COMMISSIONER'S REPORT

The public continues to hold the Singapore Police Force (SPF) in high regard and has high trust in the Police. The SPF Public Perception Survey 2021 results saw improvement in several key areas. In particular, public trust in the SPF remained high, with more than 95% of respondents indicating that they trusted the SPF. This high level of public trust is the result of the dedication and hard work of all SPF officers, and the strong support from our volunteers, stakeholders and community partners.

With the resumption of more activities as we move towards a COVID-19 endemic nation, Singapore has seen an increase in road traffic accidents that resulted in fatalities and injuries in 2021, as compared to 2020. The figures are, however, lower than pre-COVID-19 pandemic levels. We will continue our efforts in public education, engagement, and enforcement to keep our roads safe.

In 2021, we saw a marked decrease in physical crimes, with theft, housebreaking and related crimes recording a 37-year low. We had 250 crime-free days from snatch theft, robbery and housebreaking, an increase of 48 days compared to 202 crime-free days in 2020. Scams contributed to an increase in the total number of reported crimes, making up 51.8% of Overall Crime, up from 42% in 2020. The number of reported scam cases increased by 52.9% to 23,931 cases in 2021, from 15,651 cases in 2020.

RAMPING UP OUR ANTI-SCAM STRATEGY

To tackle this scourge of scams, we reorganised our resources, and ramped up public education

and collaboration efforts with our private and public sector stakeholders, and community partners.

On 22 March 2021, the SPF consolidated all scamfighting units under the ambit of the Anti-Scam Division (ASD). The ASD and Police Land Divisions conducted 26 islandwide anti-scam enforcement operations in 2021, leading to the investigation of more than 7,500 money mules and scammers. The ASD also worked closely with banks to swiftly freeze more than 12,600 bank accounts and recovered more than S\$102 million based on reports received. They worked with telecommunications companies and online marketplaces to terminate more than 3,300 scam-tainted phone lines, submitted more than 17,300 WhatsApp accounts for termination, and removed more than 1,300 suspicious online monikers and advertisements.

As part of the Inter-Ministry Committee on Scams, the SPF's close cooperative efforts with other government agencies, banks, telecommunications companies, as well as digital and e-commerce platforms will strengthen our effectiveness at disrupting the scammers' operations. For 2021, 45 organisations, up from 17 in 2020, received the Outstanding Community Partnership Award for their commitment and contribution to detecting and preventing scams.

To improve public education, the SPF and National Crime Prevention Council (NCPC) have partnered with the Association of Banks in Singapore on various initiatives to educate bank customers, such as introducing an online quiz on scam prevention and sending out advisories to

customers to remind them not to share their onetime passwords with others. On 13 September 2021, the SPF and NCPC launched a new series of posters and videos under the anti-scam public education campaign "Spot the Signs. Stop the Crimes.", which focused on using real-life examples to build strong awareness and vigilance among the public on the tell-tale signs of scams.

To tackle transnational scams, the SPF has increased collaboration and joint operations with international law enforcement agencies. Throughout 2021, the SPF's joint operations with regional law enforcement counterparts crippled 16 transnational scam syndicates, leading to the arrest of more than 230 syndicate members.

The community plays a critical role in the fight against scams. I express my deepest appreciation to organisations, businesses, community partners and individuals for their strong support in our collective efforts to tackle scams.

ENHANCING CAPABILITIES TO BETTER SUPPORT OFFICERS

The SPF has continued to invest in enhancing our capabilities to better support officers despite challenging operational demands. On 1 April 2021, the Police Psychological Services Division was reorganised from a division of Manpower Department to a specialist staff department and renamed as the Police Psychological Services Department (PPSD). PPSD's new focus is to develop psychological expertise in the SPF. This is done through better deployment of resources to achieve organisational and operational excellence, and developing psychological competencies in our officers.

The SPF has also comprehensively reviewed the existing structure, systems, and processes for investigations to better support our officers and improve investigation work processes. One such area is to have tighter coordination between the investigation and prosecution of cases for better case outcomes. The SPF has worked with the Attorney-General's Chambers to set up the Office of the Public Prosecutor (OPP) at the seven Land Divisions and Traffic Police (TP) since July 2021. The OPPs facilitate access to guick and early advice by Deputy Public Prosecutors deployed at these units on cases of interest to aid Investigation

Officers in their investigations. Another area of improvement is in leveraging technology. CRIMES3 is a next-generation investigation case management system for Investigation Officers that is both agile and mobile. In December 2021, the SPF rolled out CRIMES3 at TP, with a full rollout planned for the second half of 2022. Officers can look forward to fully digitalised investigation papers (IPs), real-time tracking of cases with the AGC and having access to their IPs on the go.

EMPOWERING THE COMMUNITY TO BUILD A SAFER SINGAPORE

To empower more residents and stakeholders towards community safety and security, we launched the Community Watch Scheme (CWS) on 11 December 2021. The CWS has shifted our traditional geographical-based approach towards one that is interest-based, by allowing CWS members to have more flexible involvement in safety and security matters within their communities.

