeared to be lost on 16 July, she did not expect that it would lead her to a startling discovery.

Upon locating the missing 83-year-old Mr Lim, SSgt Koh escorted him back to his flat. It was then that she discovered the poor living conditions of the man and his family. Mr Lim's flat was filled with discarded items from cardboard scraps to plastic bottles and cockroaches were scurrying around the unit. Shocked by the state of the flat, SSgt Koh knew that the family required immediate assistance.

SSgt Koh found out that Mr Lim lived in the unit with his son and daughter while his two other sons were staying in another unit next door. It is believed that Mr Lim's children have mental conditions. The neighbours had also shared that the Lim family had been staying in the flats for over 20 years but their situation had deteriorated since the passing of Mr Lim's wife many years ago.

Upon learning of Mr Lim's case, Nanyang NPC's Community Policing Unit (CPU) Officer, SSgt Denyse Young, coordinated with various grassroots and relevant agencies to look into ways to assist the Lim family. Together, they engaged the Lim family to obtain their understanding and concurrence to clear and clean up the flats.

On 29 July 2015, NPC officers as well as representatives from the grassroots and officers from the Housing Development Board (HDB), Choa Chu Kang Town Council and the Ministry of Social and Family Development's Social Service Office



came together to organise a massive clean-up of Mr Lim's flat. Alongside workers maintaining the cleanliness of the Jurong estate, the officers helped clear and clean a portion of Mr Lim's living room.

On the efforts of her officers, Commanding Officer of Nanyang NPC, Superintendent of Police Rachel Soh said, "When our officers were first informed of the case, we saw the need to immediately help Mr Lim. We are happy to have been able to play a small part to make a positive difference to the family's life and I am proud of our officers for going beyond the call of duty to help the family in need."


Reaches Out to Foreign Workers in Need

Roll Out of Community Wardens Programme in Boon Lay and Tampines

Following the Amendment to the Police Force Act earlier this year, selected civilians will be able to exercise some police powers to help tackle noise complaints. The pilot Community Wardens Programme (CWP) trial commenced on 1 July for a period of 6 months. Selected participants were trained in basic law, mediation skills and also self-defence to ensure they can resolve noise complaints. Community Wardens are on duty from 8pm to 8 am nightly, and residents of the two wards will be able to use the CWP hotline 1800-WARDENS (1800-9273367) to reach Community Warden Call Takers (CWCT) who will be stationed at the Police Operations Command Center.

Commissioning Ceremony for Police Coast Guard Boats

On 21 July the Police Coast Guard (PCG) held the Commissioning Ceremony for the new Patrol Interdiction boat and the 2nd Generation PK Class High Speed Interceptor. The event was held at PCG headquarters at Pulau Brani and was graced by Deputy Prime Minister, Coordinating Minister for National Security and Minister for Home Affairs, Mr Teo Chee Hean, and Mrs Teo Chee Hean. The new boats are custom-designed and are better equipped to deal with the increasingly complex and difficult nature of maritime policing.

World Police Fire Games 2015

The 16th World Police & Fire Games (WPFG) was an excellent networking platform with police forces from around the world. 57 athletes from the Singapore Police Force (SPF) competed in 10 sports at the WPFG this year. The Games was held in Fairfax, Virginia, USA on 26 June 2015 to 5 July 2015.



ver 10 days, 12 000 athletes from police and fire departments all over the world competed in more than 60 sporting events against the best in their respective sports. It is the 3rd largest sports competition after the Olympics and Commonwealth Games in terms of the scale of Games.

Our SPF team turned in a remarkable performance and set a new record, bringing home 17 Gold, 10 Silver and 7 Bronze medals. This is a significant improvement over the previous record of 9 Gold, 13 Silver and 9 Bronze medals set in the 2013 Games held in Belfast, Northern Ireland.

For many of us, our commitment to the Singapore Police Force runs far deeper than others who consider their work "just a job". The Force, in turn, is constantly looking for ways to foster a sense of belonging and to provide welfare support for its precious officers.

The Singapore Police Retirees Association (SPRA)

n 17 November 2000, a Pro-tem Committee was elected and retired Deputy Assistant Commissioner of Police Mr L Thambiah, became SPRA's first President. Assisted by the late Superintendent of Police Ang Chiang Teck and a team of SPRA members, the Association's objective was to build a society exclusively for SPF retirees.

Three years later, on 23 October 2003, the Association was finally given the approval to operate as a society from the Registrar of Societies. Then Commissioner of Police Khoo Boon Hui officiated the historic launch and the first General Meeting on 26 March 2004.

Now in its 12th year, the SPRA is located on the 3rd floor of the HomeTeam NS Club House at Ah Hood Road. The association aims to promote social interaction and camaraderie among police retirees, maintain strong links with the SPF, to meet some of the welfare needs of police retirees, and further the financial interests and financial security of police retirees.

The Association has recently grown its presence in social media through its revamped Facebook page, which has become its centre of communications.

Retired Assistant Commissioner of Police Ms Ng Guat Ting is the current president of the SPRA. *Police Life* caught up with her to find out what her plans were to take SPRA into the next lap.

