Safeguarding Singapore Every Day

Singapore remains one of the safest cities in the world. Singapore was ranked first in the Gallup's 2019 Global Law and Order Report for six consecutive years, with 94% of residents feeling safe walking alone at night in their neighbourhoods. The World Justice Project's Rule of Law Index 2019 ranked Singapore first for order and security. The Economist Intelligence Unit's Safe Cities Index 2019 also ranked Singapore first for personal security. Public confidence in the Singapore Police Force (SPF) remains strong. In our biennial Public Perception Survey comprising both locals and foreigners, more than 90% of respondents indicated that they trusted the SPF.

The SPF has continued to do well in keeping Singapore safe and secure. Our streets and homes are safer. Notably, motor vehicle and related thefts, robbery and snatch theft cases registered a 35-year low in 2019. Our road traffic situation has also improved. The number of fatal accidents and road fatalities in 2019 fell to a record low. The significant rise in scam cases led to an increase of 6.3% in Overall Crime in 2019. If we exclude scam cases, the total number of reported crimes would have decreased by 4.6% in 2019. More people are being scammed, even as we have intensified our public education efforts, tough enforcement measures and our partnership with stakeholders to fight against this global scourge.

Organisation Excellence - Singapore Quality Award with Special Commendation

The SPF was once again awarded the Singapore Quality Award with Special Commendation at the Business Excellence Awards in 2019. Clinching this award was a pinnacle achievement for us and a recognition of our robust management systems and processes.

Underpinning the SPF's excellence is the steadfast commitment and hard work of our officers. Their dedication to the SPF's mission, and their motivation for excellence and continuous improvement have made our achievements possible. On a daily basis, their sacrifice

and commitment towards safeguarding Singapore is the reason we can work, live and play in a safe environment.

Our officers are our most valued assets. We have continued to invest significantly in their development, training and well-being. I am heartened that our regular organisational health surveys have reflected that staff engagement and morale is at its highest in more than two decades.

Operational Readiness amid Complexity

Our operating environment remains dynamic and we will face more complex challenges. We have continued to strengthen our public security and public order capabilities. We have deployed more In-situ Reaction Teams to more locations with a high footfall to swiftly neutralise any armed threats. The level of equipping for our frontline officers has also been progressively enhanced to deal with heightened security threats.

The Centre for Protective Security (CPS) became a department under the SPF after the Infrastructure Protection Act (IPA) came into force. CPS' roles include enhancing the protective security standards of critical infrastructure and high profile developments, and implementing various initiatives to help transform the security industry, including building protective security capabilities of various stakeholders.

To fight scams, we have set up the Anti-Scam Centre and dedicated specialist teams to tackle e-commerce fraud and transnational commercial crimes. We will keep up our public education efforts as we strengthen cooperation with financial institutions and foreign police forces to enhance crime prevention, enforcement and investigative efforts.

Riding the Digital Wave

The SPF continues to leverage technology for better operational outcomes. We are increasing the use of Unmanned Aerial Vehicles (UAVs) and robots to support police operations. The Sky Aerial Response Command (SkyARC) is the SPF's mobile UAV response force

and its advanced aerial surveillance capabilities can livestream aerial situational images and videos back to the Police Operations Command Centre to enable better sense-making and operational responses. In the near future, we can look to greater operational efficiency when the SPF embarks on trialling UAV systems that will allow autonomous flight and remote control from a command centre. The enhanced Multi-purpose All Terrain Autonomous Robot (M.A.T.A.R.) 3.0 now has a tethered UAV, which will also provide enhanced situational awareness for frontline commanders and enable them to make better decisions and operational responses.

Technology has also enabled us to modernise police services with innovative and mobile solutions, where various new technologies are being introduced to enhance operational effectiveness, efficiency and customer experience to the public. Self-help kiosks and Found Property Drop Boxes at service counters now allow the public to conveniently lodge police reports electronically and hand over found properties to the Police respectively. The redesigned Neighbourhood Police Posts have tech-enabled systems to enhance the provision of police services to the public. We also revamped our Electronic Police Centre and increased the number of online services for the public.

We also intensified the use of technology in the area of training. The Tactical Boat Handling and Firing Simulator system deploys cutting-edge virtual simulation technology to enable our Police Coast Guard officers to practise their tactical manoeuvres and test their response skills towards a range of customisable training scenarios. Compulsory simulator training has also been introduced at driving centres to provide learner motorists a safe and realistic environment to practise defensive driving and to inculcate good driving habits at the onset.

One with the Community

Public trust is an important cornerstone of successful policing. Our community policing strategy has helped us build close partnership with the community over the years. We do not take this hard earned trust for granted. We will continue to put every effort into maintaining and deepening the public's trust in us.

In 2019, about one in four arrests involving selected major offences such as outrage of modesty, robbery and housebreaking, were made with the help of the public. The Police presented 144 public spiritedness awards to some of these members of the public. We are deeply appreciative of the public who have helped us in keeping Singapore safe.

We continue to explore ways for the community to be involved in co-creating a safe and secure Singapore. In 2019, we introduced the Riders-On-Watch scheme to encourage commuters to help fight crime on the public transport. We are encouraged that this initiative has drawn more than 40,000 volunteers within seven months of its launch.

Woodlands Division, the seventh Police Land Division in Singapore, was officially opened in March 2019 to better serve the needs of residents and businesses in the northern parts of Singapore. It is the first Police Division to introduce redesigned workflow processes and

tech-enabled systems to deliver more efficient services to the public, such as shorter waiting times as well as enabling more privacy and comfort.

In partnership with the Ministry of Social and Family Development, the SPF developed the Home Team Community Assistance and Referral Scheme (HT CARES) that allows the investigation officers to directly refer offenders who are in need of social support to social welfare officers deployed within the Police Division. We hope this early social intervention programme will help to reduce the rate of recidivism by preventing crime upstream.

Commemorating 200 Years of Policing in Singapore in 2020

In 2019, we commemorated 70 Years of Women in Policing. We paid tribute to past and present generations of female police officers who dedicated themselves to keeping Singapore safe and secure.

In 2020, we commemorate 200 years of policing in Singapore. It is a significant milestone for us. Our policing journey began in 1820. 200 years on, we have evolved from our humble beginnings of only a 12-man team and grown from strength to strength. What has remained constant is our dedication to serving the people and always striving to be a Force for the Nation.