Creating a safer and more secure online community for all users is vital due to the growing concern over online crimes. The SPF launched the Online Industry Safety and Security Watch Group on 6 January 2021 to formalise a partnership with the Asia Internet Coalition, which will achieve a more effective and coordinated response to these threats.

The Volunteer Special Constabulary (VSC) marked its 75th anniversary with a virtual observance ceremony on 23 October 2021. The SPF recognises the significant role played by VSC officers, and I thank all serving and retired VSC officers for your commitment and selfless contributions to the Force and Singapore.

ONE WITH THE COMMUNITY

On 3 August 2021, Singapore witnessed a historic moment as a Parliamentary Motion was passed to commemorate and honour the SPF for our contributions to the nation over the past 200 years. This honour would not have been possible without the strong and continued support from our volunteers, partners, stakeholders and fellow Singaporeans. I would like to express my deepest appreciation to all of you, and to all SPF officers, past and present. I look forward to us working hand in hand, continuing to make Singapore one of the safest cities in the world.

PUBLIC TRANSPORT SECURITY COMMAND OFFICERS PROTECTING OUR PUBLIC TRANSPORT NETWORK AGAINST CRIME

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In 2021, even as the Singapore Police Force (SPF) continued to support the Whole-of-Government (WOG) effort in battling the COVID-19 pandemic, we continued to pursue Operational **Excellence, Operational Readiness, and Operational Development in our mission** to keep Singapore safe and secure.

OPERATIONAL EXCELLENCE

Despite the uncertainties brought about by the COVID-19 pandemic, the SPF maintained a high level of operational excellence in our enforcement and security operations and crime-fighting efforts, working closely with our partners and the community to ensure public safety.

BATTLING THE COVID-19 PANDEMIC

To mitigate the spread of the virus, the SPF worked closely with various government agencies to support safe distancing enforcement operations in various sectors. In 2021, the SPF oversaw the enforcement of Safe Management Measures (SMMs) at Massage Establishments (ME) and Public Entertainment (PE) outlets. Enforcement operations were conducted against nearly 3,000 PE outlets, nightlife establishments and MEs, resulting in the arrest of more than 470 persons.


SECURING MAJOR EVENTS

While some major events were allowed to resume, COVID-19 measures were still in place, which had corresponding effects on how security operations were conducted. The dynamic COVID-19 situation meant that event security operations had to be nimble and flexible in order to comply with SMMs while still ensuring adequate security for the events.

The National Day Parade (NDP) 2021 was one such major event affected by the dynamic COVID-19 situation. To ensure that NDP 2021 was held in safer conditions, the NDP was postponed to 21 August 2021, with a ceremonial parade held on 9 August 2021 instead. The SPF responded

instinctively with agility and worked closely with the event organiser and supporting agencies to adjust the security plans, ensuring that the events were held safely and smoothly on both days.

Immediately after the NDP, the SPF was involved in another major security operation for Vice President of the United States Kamala Harris' visit from 22 to 24 August 2021. Despite the intensity of these back-to-back security operations, our officers worked tirelessly, stood resilient and achieved mission success.




COLLABORATIONS IN FIGHTING CRIME

Even as Singapore remains one of the safest cities in the world and was ranked first in Gallup's Global Law and Order Report 2020, the SPF continued to step up its crime-fighting efforts to prevent, deter and detect crime in 2021. Working with the National Crime Prevention Council (NCPC), the SPF disseminated anti-scam advisories to the public through multiple platforms comprising online channels such as social media platforms, out-of-home spaces, as well as advertisements on television and radio. The SPF also continued with our pivot from physical crime prevention engagements through roadshows and house visits to online outreach activities, such as virtual engagements and 'live' social media sessions.

To respond swiftly to emerging crime concerns, the SPF collaborated with other government agencies and external stakeholders to develop strategies and implement action plans. This included working with NCPC to partner with the Association of Banks in Singapore (ABS) on various initiatives to educate bank customers, and training frontline bank staff to help customers spot signs of scam transactions. As part of the Inter-Ministerial Committee on Scams (IMCS), the SPF also worked with banks, telcos, digital and e-commerce platforms to combat scams by reaching out to consumers transacting on their online platforms. NCPC also collaborated with the Government Technology Agency (GovTech) to develop ScamShield, a mobile application which identifies and filters out scam messages





for iOS platform users. Since its launch in 2020, ScamShield has been downloaded by more than 225,000 users; filtered over 2.3 million scam SMSes; and blocked more than 14,000 suspected scam phone numbers. The Android version of the ScamShield app is slated for release in 2022.

The SPF also collaborated with NCPC, Land Transport Authority (LTA) and public transport operators to display crime prevention posters targeting outrage of modesty and voyeurism concerns at public transport nodes, as well as disseminating crime advisories to commuters on various digital platforms, such as LTA's MyTransport, SMRTConnect and SBS Transit's mobile applications.

ENHANCING OUR RESPONSE TO MENTAL **HEALTH CASES**

The COVID-19 pandemic saw an increased awareness of mental health conditions in society and highlighted the importance of a holistic approach in dealing with mental health issues. Recognising the role our frontline officers can play in handling mental health issues, the SPF worked with relevant agencies to train our officers so that they can respond more effectively to such cases.