"My vision as the President of SPRA is to build on the success of our predecessors and develop SPRA into an organisation that upholds the dignity of police retirees. All of us have served the Singapore Police Force for least 25 years and some have even longer than 40 years of service. Therefore, the term "police retirees" must in itself hold a strong meaning – one that can conjure the image of a community that has contributed their prime of life to build and maintain a safe and secure Singapore. One manifestation of that image is the value of the SPRA membership card. We will build that value.

Next is how, we as a community, embrace the hard truth that our body and mind will be deteriorating over time. In this regard, SPRA can help by transforming itself to provide additional service of support to us and our families.

We are working in collaboration with the HomeTeam NS Club House to organise gatherings for all retirees. There are plans to hold a poolside dinner in November. We look forward to having many retirees to join us at this event.

Collectively through SPRA, we believe that we can build a strong community of ex-policemen and women; ready to help each other along in our golden years."

Youth-Focused Neighbourhood Watch Zone Initiatives Nabs Gold Mr Tan Teng Hong, Colin



The youths of the east in Singapore were the focus of award-winning community projects to help detect and deter crime. Neighbourhood Watch Zones (NWZ) in Pasir Ris and Bedok South are two gold award winners for successful projects that promoted a safer community for all; both touching on one of the most important demographic of Singapore, our youths.

Nipping Youth Delinquency in the Bud

he number of youths arrested for overall crime in Pasir Ris saw a decrease in 2013 but the concern of youth delinquency is a perennial one that will require constant community attention.

Even with the Pasir Ris Neighbourhood Police Centre taking the lead - cultivating close relationships with community partners such as MENDAKI and Youth GO! to engage youths - more could be done. The Operations Manager (OM) of Coral Secondary School, Mr Sam Meng Chong (Chairman of School Cluster E1) thought exactly that when he proposed joint patrols with community partners at various youth hangouts in Pasir Ris after school hours. That created the basis of the Youth Guardian Eastern-1 (YGE) initiative; by deterring youth congregation after school hours, the chances of youths falling prey to crime or becoming perpetrators of crime are greatly reduced, which in turn will lower the rates of youth delinquency.

All Secondary Schools from Cluster

E1 participated in the YGE project. The OMs of all respective schools pooled information such as background of the youths in their schools and other valuable insights that will help deal with the youths in the best possible way. Bi-monthly patrols were planned, ensuring that the timing and routes taken allowed for the greatest efficiency and effectiveness. Community partners who had expressed interest in engaging youths, such as MENDAKI, the Joint Operations (Security) of NTUC Club @ Downtown East, Neighbourhood Watch Group (NWG) members and also Grassroots leaders from 20 Residents' Committees (RC) were roped in to ensure that all bases were covered.

Since the implementation of the YGE project, the number of cases reported involving secondary school students in Pasir Ris has dropped from 30 in 2013 to 27 in 2014. The Pasir Ris NWZ received the Gold Award for their services rendered.

Anti-Bike Theft Murals

The other east-side success was the Anti-Bicycle Theft Murals Project, which was driven by prevalence of bicycle theft there. Though initially tackled by the Police through advisory notices and other community engaging programmes, it was the community who stepped up help bring the anti-theft message closer to home.

During discussions involving the Bedok South Police Officers, Citizen's Consultative Committee and RC (Ansar, Ping-An & Ping Yi Garden) Chairmen, a consensus was reached to engage the youths on the project. Mr Eddie Fong, Chairman of Ansar RC noted that part of the motivation behind engaging the youths was to have them channel their spare time to designing and executing the project during their holidays. "We needed some anti-theft messages and engaging the kids to draw in their own estate gives them a sense of ownership."

The Anti-Bicycle Theft Mural Project was launched with the objective of engaging youths to take part in a community effort in crime prevention. Notices about the project was posted up at lift landings by the Police and the RC went on to rope in youth participants to form teams of 4, each to submit designs for a wall mural. The best six designs would win cash prizes ranging from \$800 to \$200, as well as the chance to execute their works on the actual walls of some of the void decks in the area. During the actual painting of their works, Community Policing Unit (CPU) Officers visited the youths regularly to engage them on crime prevention

measures so as to help them better understand the impact their work will have on the community.

Upon completion of the murals, a road show was held on 17 January 2015 to spread the crime prevention measures for bicycle theft. The event was graced by the Guest-of-Honour, Minister for Manpower Mr Tan Chuan-Jin. Mr Tan Lauded the youths for their efforts in helping to prevent bicycle theft, and presented the prizes to the respective winners.

On the topic of bicycle theft, he said "The main problem for some is, when we secure our bicycles, we are using locks which are not very effective." Free U-Locks were given out at the road show to introduce a better lock alternative. In addition to the exhibition of the murals, a skit themed "Fight bicycle theft, you and me" was put on by the Bedok South Community Policing Unit Officers and the Citizen-On-Patrol members to encourage community collaboration with the police on the fight against bicycle theft. The event was received positively by the residents and succeeded in raising awareness on bicycle theft; some of the residents even wanted to see more murals like this in the coming year!

The event that had began from a simple idea of mural painting, had brought about not only crime awareness and prevention but also injected vibrancy into the lives of the residents of Chai Chee. The NWZ of the area received the Gold Award and was also featured by local media for a successful project.