The SPF is today a modern professional police force of more than 15,000 strong, safeguarding one of the safest cities in the world. Where we are today and who we are now as a Force is the result of two centuries of hard work, dedication and sacrifice by generations of officers who have laid a strong foundation for us to build on. The community has also been an integral part of us. They trust and support us, and work together with us to help make these achievements possible.

Our Fight against COVID-19

With the unprecedented COVID-19 outbreak, the operational demand on the SPF has intensified in support of our nation's battle against the pandemic. Our work of maintaining law and order has taken on a new dimension. Beyond day-to-day policing duties, our officers stepped up in areas such as contact tracing, supporting dormitory operations, securing government quarantine facilities and enforcing circuit breaker measures. I am proud of the professionalism, selflessness and courage that our officers have shown in the face of adversity. As one SPF, we will continue to stay united and strong with the nation in this protracted fight against COVID-19.

Our Commitment

The SPF has a strong foundation and is in a good position to tackle the challenges ahead. Even as we progress, we must ensure our fundamentals do not change. The rule of law must prevail and our officers must continue to remain steadfast in our core values. The SPF will continue to partner the community and deepen the trust.

I would like to express my deepest appreciation to all officers, volunteers, partners, stakeholders and the community for working together to make Singapore the safest and most secure home for all of us.

Strengthening

Operational Capabilities

As the challenges of policing become increasingly complex, the Singapore Police Force (SPF) continues to anticipate and develop strategies to respond to operational threats. Over the past year, the SPF continued to build its suite of counter-terrorism capabilities and harnessed technology to augment frontline operations. These capabilities have helped to maintain a high level of operational readiness for swift and effective response to contingencies. To maintain an edge over the evolving threats and to continue safeguarding Singapore, the SPF focussed on:

Striving for greater

Strengthening

OPERATIONAL EXCELLENCE

In ensuring Singapore's safety and security, the SPF continued to enhance its operational excellence in 2019 through understanding the needs of frontline officers and equipping them with the essential skills and training.

Securing Major Events

In 2019, the SPF upheld safety and security at several major events. Of particular note was the bicentennial edition of the National Day Parade (NDP), which saw a turnout of 27,000 spectators including foreign dignitaries such as the Sultan of Brunei, the President of Indonesia and the Prime Minister of Malaysia. The planning and execution of the security operations for 2019 NDP was by far more complex than any regular parade. Held at the Padang, security and traffic management for the performers and mobile column was particularly challenging given the large area of operations within the densely built-up area. Besides having to accommodate special security arrangements for the mobile column, the SPF also had to ensure that all security measures were carefully laid down to safeguard the event that was witnessed

by foreign dignitaries present. Even as the parade came to an end, the SPF's security operations continued as the mobile column made its way to five heartland locations for an extended National Day celebration. The extensive planning and seamless ground execution by the various SPF units resulted in yet another successful mission.

Enhancing Response to Public Order and Public Security Incidents

The Emergency Response Teams (ERTs), with their higher firepower and specialised training, serve as a critical element of the SPF's frontline response to public security incidents. With the rollout of the final ERT cluster from Woodlands Division in December 2019, the SPF has reached full operational capability for the ERTs across Singapore. Their continued engagement with stakeholders, such as the shopping centre management, has also helped stakeholders shape their emergency response plans so as to be better prepared for public security and major public order incidents. This has helped the SPF to establish a common understanding with the stakeholders and customise its response plans to each location's terrain.

Operationalisation of In-situ Reaction Team (IRT) (Land Division (LD))



Since December 2017, IRTs from Protective Security Command have been deployed at various parts of Orchard Road and Marina Bay to enhance the SPF's response to public security incidents. IRTs conduct high-visibility foot patrols at various locations as a deterrent and serve as quick reaction forces to neutralise armed threats and act as a show-of-force to deter terror attacks.

To better mitigate security threats, additional IRTs from the Police LDs have been formed. Since 1 December 2019, these additional in-situ forces have been deployed at pre-identified landmark areas where there are large crowds. The scaling of the IRT concept has widened the in-situ security coverage at such critical areas, and will continue to be expanded over the next few years.

New Buildings, Greater Efficiency, Better Service

Furthering the SPF's transformation journey is the operationalisation of the new Geylang Neighbourhood Police Centre (NPC) on 30 November 2019. Building on the enhanced features and services of Woodlands West NPC, the new Geylang NPC features redesigned workflow processes such as a triaging system for report lodging and is equipped with tech-enabled self-help kiosks to enhance the provision of police services to the public. These changes have allowed police officers to better serve members of the public, while reflecting the SPF's drive for continual improvement.



Unmanned Aerial Vehicles (UAVs): A New Operational Frontier

The SPF is constantly seeking new ways of harnessing technology to complement and enhance the effectiveness of its operations. In April 2019, the SPF rolled out trials for the Sky Aerial Response Command (SkyARC) vehicle. The SkyARC provides a situational aerial picture that will support the SPF's sense-making capabilities and tactical deployment. Equipped with different classes of UAVs and payloads to suit different operational terrains, the SkyARC has a centralised command and control and fleet management system to enhance situational awareness for better operational responses.



Partnership is Key in Fight against Crime

On 15 October 2019, the SPF partnered the National Crime Prevention Council and public entertainment (PE) outlets at Boat Quay, Clarke Quay, Marina Bay and Sentosa to launch the second iteration of the Smart Clubbing Campaign. While the inaugural launch in 2018 promoted smart and safe clubbing behaviours, the second iteration focussed on promoting a safer and more secure clubbing environment by highlighting common crimes such as outrage of modesty, theft and violent crimes in PE outlets, and providing useful crime prevention advisories against such crime.



As part of public education efforts, the SPF has also actively engaged a wide range of crime prevention channels, from print and social media, radio and television to out-of-home media and advertising spaces on popular online shopping platforms. For example, the Police circulated the 2019 'Smart Clubbing' video featuring local artiste Ms Julie Tan

on social media platforms such as YouTube and Facebook, achieving combined online traction of more than 700,000 views.



Through community partnerships, the SPF has been able to keep crime in check. The SPF will continue to explore and strengthen its community partnership initiatives to achieve mission success.

OPERATIONAL READINESS

The SPF is constantly reviewing and developing operational plans to maintain its edge in the ever-evolving operating environment. These plans are regularly validated and exercised, allowing officers to learn through experience and ensuring that they are ready to face any situation. The SPF is committed to developing and training our officers to ensure that they are well prepared and well equipped to carry out their duties effectively.