In 2021, the SPF partnered with Agency for Integrated Care (AIC) to enhance our response to cases involving persons with mental health conditions. Officers were trained to recognise signs and symptoms associated with mental

health conditions, and to communicate more effectively with affected persons. In recognition of our initiatives and collaborations on the community mental health front, the SPF was presented with the Friends of Community Care Award 2021 by AIC.



PROTECTIVE SECURITY ENGAGEMENT **GROUP (PSEG)**

2021 saw the formation of the Protective Security Engagement Group (PSEG) under the Protective Security Command (ProCom). PSEG officers worked closely with premises owners and facilities managers to enhance awareness and readiness of protective security measures. Over the past year, PSEG actively engaged these stakeholders for briefings, joint patrols, and exercises. Since its operationalisation, PSEG has conducted 15 joint patrols, four exercises and eight security briefings involving more than 160 participants.

OPERATIONAL READINESS

To stay ahead in an ever-evolving operating environment, the SPF continued to refine and validate our operational plans, processes and training, ensuring that our officers always stand ready to keep Singapore safe and secure.

MAINTAINING OPERATIONAL READINESS **AMIDST COVID-19 PANDEMIC**

The SPF regularly conducts exercises to maintain and ensure a high level of operational readiness, validating our operational plans to deal with crime, terrorist threats and other contingencies. To overcome the challenges posed by the COVID-19 pandemic, policies and processes were also reviewed and strengthened to increase exercise effectiveness. The SPF adapted and redesigned exercises, ensuring officers' safety in line with prevailing pandemic measures. Physical predesignated zoning and no cross-mixing between zones helped minimise cross-interaction and managed the COVID-19 transmission risks.




LEVERAGING TRAINING TECHNOLOGIES

The SPF has also been leveraging modern training technologies, such as the Mobile Taser Training Target (MTTT) and Live Instrumentation Training System (LITS) to improve training safety and ensure operational readiness.

Mobile Taser Training Target (MTTT)

The Mobile Taser Training Target (MTTT) aims to replace the conventional role played by a "manin-suit" with a remote-controlled robot for taser scenario-based training (SBT). The trainer can direct the robot's movements and project audio, simulating an aggressor's engagement with an officer. This reduces the risk of injury during SBT and also reduces physical contact during training in alignment with COVID-19 pandemic measures. Using computer vision technology, the landing points of taser probes on the training target are collected and evaluated, along with other critical data points. This allows timely and precise feedback to refine officers' skills in deploying the taser effectively and confidently.





Live Instrumentation Training System

The Live Instrumentation Training System (LITS) uses a laser engagement system that emits lasers from transmitters on small arms and captures laser hit events using detectors which are either worn or placed within a room. LITS also utilises a robotic targeting system with shoot-back capabilities. These features, coupled with an analytics system, record and consolidate the results of the simulated firefight for analysis. This allows officers to receive detailed feedback to validate, sharpen and hone their tactical skills.

DEVELOPING OPERATIONAL CAPABILITIES

LEGISLATIVE AMENDMENTS

Amendments to the Police Force Act (PFA) were passed in Parliament in August 2021 to enhance the SPF's operational capabilities and readiness. Amongst various changes, the amended PFA increased penalties for motorists who evaded roadblocks and covered more modes of roadblock evasion, apart from physical dash-through, to ensure deterrence against such offences remained effective. Police officers were

also provided with powers to enter any place in case of a medical emergency, to protect persons from injury or death.

UPSKILLING OUR OFFICERS

The SPF continued to train and equip its officers to ensure their readiness to respond to potential armed attacks. The rollout of the Glock 19 Gen 5 pistol to the SPF's frontline officers continued in 2021 as more officers were trained in the new firearm, thereby enhancing the SPF's firepower to engage armed attackers.

Since its operationalisation in 2019, In-situ Reaction Teams (IRT) from Land Divisions have continued to be progressively deployed at high footfall and iconic locations to enhance the Police's response to potential terror attacks. These officers have undergone tactical training and are equipped with higher firepower to allow them to respond effectively to potential terror attacks. 2021 saw the operationalisation of IRT in Bedok Division, following its operationalisation in Central and Tanglin Divisions in 2019.

AERIAL RESPONSE TEAM (ART)

With the increasing use of Unmanned Aerial Vehicles (UAVs), more commonly known as drones, to support police operations, the SPF operationalised its Aerial Response Team (ART) in 2021. This team comprises trained and certified drone pilots who provide aerial support for a range of policing operations. Drones have been deployed to support the SPF in enforcement operations, crowd management and public safety operations, search and rescue operations as well as aerial patrols. More drone pilots will be trained in 2022 as part of a progressive build-up of the SPF ART.

ENHANCING SPF'S CAMERA NETWORK

In 2021, the SPF continued to expand its cameras and sensors network across the island to boost crime-fighting and enhance sensemaking capabilities. These included areas



such as transport nodes, airport terminals and expressways. As of December 2021, footage from police cameras had assisted in solving more than 6,000 cases since installation began in 2012. More than 200,000 police cameras will be installed islandwide by 2030 to further bolster the SPF's camera network to deter and detect crime.