Investing in Training

The strong link between SPF's operations and training fraternities (Ops-Training Loop) remains a fundamental pillar for maintaining both operational readiness and training relevance. In 2019, the SPF continued enhancing its training capacity by introducing diverse methodologies and learning platforms to achieve better operational outcomes. Continued enhancements made to training facilities at the Home Team Tactical Centre and Home Team Academy (HTA) have also allowed for more effective training and increased training time. The SPF has worked with the HTA to use the Home Team Simulation System to run Public Order Command Post Exercises with the Land Division Commanders to enhance their decision-making and readiness in dealing with public order incidents.

Preparation through Large-scale Exercises

The SPF conducts numerous exercises yearly to raise our officers' operational readiness and hone



their capabilities in responding to public security and public order incidents. One noteworthy large-scale event is the Public Security Ground Deployment Exercise 2019. This was a joint islandwide exercise with the Singapore Armed Forces (SAF) involving more than 900 SPF and SAF officers, and was part of the continued efforts by the SPF and the SAF to test and validate multi-agency response plans in the event of terrorist attacks.

A large-scale Public Order Ground Deployment Exercise was also held to validate the SPF's public order plans and preparedness, as well as identifying operational lessons and issues. More than 700 SPF officers were involved in the exercise, which was designed specifically to test Police's inter-operability with external agencies in public order incidents.

Key Partnerships Enhance Inter-operability

To enhance inter-operability, frontline SPF officers also underwent joint training with the Singapore Civil Defence Force (SCDF) and the SAF as part of the First Responders' Refresher Training Courses. Scenarios practised during joint training included performing facilitated rescue operations with the SCDF during a public security incident, and responding to security

incidents while on joint patrol with the SAF in times of heightened security threat.

DEVELOPING OPERATIONAL CAPABILITIES

Besides training and equipping our officers, the SPF constantly develops its capabilities to capitalise opportunities, surmount threats and stay ahead of adversaries. This involves working with the global policing fraternity, trialling concepts, and scaling up successful ideas. Such efforts are key to building a future-ready police force.

Autonomous Robots and M.A.T.A.R.

Robotics technology is an area that the SPF has been exploring to enhance and support our frontline officers in their daily operations. Through such technology, the SPF aims to enhance the overall operational efficiency of our officers by automating routine tasks and enabling our officers to focus on higher-value police work, such as crime prevention, deterrence and detection.

Progress on this front includes the deployment of specially customised robots to augment ground patrol at large-scale, high-level security events and streamlining work processes through



robotics automation. The Multi-purpose All Terrain Autonomous Robot (M.A.T.A.R.) was the first SPF patrol robot to have its entire platform and technologies designed and produced entirely in Singapore. Operational trials of the M.A.T.A.R. 2.0 at NDP 2018 and the robot's further deployment at NDP 2019 have allowed the design of M.A.T.A.R. to be further optimised. The SPF worked closely with industry partners and research institutes to develop two variants of M.A.T.A.R. 3.0; one featuring a Pan-Tilt-Zoom camera on a telescopic mast, the other featuring an integrated tethered UAV. These robots will continue to be deployed at major events to support our frontline officers in their daily operations.

To further our progress in the application of robotics technology, the SPF has been working closely with the Home Team Science and Technology Agency, industry partners and research institutes to develop and trial several other robotics prototypes.



PolCam Network Matures

Building on the proven effectiveness and public support of Police Cameras (PolCam), the SPF has installed another 10,500 cameras under the PolCam 2.0 initiative. Since 2012, our PolCam network has greatly aided investigations and contributed to solving more than 3,700 cases.

Infrastructure Protection Act

The Infrastructure Protection Act (IPA) is a key legislative enabler in the SPF's counter-terrorism strategy. To support the implementation of IPA which was effected in December 2018, the Centre for Protective Security (CPS) was established as a Staff Department of the SPF on 1 April 2019. CPS aims to be a centre of excellence in protective security, with a mission to enhance protective security standards in Singapore. It serves as the Government authority for protective security advice, training and regulation. It also administers the IPA to ensure compliance of building security regulations according to the Act.

SAFEGUARDING TODAY FOR A BETTER TOMORROW

Amid an ever-evolving policing landscape and operating terrain, the SPF continues to place a premium on developing our capabilities, leveraging technology and updating the way we work in order to be constantly prepared for future challenges while safeguarding Singapore every day.



Maintaining Operational Excellence

through Investigation and Intelligence

Deputy Commissioner of Police (Investigation & Intelligence) Concurrent Director Criminal Investigation Department The strong and effective teamwork between the investigation and intelligence fraternities have ensured that the Singapore Police Force continue to achieve another year of mission success in 2019. The effectiveness of our investigations has forced criminals to shift away from confrontational crimes as such cases are solved swiftly through the joint efforts of the investigation and intelligence fraternities. Singapore's streets are safer as confrontational crimes have fallen significantly in 2019, with 179 days free of snatch theft, robbery and housebreaking. The same year registered a 35-year low in robbery, snatch theft, and motor vehicle and related thefts. It is also notable that the Special Investigation Section of the Criminal Investigation Department (CID) maintained its 100% crime-solving record in murder cases.

While there was an increase of 6.3% in Overall Crime due to a spike in scam cases, from 33,126 cases in 2018 to 35,209 cases in 2019, Singapore remains one of the safest cities in the world as it ranked first for the law and order index in the 2019 Gallup Global Law and Order report. Singapore is also ranked top internationally for effective investigations under the World Justice Project Rule of Law Index.

The investigation and intelligence fraternities will continue to collaborate closely to maintain operational excellence and to enable the SPF to fight crime effectively and efficiently in the constantly evolving criminal landscape. To this end, various initiatives were implemented as part of the Force's investigation transformation efforts to bolster its crimefighting capabilities.



CLOSE COLLABORATION BETWEEN INVESTIGATION AND **INTELLIGENCE FRATERNITIES**

The timely resolution of high-profile cases and the swift arrests of the perpetuators highlighted the strong crime-solving capabilities of the investigation and intelligence fraternities, which are critical to preserving public trust in the Police.

In August 2019, the arrest of three men involved in the Ang Mo Kio goldsmith robbery demonstrated the effectiveness of the fraternities' coordinated

The investigation and intelligence teams also worked together to mount several large-scale enforcement operations to suppress syndicated crimes. The CID, with the support of PID and Special Operations Command (SOC), conducted an operation last July to bust an illegal betting syndicate. This resulted in the arrest of 38 persons for their involvement in organised crime and remote gambling activities, and the seizure of more than \$1.7 million in cash in addition to luxury watches.

Continuous pressure was applied on crime syndicates as 2019 saw a string of islandwide enforcement operations throughout the year. Officers from CID and the seven Land Divisions mounted a series of enforcement operations to tackle unlicensed moneylending syndicates, leading to the arrest of 1,219 persons. In another

similiar collaboration, 2,490 female foreigners and 119 vice abettors were arrested as part of a successive spate of anti-vice enforcement operations. To stem the tide of increasing scam cases, CAD and the Land Divisions aggressively mounted numerous operations and arrested 1,040 scammers and money mules.

In addition, the CID worked closely with the Singapore Customs to stem the flow of imitation products into Singapore. In one of the operations, CID and Singapore Customs intercepted 200 sets of counterfeit perfume and cosmetics products. They also discovered another 17,440 imitation beauty products - valued at \$880,619 - during subsequent raids of the consignees' stores.

The relentless pace of enforcement operations sends out a strong deterrent signal to syndicated criminal groups in Singapore and demonstrated the SPF's strong determination to take tough action against those who break the law.

FIGHTING TRANSNATIONAL CRIME

The SPF's tough enforcement measures have forced crime syndicates to bring their operations

overseas. The connectivity offered by the Internet and the ease of global financial flows have inevitably facilitated the extension of their criminal activities into Singapore while operating from offshore bases. Nevertheless, the SPF continued to fight transnational crimes by building meaningful partnerships with its overseas counterparts.

In 2019, officers from the Commercial Affairs Department (CAD), Royal Malaysia Police, Hong Kong Police Force and Macau Judiciary Police conducted a joint police operation to bust an international love scam criminal ring in Malaysia, which had cheated victims of \$5.8 million through 139 cases of Internet love scams.

Building investigation and intelligence capabilities has been a linchpin of the SPF's efforts to keep abreast of emerging policing challenges and to tackle the increasingly complex criminal landscape.

A specialised nerve centre to deal with reported scam cases has managed to recover 35 per cent or about \$3.7 million in victims' losses since it was set up last lune.

yesterday, police revealed that so r, 3,312 reports involving total sses of \$10.6 million have been rerred to the Anti-Scam Centre unrr the Commercial Affairs Departent.

Following the reports, the centre managed to freeze 2,600 bank accounts suspected to be involved in scammers' operations to recover some of the losses.

Previously, the process would have taken about two weeks, leading to a 4 per cent to 8 per cent recovery rate, said the officer-incharge of the centre, Assistant Superintendent Teng Chin Hock.

With the rise in scam cases in recent years, the Anti-Scam Centre (ASC) was set up in June 2019 to disrupt scam syndicate operations through the centralisation of anti-scam enforcement efforts and consolidation of support from strategic stakeholders. The ASC is capable of taking swift actions to freeze bank accounts suspected to be used by scammers and help victims recover their losses. In the first six months of its establishment, the ASC froze more than 3,130 bank accounts and recovered close to \$3.75 million. As new Internet banking services such as PayNow has become a widely accepted mode of financial transaction, the ASC also collaborated with the Association of Banks in Singapore to employ robotic process automation to process PayNow screening requests. This allows investigators to track down scammers quickly, which helps in preventing others from falling prey to scams.

Leveraging its data analytics capabilities, PID continues to build new solutions to improve work processes and expedite heavy data crunching for investigations. Applying visual analytics to financial investigations, PID has worked closely with CID to develop dashboards that present bank transactions in a format that helps officers to quickly identify suspicious transactions or account holders. With this capability, investigators would be able to better focus their investigations on high-priority targets. In the area of scam-fighting, PID continues to apply various text analysis techniques through coding to detect new scam modus operandi and surface useful leads to the CAD Anti-Scam Centre. The comprehensive data analysis and surfacing of actionable leads allow investigators to fight scams efficiently and effectively.

As PID's capabilities in data analytics and related technologies have matured, PID has also worked with the Land Divisions to roll out an intelligence portal hosting crime analysis dashboards. This development provides frontline officers at the land divisions with quick access to enriched crime statistics and information, which allows them to derive insights into crime data to tackle crime effectively.

To enhance forensic investigation capabilities, CID acquired a commercial footwear database containing more than 50,000 footwear outsole imprints from major commercial brands. With this system, investigation officers are able to obtain real-time comparison of footwear prints, allowing them to quickly draw linkages between crime scenes and suspects.

To reduce recidivism caused by latent social problems, CID piloted the Home Team Community Assistance and Referral Scheme (HT CARES) at Bedok Division. Offenders with criminogenic social needs are triaged by a CARES officer stationed at Bedok Division, and subsequently





referred to appropriate social agencies to receive assistance. HT CARES has contributed to a meaningful reduction in reoffending behaviour as it addresses the root social causes of criminal behaviour.

ENHANCING TRAINING, DEVELOPING OFFICERS

The rapidly evolving criminal landscape demands that our officers continually enhance their capabilities and deepen their expertise. Through strategic partnerships with local and foreign agencies, the investigation fraternity imbues officers with knowledge and expertise to handle new and emerging crime.

To enhance the quality of investigation training, Home Team School of Criminal Investigation (HTSCI) worked with Singapore Polytechnic to embrace the flipped classroom pedagogy which leverages technology to deliver interactive e-learning contents to facilitate independent learning. HTSCI also worked with an external vendor to develop six e-learning courseware for integration into existing courses in October 2019.

Working with the Singapore University of Social Sciences (SUSS), HTSCI obtained accreditation for

the HTSCI milestone programmes, benchmarking its courses against a higher learning institute and opening up more development pathways for Home Team officers keen to pursue a degree at SUSS. HTSCI also collaborated with the National University of Singapore Law School to conduct a second run of the Graduate Certificate Programme in Criminal Law, which helps officers to develop specialist legal knowledge in criminal investigation.





The collaborations with higher learning institutes help to raise the professionalism of investigation courses managed by HTSCI.

In the realm of knowledge sharing, CAD collaborated with the Australia Financial Intelligence Unit to organise the Financial Intelligence Workshop for local enforcement units and domestic partner agencies such as the Corrupt Practices Investigation Bureau, Inland Revenue Authority of Singapore and the Monetary Authority of Singapore. The three-day course delivered useful knowledge on the use of financial intelligence in combating money laundering and terrorism financing activities.