MAKING SINGAPORE THE SAFEST PLACE IN THE WORLD

Despite the challenges presented by the pandemic or an ever-evolving operational landscape, the SPF will continue to ensure high levels of operational excellence, readiness and development, and remain focused on keeping Singapore one of the safest places in the world.

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MAINTAINING **OPERATIONAL EXCELLENCE THROUGH INVESTIGATION AND** INTELLIGENCE

Despite the challenges brought on by the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic in 2021, the investigation and intelligence communities of the Singapore Police Force (SPF) continued to deliver on their mission to fight crime and keep Singapore safe and secure.

There were 250 days that were free from snatch theft, robbery and housebreaking, an improvement of 48 days compared to 202 crime-free days in 2020. Theft, housebreaking, and related crimes saw a record 37-year low in reported crime figures, and the Special Investigation Section of the Criminal Investigation **Department (CID) maintained its 100%** crime-solving record for murder cases.

However, scams accounted for the increase in the total number of reported crimes, making up 51.8% of Overall Crime in 2021. The number of reported scam cases increased by 52.9% to 23,931 cases in 2021, from 15,651 cases in 2020. Excluding scams and cybercrimes, the total number of reported crimes in 2021 decreased by 1.0% to 19,303 from 19,498 in 2020.

The investigation and intelligence communities will continue to leverage

improve training, technology, and strengthen collaboration with strategic stakeholders and the community, to improve the SPF's crime-fighting capabilities against evolving crime.




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WORKING AS ONE TO FIGHT CRIME

The Police continued to mount bold and decisive enforcement operations against organised crime syndicates to dismantle their illicit networks and seize illegal proceeds of crime.

In April 2021, more than 180 officers from the CID, supported by the Police Intelligence Department (PID) and Special Operations Command (SOC), conducted an islandwide enforcement operation





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against an illegal remote gambling syndicate involved in illegal lottery and horse betting services. The operation resulted in the arrest of 28 suspects and seizure of more than S\$1.2 million in cash, which is one of the largest cash seizures from police operations against illegal remote gambling.

Enforcement tempo was kept high as regular joint operations were conducted to disrupt the illegal operation of unlicensed moneylending (UML) syndicates. In 2021, officers from the CID and the seven Land Divisions arrested almost 1,100 persons and investigated more than 1,600 persons in a series of anti-UML enforcement operations. The CID and PID also worked together to investigate mobile phone retail shops suspected of providing prepaid SIM cards for misuse by UML and scam syndicates. This combination of upstream and direct intervention measures led to a fall in UML and UML-related harassment cases by 16% to 3,667 cases in 2021 from 4,363 cases in 2020.

The Commercial Affairs Department (CAD), supported by the seven Land Divisions, mounted several enforcement operations to disrupt scam operations of all stripes. Between September and November 2021, the CAD conducted three islandwide anti-scam enforcement operations targeting money mules linked to job scams. The operations resulted in the arrest of more than 130 individuals and the investigation of more than 140 others for selling their bank accounts or relinguishing their Singpass credentials to criminal syndicates to open bank accounts or serve as conduits to receive funds from scam victims. Between March and December 2021, the CAD also arrested almost 50 persons for their roles in facilitating the commission of China Official Impersonation Scams, which included the handling of fake International Criminal Police Organization (INTERPOL) documents and assisting in money remittance.

In the fight against scams, the CAD worked closely with its stakeholders on proactive upstream intervention measures to disrupt scam operations. In 2021, they froze more than 12,600 bank accounts and recovered more than S\$102 million based on reports received from the Anti-Scam Centre (ASC). During the same period, the ASC worked with telecommunication companies and

online marketplaces to terminate more than 3,300 scam-tainted phone lines and 17,300 WhatsApp lines, and removed more than 1,300 suspicious online monikers and advertisements.

The community plays a vital role in fighting scams. A discerning public is the best defence against rapidly evolving scam tactics. Through sense-making and collaboration, the ASC was able to detect many potential victims, alerting them of danger before they would fall prey to scams. One example is Project Awakenings, initiated in December 2021, which crowdsourced information within the Police to identify and engage potential victims of investment scams. The Police leveraged Optical Character Recognition (OCR) technology to capture local handphone numbers of potential victims, and utilised Robotic Process Automation (RPA) for the swift dissemination of targeted advisories to potential victims. As of end December 2021, more than 1,300 potential victims of investment scams had received the advisories. Between May and December 2021, the CAD also leveraged RPA and SG-mail under Project COMBAT, which stands for

FIGHTING TRANSNATIONAL CRIME

To overcome the challenges of investigating and prosecuting overseas crime syndicates operating outside our jurisdiction, the investigation and intelligence communities worked closely with foreign law enforcement agencies, exchanging information and conducting joint operations to bring perpetrators to justice wherever they may be operating from.

In 2021, the SPF's collaboration with fellow law enforcement agencies, the Royal Malaysia Police

(RMP) and Hong Kong Police Force (HKPF), led to the take-down of 16 transnational scam syndicates. More than 230 syndicate members were arrested. These syndicates mainly targeted Singaporeans and were linked to job scams, internet love scams and China Government Official scams.