Following the success of the Level 1 Financial Investigation Workshop in 2018, CID, CAD and HTSCI co-developed the Financial Investigation Intermediate Workshop to impart key financial investigation skills to officers dealing with commercial crimes.

The rise in cybercrime has led to a sustained push to equip officers with the necessary skills to investigate such cases. To this end, HTSCI organised the Cybercrime and Cyber Investigation Workshop, which was attended by 150 participants and featured professionals in the field of cybercrime investigation.

CID officers also attended overseas training courses to guard against transnational human trafficking networks from gaining a foothold in Singapore. One of these courses was organised by the European Union Agency for Law Enforcement Cooperation, where officers were taught to devise strategies to combat issues such as online sexual exploitation of children.

The amendments to the Penal Code with effect from 1 January 2020 will keep our legislation up-to-date by addressing emerging trends and offering enhanced protection for vulnerable victims. To ensure the effective enforcement of these legal amendments, CID and HTSCI had rolled out a series of trainings and briefings to the SPF trainers to impart the relevant knowledge to the ground officers.

In line with a more empathetic approach of handling investigations, HTSCI also jointly organised an "Interviewing Deaf Persons" workshop with the Singapore Association for the Deaf. The workshop equipped investigators with basic interview and communication skills to facilitate interactions with deaf persons encountered during investigations.



SUSTAINING OPERATIONAL EXCELLENCE

As part of a concerted effort to sustain operational excellence, the investigation and intelligence fraternities will continue to develop new crime-solving capabilities and deepen cooperation with overseas counterparts and strategic stakeholders to better fight crimes, which are increasingly transnational in nature.

Future-Ready Workforce

Senior Assistant Commissioner of Police Christopher Ng Director Looming terror threats, a shrinking workforce and the increasingly complex operating environment have given rise to new operational challenges and resource needs within the Singapore Police Force (SPF). Nevertheless, the SPF worked tirelessly over the past year to build a future-ready workforce and to remain as an employer of choice.



THE RACE TO SECURE TALENTS

To ensure that the right people are employed for the right jobs, the SPF expanded its recruitment outreach activities by introducing two new scholarship engagement events in 2019 - the SPF Scholarships Lunch Engagement and the Women in Policing Scholarships Reception.

SPF Scholarships Lunch Engagement

Held on 12 March 2019, the inaugural SPF Scholarships Lunch Engagement event provided opportunities for pre-university students to learn about the SPF Scholarships and a career with the SPF. To enable the students to hear first-hand

experiences and to address their queries, Director of Manpower Department, Senior Assistant Commissioner of Police Christopher Ng and current SPF scholars were also at the event to interact with the students.

Women in Policing Scholarships Reception

In 2019, the SPF celebrated 70 years of women in policing, acknowledging and highlighting the significant contributions of female police officers. To tie in with this significant milestone, the inaugural Women

in Policing Scholarships Reception was held on 3 June 2019 to engage female pre-university and university students. During the event, students had the opportunity to learn some Police Defence Tactics moves to experience what police officers go through during training, and to also pick up some basic self-defence skills. To enable them to gain an insight into investigation work, the students visited the Casino Crime Investigation Branch within the Criminal Investigation Department (CID). Deputy Commissioner of Police (Investigation & Intelligence) concurrent Director of CID, Deputy Commissioner of Police Florence Chua, along with other key female SPF leaders, were also at the event to interact and share experiences with the students.



CARING FOR OUR PEOPLE

Preparing for a Career Beyond the Force

In 2016, the Career Transition Office (CTO) was established to provide career transition support and services to retiring and retired police officers. Since then, the CTO has rolled out a series of initiatives benefitting not only the SPF's retiring officers but also those from other Home Team Departments.

In 2019, the CTO together with the Ministry of Home Affairs rolled out new milestone programmes and personalised coaching services for this group of officers.

Milestone Programme: Career Transition Induction Programme

The three-day Career Transition Induction programme is designed for officers who are starting or have just started their career transition journey, which begins five years before their compulsory retirement age. The programme helps officers to plan ahead by keeping them updated on the available career transition and Workforce Singapore schemes.

Milestone Programme: Career Transition Accelerator Programme

The Career Transition Accelerator (ACCEL) programme is targeted at officers who are in their last year of service or whose contract end date is nearing. It includes a three-day workshop and three sessions of one-to-one career coaching. The workshop will help to prepare officers for career transition, assist them with career planning,

and developing their resumes. The one-to-one career coaching sessions help officers generate and evaluate second career options improve their interview, networking and negotiation skills. Through the coaching sessions, officers will also be informed of job opportunities in the various industries and receive help in securing job interviews.

Personalised Coaching Services

Over and above the three sessions of career coaching provided under the ACCEL programme, officers are also provided with *Transition Dollars* (training funds given to retiring officers for career transition development) to take up additional one-to-one career coaching sessions at any time during their last five years of career transition journey.

DEVELOPING OUR PEOPLE

Building Science and Technology Expertise

The establishment of the Home Team Science and Technology Agency (HTX) gave rise to the need for the SPF to create a cadre of Ops-Tech uniformed officers to complement HTX in efforts to drive the development and adoption of tech-enabled capabilities in the SPF. Launched in December 2019, the Ops-Tech track aims to groom a cadre of Ops-Tech officers and develop their operational and technical expertise so that they can better perform their Ops-Tech role in the SPF. Besides having a structured career pathway to enhance their operational experience and exposure to technology, these officers can also embark on further studies to enhance their technical knowledge.

Strengthening National Service Leadership

To equip the SPF's National Service (NS) Command Appointment Holders (CAHs) with the relevant skills to perform the role of a Commanding Officer in Land Divisions and Specialist Units, the inaugural National Service Intermediate Leadership Course



(NSILC) 2019 was held from 24 to 28 June 2019 for 14 NS CAHs at the Home Team Academy.

The NSILC was jointly developed by the Police National Service Department (PNSD) and Training Command under the Training Transformation Framework. The course covered three broad aspects of policing, namely operational and frontline leadership, incident management, and contingency planning. In addition to the training, the participants also had the opportunity to interact with NS Commander Clementi Division and Director PNSD to learn about their experiences at two fireside chats during last year's NSILC.

OPTIMISING MANPOWER RESOURCES

To mitigate the challenges of a shrinking workforce and to meet the increasing operational demands, the SPF is constantly reviewing its manpower policies and practices, to optimise its manpower resources comprising regulars, Full-time Police National Servicemen (PNSFs), Operationally Ready Police National Servicemen (PNSmen), and Volunteer Special Constabulary (VSC) officers.

Raising the Retirement Age of Police Officers

The retirement age for police officers will gradually be raised from 55 to 58 by 2030. With

Singaporeans living longer and healthier lives, the increase in retirement age will allow the officers to stay active and engaged for a longer period. The SPF will also benefit from being able to tap on the valuable experience of this group of veteran officers. Regardless of the changes in retirement age, the SPF will continue to enhance career transition efforts to help officers secure a meaningful second career after their retirement.

Augmenting Deployment with PNSFs and VSCs

In 2019, the PDT course was expanded to include Physical Employment Status (PES) C PNSFs. Previously, only PES-Fit (PES A and PES B) PNSFs were required to go through the course during their Police Officer Basic Course training.

The PDT course will equip officers with essential operational skills for frontline duties such as the use of a baton, handcuffing techniques and some scenario-based training. Upon completion of the course, these PES C PNSFs will enhance the SPF's deployable frontline resources.

VSC officers have been instrumental in supporting the SPF's operations. To further support SPF and enhance VSC officers' deployability, the VSC HQ worked closely with the Police Operations Command Centre (POCC) to create deployment opportunities in the command centre. One of such opportunities was the deployment of



VSC officers as 'Emergency Communications Operators (ECOs)'. This new assignment started with a group of VSC officers from Tanglin Division. To prepare officers for their deployment as ECOs, selected officers would undergo an induction programme at the POCC prior to their deployment. The programme covered service quality training in emergency call taking and incident classification, as well as hands-on practice of the SPF's incident management system. Since July 2019, this group of VSC ECOs manning the '999' emergency hotline have clocked more than 1,000 hours.

ENGAGING OUR PEOPLE

Building Resilience

The need to prepare officers psychologically for disasters and major crises is key to strengthening the psychological resilience of SPF officers.

In 2019, the Police Psychological Services Division (PPSD) launched PPSD Outreach to prepare frontline officers for the stress and impact of

crises. PPSD Outreach equips officers with practical skills to counter possible ineffective responses during a crisis and informs them on the post-crisis resources that are available. Through PPSD Outreach, PPSD gained a better understanding of officers' concerns, which in turn led to developing new or adjusting existing programmes and tools to help enhance the resilience of our officers. Officers also gained greater awareness of the importance of psychological preparedness, further enhancing their psychological resilience.

Inaugural Volunteer Parade Contingent

In August 2019, 24 VSC officers volunteered their personal time to represent the SPF volunteer contingent in the first ever combined Volunteer Parade Contingent at the National Day Parade, together with the Singapore Armed Forces (SAF) and Singapore Civil Defence Force (SCDF) volunteers. Training started in March 2019 and was held over the weekends, often amid unpredictable weather conditions.





READY FOR THE FUTURE

The SPF's operating landscape is dynamic and it will continue to evolve as new challenges emerge. To be ready for future challenges, the SPF will remain steadfast in our commitment to invest in our people and to strive to remain an employer of choice. The SPF will spare no effort to build a future-ready workforce that can keep Singapore safe and secure.

Director Community Partnership Department Community partnership is a key pillar of the Singapore Police Force's (SPF) policing strategy. It enables the SPF to build and maintain a high level of trust with the community, which has been instrumental and growing in importance over the years to support the SPF's mission of preventing, deterring and detecting crime. Working hand in hand with our stakeholder partners, the SPF is always seeking out opportunities for members of the public to contribute more actively to Singapore's safety and security as part of our community-centric engagement approach.

REINFORCING SGSECURE WITH OUR COMMUNITY



SGSecure, the national movement to sensitise, train and mobilise the community to prevent and deal with terrorist attacks, was launched three years ago in 2016. The SPF, together with Home Team agencies, ministries and its stakeholders, has since conducted extensive engagement and outreach programmes in the neighbourhoods, workplaces and schools to raise the community's vigilance and emergency preparedness levels.

In addition to the Emergency Preparedness Days which had been conducted at the heartlands in all 89 constituencies, SGSecure efforts were also brought to the private estates in the form of Condominium Safety and Security Day towards the end of 2018. A multilateral partnership among various agencies such as the SPF, Singapore Civil Defence Force (SCDF), People's Association and Sport Singapore, the Condominium Safety and Security Day programme raises awareness of SGSecure and encourages the learning of emergency preparedness skills and knowledge amongst residents living in private estates. By the end of 2019, 40 Condominium Safety and Security Days were conducted. Efforts to increase engagement at condominiums will continue across various constituencies in 2020.

To further extend the SGSecure outreach efforts to the public, SGSecure roadshows were brought into the heartland shopping malls and town centres. The first SGSecure roadshow was held at Northpoint City Shopping Mall from 23 to 25 August 2019. These roadshows included live simulations of terror attacks, as well as interactive experiential booths and displays that allowed the public to practise "Run, Hide, Tell" and Improvised First Aid Skills (IFAS).





As part of ongoing efforts to sensitise and raise the vigilance and emergency preparedness levels of businesses and religious organisations, the SPF partnered various government agencies and stakeholders to organise industry-specific counter-terrorism seminars. At the end of 2019, 21 of such seminars have been conducted under the ambit of SGSecure.

The SPF also continued to collaborate with the SCDF and Safety and Security Watch Group (SSWG) partners to validate crisis response plans through Exercise Heartbeat. In 2019, six exercises were conducted.

Crowne Plaza Changi Airport, Thye Hua Kwan Hospital and Sultan Mosque, among other locations. That was the first time the exercise had taken place at a hotel, a community hospital and a religious institution. A concert scenario was also exercised for the first time, and was conducted at the Republic Polytechnic.

On top of workplace exercises, a total of 19 drills were also conducted at primary and secondary schools to familiarise students and staff with the lockdown and evacuation procedures during an armed attack.