As job scams emerged as the top scam type in Singapore in 2021, registering 4,554 cases and involving financial losses of almost S\$91 million, the SPF worked with HKPF to arrest 14 core members of a transnational job scam syndicate based in Hong Kong in June 2021 for their suspected involvement in more than 130 cases of job scams involving almost S\$1.56 million. Locally, 23 men and four women were also investigated for their suspected involvement in job scams perpetrated by the transnational



scam syndicate. These collaborative local and joint investigations with our foreign counterparts have helped cast a wider net to bring both overseas criminal syndicates and their local collaborators to justice.

BUILDING CAPABILITIES, STAYING AHEAD OF THE CURVE

As criminals continue to leverage technology and run sophisticated transnational operations to evade detection from law enforcement, it is paramount that the SPF's investigations and intelligence capabilities stay ahead of the curve. Investing in capability-building ensures that our crime-fighting efforts remain effective and efficient.

As part of capability-building, the PID continued exploring new computing technologies and algorithms, harnessing big data to support the SPF in incident management and investigative

follow-up. To enhance sense-making, accelerate investigation follow-ups and crime intervention



efforts, the PID deployed new analytics-based methods to consolidate and harmonise collection and management of disparate and highvolume data from multiple sources, enabling faster link analysis to uncover non-obvious relationships in criminal activities through relational identification. For example, the PID worked with the Financial Investigation Branch of the CID to develop a Tableau dashboard with a rule-based approach analysis of bank statements, facilitating the visualisation and sense-making of voluminous bank transactions. Thereafter, data analytics can unmask the multiple layers of funds transfer created by criminal syndicates to hinder investigations and hence enable effective and efficient financial investigations.

While new systems and data analytics have aided police investigations, enhancing the expertise of investigators and guiding them to manage emerging crime trends systematically still remained important. To better manage the overwhelming workload of scam cases, the CAD rolled out a comprehensive scam investigation manual in August 2021 for Investigation Officers (IOs) dealing with scams. The manual plays an important role in maintaining the quality of investigations by building up the investigative capabilities of IOs.

Collaborating with other law enforcement agencies also enhanced the SPF's capabilities to tackle transnational crime. The CAD collaborated with INTERPOL on a capacity-building project to establish stronger collaboration and increase operational capacity to combat illicit financial flows derived from transnational financial crimes in the Association of Southeast Asian Nations (ASEAN) region. In December 2021, more than 40 participants from 15 countries participated in a virtual workshop, sharing best practices in dealing with transnational financial crimes as well as exchanging views and knowledge on antiscam models and public-private partnerships. Such initiatives strengthen regional cooperation and allow the SPF to glean best practices from other law enforcement counterparts.

ENHANCING TRAINING, DEVELOPING **OFFICERS**

Training remains fundamental in equipping the SPF officers with the necessary skills, expertise, and knowledge to handle new and emerging crime.

Amidst the COVID-19 pandemic, the Home Team School of Criminal Investigation (HTSCI) developed more e-learning materials and promoted online learning to facilitate continual training for officers. In the area of emerging crime and data analytics, the HTSCI engaged the United States of America Immigration and Customs Enforcement to conduct a webinar on "Cryptocurrency Investigations" in April 2021. In June 2021, the HTSCI collaborated with the Cybersecurity Strategic Technology Centre at ST Engineering to deliver a talk on "Deepfake and its Impact to Trust". In August 2021, the HTSCI also conducted a workshop on "Data Analytics for Crime Investigation", which looked at identifying data-driven fraud and conducting forensic data analytics.

The intelligence community also challenged officers to build up their coding and data analytics capabilities. On 25 May 2021, the PID organised the "Coding Challenge", where coding enthusiasts from different SPF departments developed innovative use of analytics whilst applying coding to solve everyday data scenarios. Beyond sharing experience, the PID has also been working with the Home Team Science and Technology Agency to help units identify analytics use cases and develop inhouse analytics solutions. They also have been making learning more accessible by offering online learning accounts and training slots and facilitating the use of analytics tools within SPF units and other Home Team agencies.

SUSTAINING OPERATIONAL EXCELLENCE

The investigation and intelligence communities are critical pillars of the SPF, collaborating closely together to tackle crime and keep Singapore safe and secure. Cognisant of the need to stay ahead of criminals in the cat-and-mouse game.







MAINTAINING AN ENGAGED AND RESILIENT WORKFORCE

The COVID-19 pandemic continued to impose operational and resource challenges for the Singapore Police Force (SPF) this past year. As challenging as it was, the SPF remained steadfast in its mission and worked tirelessly to ensure the safety of our officers, keeping them engaged, appreciating their contributions, and maintaining our momentum of attracting new talent.

ENSURING THE SAFETY OF OUR **OFFICERS**

COVID-19 VACCINATION

Vaccination against COVID-19 has been a central tenet of the nation's overall public health strategy to protect the community and enable safe reopening and resumption of activities in Singapore. The vaccination of frontline workers, including SPF officers who face the risk of exposure to COVID-19 in the course of their duties, was thus a key priority in the early days of 2021, when vaccines first became available in Singapore.

In January 2021, the SPF started its COVID-19 vaccination exercise for officers across multiple vaccination centres. More than 3,000 SPF officers received their first vaccine dose within a week of its commencement.







ATTRACTING TALENTS DURING THE PANDEMIC

While the COVID-19 pandemic has resulted in the suspension of many physical events such as traditional career fairs, the SPF swiftly adapted and leveraged technology in its talent attraction initiatives.

In 2021, the SPF organised and participated in over 50 virtual career fairs and events for students from polytechnics, junior colleges and universities. To maintain the 'in-person' engagement experience, many of these events were conducted over video conferencing platforms, allowing participants to engage SPF officers and learn more about policing as a career, as well as the various SPF scholarships and sponsorships available.

In April 2021, the SPF also launched the @spfrecruitment Instagram account, providing an additional digital touchpoint for interaction with potential applicants who may be interested in a career with us.

OUR POLICE NATIONAL SERVICEMEN

KEEPING SCAMS AT BAY

In addition to the health threat from the COVID-19 pandemic, the corresponding accelerated digitalisation and greater reliance on online services have allowed criminals to exploit the public's fear and develop new scam ruses to target potential victims.

To enhance our fight against scams, Police National Servicemen (PNSmen) were deployed to scam hotspots such as Automated Teller Machines and AXS machines to engage members of the public and raise awareness of the various scams.

Adapting to the pandemic, Full-time Police National Service (PNSF) Community Engagement (CE) officers continued their community engagement and crime prevention education efforts through virtual activities and training sessions for stakeholders such as the Citizens on Patrol volunteers and pre-schoolers. They also conducted anti-scam webinars, educating members of the public on how to spot the signs of common scams and reminding them to be vigilant.





With the support of their families and loved ones, the PNSF officers and PNSmen, working alongside their regular counterparts, have greatly supported and contributed to the SPF's crime-fighting efforts to keep Singapore safe and secure.

BUDDY FIT PROGRAMME

With the introduction of the NS Fitness Improvement Training (FIT) programme for NSmen, the SPF has also revamped its Buddy Individual Physical Proficiency Test (IPPT) Preparatory Training (IPT) programme, now known as the Buddy FIT programme.

Under the Buddy FIT programme, PNSmen are encouraged to take part in fitness improvement training with their buddies at more than 50 locations such as stadiums, parks and fitness corners across



the island. To increase the engagement of NS leadership members with their PNSmen, the Buddy FIT training session has been led by either a NS Key Appointment Holder (KAH) or Responsibility Appointment Holder (RAH), wherever possible. The revamped training programme not only provided PNSmen with greater ownership and motivation to improve their personal fitness, but also has ensured their operational readiness.

OUR VOLUNTEERS

In 2021, the Volunteer Special Constabulary (VSC) celebrated its 75th Anniversary through a series of commemorative activities, including a virtual Observance Ceremony and the VSC75 Virtual Run. Despite unprecedented challenges brought on by the COVID-19 pandemic, the VSC family held together, providing their unwavering support for the SPF during this trying period.

VSC 75TH ANNIVERSARY OBSERVANCE CEREMONY

The virtual VSC75 Observance Ceremony was held on 23 October 2021 to commemorate this significant milestone and to recognise the contributions of all serving and retired VSC officers to the SPF and the nation.

Deputy Commissioner of Police (Policy) (DCP) Jerry See, was the Guest of Honour at the event, which was attended by the VSC Leadership Group, VSC and VSC (Community) officers from 16 VSC units, as well as Honorary VSC (Specialist) and Honorary VSC (School) officers. Another 360 officers joined in online for the virtual ceremony as well.

VSC 75TH VIRTUAL RUN

The VSC75 Virtual Run (75km) was held as part of the VSC's 75th Anniversary Celebrations. The event was organised by Jurong Division's VSC unit and lasted for 7.5 weeks from 12 August 2021 till 1 October 2021. The event was flagged off with a video address on 12 August 2021 by Commander VSC, Assistant Commissioner of Police (AC) Shng Yunn Chinn.

A total of 641 officers from the VSC, VSC (Community) and Honorary VSC schemes signed up for the Solo 75km Run and the Team 75km Run. The virtual run saw VSC officers cover a total of 67,653.69km. A virtual presentation ceremony was held on 16 December 2021 with Commander VSC presenting the awards to the proud recipients.

READY FOR THE FUTURE

The SPF's operating landscape will continue to evolve, posing new challenges for our Regular, NS and Volunteer officers. We firmly believe that our people are our most valued assets, and will remain steadfast in our commitment to invest in our people and strive to remain an employer of choice. The SPF will also spare no effort in building a future-ready workforce that can keep Singapore safe and secure.

BUILDING AND STRENGTHENING **TRUST WITH THE** COMMUNITY

Community partnership is one of the key pillars of the Singapore Police Force's (SPF) policing strategy and it forms the core of the SPF's vision for its Community Engagement Masterplan - "The Community: An Enabled Police Partner".

To build and retain trust with the community, the SPF has put in place long-term plans such as focusing our community engagement strategies on non-geographical and interest-based engagements, as well as placing stronger emphasis on online engagement to complement physical engagement.