ENGAGING OUR YOUTH

Delta League, a biannual youth engagement programme that aims to meaningfully engage youth and keep them free from crimes, held its 17th and 18th editions in June and December 2019 respectively. More than 200 teams with over 3,000 youth participated in the Under-15 Boys, Under-18 Boys and Girls Open category, rendering it the largest soccer league for youth in Singapore. Besides playing football, the youth are involved in activities designed to enhance their crime prevention awareness and to inculcate a sense of social responsibility, teamwork and discipline. In the December 2019 edition, the youth were also involved in the production of videos to educate others on scams and dangers of gangs. PARTNERSHIP WITH PUBLIC AND COMMERCIAL ORGANISATIONS

In the past year, the SPF utilised various engagement programmes and outreach platforms to forge partnerships with the community. Together with Singapore Nightlife Business Association and Singapore River One, the SPF formed the Public Entertainment Industry Safety and Security Watch Group (iSSWG) on 15 October 2019. This new iSSWG allows the SPF and the National Crime Prevention Council (NCPC) to work with the public entertainment industry to promote a safer and more secure clubbing environment for the public. Besides preventing crime, the new iSSWG also aims to counter terrorism by

enhancing public entertainment outlets' business and security processes.

Scam cases have been on the rise in recent years, affecting people from all walks of life. To raise public awareness of such crimes, the SPF has been constantly exploring new and innovative ways. Leveraging the rising popularity of anime and cosplay, the SPF participated, for the first time, in the J-Culture Festival, one of the largest Japanese sub-cultural festivals in Singapore, that was held in December 2019 to raise awareness of scams through the cosplay community.



Held at the Suntec Singapore Convention and Exhibition Centre, officers from Kampong Java Neighbourhood Police Centre set up an exhibition booth with the theme "Let's Fight Scams!". During the two-day event, officers engaged the participants in a slew of activities, including Virtual Reality games and scam quizzes. These games aimed to teach participants how to identify and protect

themselves from scams. To further our outreach efforts, officers from the SPF's Commercial Affairs Department and local cosplay influencers also held daily anti-scam talk shows on stage. During the talk show, the cosplay influencers shared their personal encounters with various types of scams, including impersonation scams and online purchase scams.

The SPF jointly organises the annual Hotel Security Awards Presentation Ceremony and Hotel Security Conference with the Singapore Hotel Association (SHA) and the NCPC. This event serves to recognise hotels and hotel staff who have made safety and security their top priority. In 2019, a record 99 hotels received the prestigious Hotel Security Award and a total of 283 hotel employees received Certificates of Commendation for their exemplary acts under the categories of Bravery, Vigilance and Honesty.

Enabling and Empowering Our Volunteers

The Citizens on Patrol (COP) volunteer scheme has been one of SPF's most successful community engagement and partnership programmes. In April 2019, the SPF celebrated the 20th anniversary of the COP scheme. As part of the celebrations, COP was rebranded. Its identity has been strengthened through a new logo and members were issued with a new standardised COP vest and a new identity card. An updated training package which addresses terrorism and new crime trends was also rolled out. As part of the SPF's efforts to leverage technology, a new volunteering platform that allows COP





members to coordinate and sign up for patrols more conveniently will be introduced on the Police@SG mobile application.

Further expanding the SPF's community partnership collaborations, the "Riders-On-Watch" (ROW) volunteer scheme was launched by the Public





Transport Security Command (TransCom) in July 2019 to encourage commuters to play an active role in keeping Singapore's public transport network safe and secure. ROW volunteers are the first to receive the latest crime information alerts affecting the public transport system from the Police via SMS. Such alerts enable them to keep a lookout for suspicious persons or activities and alert the Police should they spot any along their journey. Since the launch of ROW, there are now more than 40,000 volunteers.

In January 2019, the Volunteer Special Constabulary – Community [VSC (Community)] vocation celebrated its first anniversary. The roles of VSC (Community) officers were

showcased during a simulated terror attack scenario at the Waterway Point's SGSecure roadshow on 2 November 2019 – the first time VSC (Community) officers were featured in an exercise. As of 31 December 2019, there are 159 VSC (Community) officers, with the numbers growing steadily.

The high level of community partnership with the SPF is the fruit of many decades of efforts. While the SPF continually strengthens its community 'Force' through welcoming new volunteers, it is also equally important to recognise the contributions of existing volunteers in supporting the SPF's mission and vision. During the Home Team National Day Observance Ceremony on

1 August 2019, three SPF volunteers received the Minister for Home Affairs National Day Award 2019 (Home Team Volunteers).




CONCLUSION

Singapore Crime Situation





The year 2019 saw an increase of 6.3% in Overall Crime from 33,126 cases in 2018 to 35,209 cases. Three crime classes - Violent/Serious Property Crimes, Housebreaking and Related Crimes and Theft and Related Crimes - registered all-time lows.

The **crime rate**² **increased** from **587 in 2018** to **617 in 2019**, a rise of 30 cases per 100,000 total population. In terms of arrests, a total of 16,578 persons were arrested for **Overall Crime in 2019**, a **decrease of 3.7%** from the preceding year.

Crimes against Persons

Violent/Serious Property Crimes

- · Comprises mainly robbery and extortion cases.
- Robbery cases decreased by 22.2%, from 72 cases in 2018 to 56 cases in 2019.
- Robbery cases reported at all premises types registered decreases in 2019, with the largest decrease observed for common areas (-5 cases or -41.7%) and inside premises (-6 cases or -22.2%).

Housebreaking and Related Crimes

- Housebreaking cases registered a decrease of 8.8%, from 204 in 2018 to 186 in 2019.
- The decrease in housebreaking cases was mainly attributed to fewer break-ins at residential premises (-20 cases or -17.9%) and industrial premises (-6 cases or -54.5%).
- Decrease in this crime class was mainly recorded in possession of housebreaking implement or offensive weapons (-32 cases or -26.4%).

Theft and Related Crimes

- Offences include a variety of thefts such as shop theft, theft in dwelling, theft from motor vehicle, theft of motor vehicle, snatch theft and other thefts.
- Snatch theft and theft of motor vehicle registered all-time low with 34 cases and 88 cases in 2019 respectively.
- Decreases in this crime class were mainly in other thefts (-406 cases or -15.2%), theft from motor vehicles (-165 cases or -22.8%), shop theft (-161 cases or -4.5%) and theft from persons (-161 cases or 26.9%).

Commercial Crimes

- Comprises mainly cheating and related offences.
- The more significant scam types in 2019 were e-commerce scam, loan scam and credit-for-sex scam.
- E-Commerce scam increased by 648 cases (+30.0%) from 2,161 cases in 2018 to 2,809 cases in 2019.
- Loan scam increased by 805 cases (+83.2%) from 967 cases in 2018 to 1,772 cases in 2019.
- Credit-For-Sex scam increased by 532 cases (+99.8%) from 533 cases in 2018 to 1,065 cases in 2019.