The SPF aims to reach out to every resident so as to increase the community's awareness of what the Police do and how the community can play a part in the safety and security of **Singapore. Through the various volunteer** schemes that cater to different levels of commitment, the SPF hopes to enlarge our volunteer pool so that more members of the community can join us as a Police partner and fight crime alongside the SPF to keep Singapore safe and secure.

THE COMMUNITY: AN ENABLED POLICE PARTNER

The SPF's Community Engagement Masterplan supports the SPF's Mission and Vision and aims to achieve the desired outcome, "Every Resident is a Partner in Policing".

The ongoing COVID-19 pandemic continues to drive digitalisation - communities are now less geographically bound, with more interest groups emerging and engaging online. Apart from targeting the various physical domains such as neighbourhoods, schools and workplaces, the SPF has also increased online engagements to expand its reach to non-geographical and interestbased communities.

NON-GEOGRAPHICAL AND INTEREST-BASED APPROACH

With the launch of the Community Watch Scheme (CWS) in December 2021, the CWS, which was jointly developed by the SPF and the National Crime Prevention Council (NCPC), builds on the success of existing watch groups such as the Neighbourhood Watch Zones (NWZs), Vehicles on Watch (VOW) and Riders on Watch (ROW), to further strengthen partnerships with the community. The CWS integrated the various watch groups under one scheme. Compared to previous community-based schemes, the CWS moved from

the traditional geography-bounded approach to an interest-based approach and aimed to build on the wave of active citizenry and spirit of volunteerism amongst members of the community to create a vigilant and informed community, with a heightened sense of ownership in safety and security.

The CWS is organised around five broad categories that cover most of our daily activities, namely Home, Work/Learning, Transport, Lifestyle and Cyber, with interest groups created under each category. The CWS is a broad-based, entry-level scheme with low barriers to entry. The scheme requires minimal commitment and allows flexible involvement in the activities. The CWS members can sign up for any interest groups to receive alerts and crime information in their particular areas of interest as well as receive opportunities to participate in ongoing activities, training and workshops to help them play an active role in keeping their loved ones and the community safe.

STRONGER EMPHASIS ON ONLINE **ENGAGEMENTS**

ONLINE iSSWG

The Industry Safety and Security Watch Group (iSSWG) framework was formed in 2008 to provide a platform for the Home Team and our industry

stakeholders to work together to address industryspecific safety and security concerns, as well as to co-create effective measures to counter the threat of crime and terrorism. As of 2021, there were seven iSSWGs, comprising members from the Chemical, Manufacturing, Hotel, Retail, Financial and Public Entertainment industries including the latest member, the Asia Internet Coalition (AIC), with which, formed the Online iSSWG.

Launched on 6 January 2021, the formation of the Online iSSWG helped to address growing concerns over online crimes and the expansion in reach and influence of terrorism and radicalisation via online channels. As the population becomes



more tech-savvy, digital platforms offer new means to spread extremist propaganda more widely, potentially leading to serious consequences in the real world. The launch of the Online iSSWG formalised the partnership between the SPF and the AIC to create a safer and more secure online community for all users.

MATA-BYTES WITH COMMANDING OFFICER

The SPF is also constantly looking out for opportunities to partner with commercial organisations to further crime prevention efforts. Riding on the popularity of online shopping, Punggol NPC invited Lazada to one of its 'Facebook Live' sessions, known as "Mata-Bytes with Commanding Officer", to educate participants on spotting the tell-tale signs of scam accounts while shopping online.

'HELLO, POLICE?' AND 'JUSTICE IS DONE'

To enhance the community's understanding of Police work, the SPF rolled out two seasons of 'Hello, Police?' and an investigation-centric webseries titled 'Justice is Done' on its social media platforms. These in-house productions not only showcased the professionalism and capabilities of the SPF, but also informed the community on trending topics related to the Police.

ENGAGING OUR YOUTHS

POLICE PAL

On 23 December 2021, 'Police Pal', the SPF's flagship engagement programme for primary school students was launched to educate the younger generation on crime prevention, as well as the roles and responsibilities of the Police through specially developed activity booklets with interesting and interactive activities.

'Police Pal' is a programme under the SPF's Youth Engagement Framework and was developed from the Young Police Buddy initiative that was launched by Bedok Division back in 2019. The SPF worked closely with the Ministry of Education's Character and Citizenship Education Branch to ensure that the programme's content is relevant, and the materials are attractive and engaging for

the primary school students. Since its launch in December 2021, the 'Police Pal' programme has been rolled out to more than 119,000 students from 124 primary schools.

VIRTUAL YOUTH CARNIVAL 2021

To educate our youths to stay vigilant against scams, the virtual Youth Carnival 2021 was launched on 5 December 2021 and livestreamed on SPF's social media platforms. The online event was organised by Bedok Division, in partnership with NCPC and Fei Yue Community Services.

Speakers from NCPC and Fei Yue Community Services shared topics on crime prevention and mental wellness respectively while the SPF Band engaged the audience through music and dance performances. Participating youths in the 'Youth Got Talent' competition also performed virtually.