Miscellaneous Crimes

- Comprises various offences, including affray, mischief, corrosive and explosive substance and offensive weapons act, vandalism, bomb hoaxes and bringing prohibited items into Singapore.
- Larger increases were seen in Computer Misuse
 Act (+524 cases or +43.4%) and causing hurt by
 act which endangers human life (+138 cases or
 +10.6%) and affray (+41 cases or +7.9%).

Outrage of Modesty

- Outrage of modesty cases decreased by 96 cases (-5.6%) from 1,728 cases in 2018 to 1,632 cases in 2019.
- Cases with known victim-culprit relationship decreased by 19 cases (-2.5%), and cases with unknown victim-culprit relationship also decreased by 77 cases (-7.8%).
- Increases were noted for cases at shopping malls (+16 cases or +14.7%).

Youths⁴ Arrested

A total of **2,546 youth offenders** were arrested in 2019 compared to **2,703** in 2018, a **decrease of 157 persons arrested**. Youth offenders accounted for **15.4%** of total persons arrested in 2019, compared to **15.7%** in 2018. Youth arrests are over-represented in terms of the proportion of youth population in Singapore⁵. The most common offences that youth offenders were arrested for were shop theft, cheating & related offences and sexual penetration.

Foreigners Arrested

A total of **4,402 foreigners** were arrested in 2019 compared to **4,489 foreigners** in 2018 **(-87 persons or -1.9%)**. Foreigners accounted for **26.6%** of the total number of persons arrested in 2019, **0.5 percentage points higher than 2018**. The three most common offences committed by foreign offenders were cheating and related offences, shop theft, and theft as a servant.



Public-Assisted Arrests⁶ For Selected Offences

1.9% POINTS

 In 2019, members of public contributed to the arrest of 436 criminals for selected major offences of murder, rape, outrage of modesty, robbery, housebreaking, motor vehicle theft and snatch theft. These public-assisted arrests accounted for 27.3% of the total arrests for these selected major offences, a decrease of 1.9 percentage points from 29.2% in 2018.

Cheating Cases Involving E-Commerce

 E-Commerce scam cases increased by 648 cases (+30.0%) from 2,161 cases in 2018 to 2,809 cases in 2019. Most of the cases involved victims who were cheated while buying or selling goods/ services online. The victims would either fail to receive the goods they paid for or the payment for the goods that they have shipped out.




Loan Scan

- Loan scam cases increased by 805 cases (+83.2%) from 967 cases in 2018 to 1,772 cases in 2019.
- This scam involved victims receiving loan offers either through WhatsApp or text messages, or coming across loan offers on online platforms like Facebook or Carousell. Culprits would then instruct victims to transfer money for the loan deposit or administrative fees.

Credit-For-Sex Scam

 Credit-For-Sex scam increased by 532 cases (+99.8%) from 533 cases in 2018 to 1,065 cases in 2019. This scam involved culprits befriending male victims through online media platforms before convincing them to buy gift cards in exchange for a meet-up, massage, sexual or escort services.

CONCLUSION



The road traffic situation improved in 2019, with fewer road traffic accidents compared to 2018. The number of fatal accidents and fatalities also fell to a record low.

The number of fatal accidents decreased by **4 cases (-3.3%),** from **120 cases** in 2018 to **116 cases** in 2019. The number of fatalities decreased by **7 cases (-5.6%),** from **124 cases** in 2018 to **117 cases** in 2019.




Figure 1: Number of Fatal Accidents and Fatalities (2015 – 2019)

Decrease in Number of Accidents Resulting in Injuries

The number of accidents resulting in injuries decreased by **24 cases (-0.3%)**, from **7,690 cases** in 2018 to **7,666 cases** in 2019. The number of injured persons decreased by **245 cases (-2.4%)**, from **10,018 cases** in 2018 to **9,773 cases** in 2019.




Figure 2: Number of Accidents Resulting in Injuries & Injured Persons (2015 – 2019)

Expanding Road Safety Outreach to the Community



As part of the Traffic Police's (TP) continued enforcement efforts, 12 new red-light cameras have been installed at islandwide locations as of March 2020, bringing the total number of red-light cameras to 252. Besides enforcement, TP also recognises the need for continued education and engagement with the community.



On 16 December 2019, simulator training was made mandatory for all learner motorists to create greater awareness on the top causes of accidents and how to avoid them.



Collaborations are also underway with Lion Befrienders Service Association and NTUC Health Co-operative Limited, to train elderly volunteers on the dangers of jaywalking and raise awareness on road safety measures. These elderly volunteers will help TP to reach out to more senior citizens and share relevant road safety tips with them.



A public version of the Road Safety Community Park (RSCP) game has also been introduced within "The Xplorer" application (for both Apple and Android users). The game allows members of the public to have fun exploring the various checkpoints within the RSCP while learning about road safety at each checkpoint.



Additionally, TP's online learning portal features educational videos on causes of accidents and information on traffic rules to allow members of the public to learn about road safety.



Road Safety is a shared responsibility. TP will continue leveraging the three-pronged approach of Education, Engagement and Enforcement, to make Singapore's roads the safest in the world.




Figure 1: Total Number of Feedback received in 2018 and 2019, with an increase of 9%




Figure 2: Breakdown of Total Feedback received for 2019

The SPF received 16,263 more (+31%) compliments, from 52,380 in 2018 compared to 68,643 in 2019. Generally, members of the public were impressed with the professionalism of our police officers, and commended the officers for their professional attitude and behaviour. With the roll-out of the Integrated Queue Management System (IQMS) at our Neighbourhood Police Centre (NPC) service counters, the public can now use the IQMS 'Smiley Faces' rating system to give their feedback and rate their service experience. In 2019, 90% of the customers who had provided their feedback through the IQMS 'Smiley Faces' rating system, had rated the services rendered as 'Very Satisfied' and 'Excellent'.




The total budget for the Singapore Police Force (SPF) comprises Recurrent Budget and Development Budget. The total Recurrent Budget consists of allocation for Expenditure on Manpower (EOM) and Other Operating Expenditure (OOE).

Actual Recurrent Expenditure and Development Expenditure for Financial Year (FY) 2018

The total actual recurrent expenditure incurred in FY2018 was \$\\$3,052 million. It comprised of EOM amounting to \$\\$1,846 million and OOE amounting to \$\\$1,206 million. The total actual development expenditure in FY2018 was \$\\$423 million.