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DELTA LEAGUE

The Delta League series capped off another successful year with its Grand Finals culminating at the Singapore Sports Hub on 23 December 2021. Throughout the December school holidays, a total of 128 teams, comprising of more than 700 youths aged between 13 to 17, pitted their wits and skills against each other in 'Mobile Legends Bang Bang', a popular computer game, via a fiveversus-five game format.

The event was conducted in a hybrid mode, and livestreamed on social media platforms. The youths also attended various online activities such as e-Coaching clinics, an online Youth Community Day and a Youth e-Workshop. The youths also participated in the Anti-Scam Meme Design Competition, which saw many creative submissions.

RECOGNISING OUR PARTNERS

Everyone has a role to play in keeping Singapore safe and secure, and the SPF recognises the contributions and efforts of our Full-time Police


National Service (PNSF) officers, Operationally Ready Police National Servicemen (PNSmen), volunteers and community partners in safeguarding Singapore.

ROLES OF PNSF OFFICERS AND PNSMEN IN COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

Since 2016, PNSF officers and PNSmen have been involved in frontline operational roles through community engagement work. These PNS Community Engagement (CE) officers are deployed at exhibitions and in schools to engage the public and youths on crime prevention. They also conduct house visits, raise awareness of the SGSecure movement, distribute advisories on how to respond to terror-related incidents, and encourage members of the public to participate in the annual Emergency Preparedness Day. As at end 2021, there are about 100 PNSF officers and over 1,000 PNSmen who are trained and deployed as CE Officers.

CONTINUED SUPPORT FROM SPF VOLUNTEERS

The SPF is supported by a strong force of about 10,000 volunteers from all walks of life. These



volunteers come from the various volunteer schemes, namely the Volunteer Special Constabulary, which also includes the Volunteer Special Constabulary (Community), Honorary Volunteer Special Constabulary (School) and Honorary Volunteer Special Constabulary (Specialist) vocations, as well as the Citizens on Patrol scheme, Victim Care Cadre Programme, Crime Prevention Ambassador scheme and the National Police Cadet Corps.

These volunteers work alongside their regular counterparts from the SPF to carry out a myriad of duties, such as physical patrols to enhance ground presence in order to prevent, deter and detect crimes; providing counselling to victims of crimes; and advocating crime prevention during community events, roadshows and in schools. They take time out of their family and

work schedules to contribute towards keeping Singapore safe and secure always.

HOTEL SECURITY AWARDS AND NATIONAL SSWG AWARDS CEREMONY

To recognise the efforts of Singapore hotels in upkeeping safety and security standards, the SPF partnered with the Singapore Hotel Association (SHA) and NCPC to organise the annual Hotel Security Awards and Conference 2021 on 28 October 2021. At the virtual event, a total of 224 hotel employees were awarded Certificates of Commendation for their exemplary acts of honesty, bravery, and vigilance. Of these, 20 of them were awarded Special Mention for their public-spirited acts. Participants of the conference also learnt how to strengthen workplace vigilance against terrorism and crime and had an opportunity to share their perspectives and exchange ideas.

Together, the SPF will strive towards making the community our Enabled Police Partner.




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GROUND RESPONSE FORCE OFFICERS RESPONDING TO A '999' CALL



SINGAPORE CRIME SITUATION


FOR JANUARY - DECEMBER 2021¹

The Overall Crime Rate² increased concomitantly, with 847 cases per 100,000 population in 2021, compared to 656 cases per 100,000 population in 2020. Excluding scams and cybercrimes, the total number of reported crimes in 2021 decreased by 1.0% to 19,303 from 19,498 in 2020. A total of 17,774 persons were arrested for Overall Crime in 2021, an increase of 17.9% from the preceding year.



There was a decrease in physical crimes in 2021. 250 days were free from three confrontational crimes, namely snatch theft, robbery and housebreaking, an improvement of 48 days compared to 202 crimefree days in 2020.

Of note, two out of the six crime classes³ that made up the Overall Crime in 2021 decreased significantly compared to 2020. Theft and related crimes decreased by 8.0% to 6.843 cases in 2021, from 7.437 cases in 2020. Housebreaking and related crimes decreased by 23.8% to 160 cases in 2021, from 210 cases in 2020. Both these crime classes recorded a 37-year low.

Singapore's streets remained safe in 2021, with a decrease in physical crimes. However, a 52.9% increase in scam cases drove up the total number of reported crimes to 46,196 cases, from 37,273 cases in 2020.

SINGAPORE CRIME SITUATION

2021 CRIME CLASSES



- Housebreaking cases decreased by 32.5%, from 163 cases in 2020 to 110 cases in 2021.
- The decrease in housebreaking cases was mainly attributed to fewer break-ins at commercial premises (-33) cases or -50.8%).



- Offences include a variety of thefts such as shop theft, theft in dwelling, theft from motor vehicle, theft of motor vehicle, snatch theft and other thefts.
- Snatch theft registered a record low with 12 cases in 2021.
- Decreases in this crime class were mainly in other thefts (-383 cases or -27.1%), theft in dwelling (-182 cases or -11.8%), fraudulent possession (-106 cases or -41.6%), theft as a servant (-85 cases or -18.2%) and theft from persons (-49 cases or -36.8%).



- Comprises various offences, including affray, mischief, corrosive and explosive substance and offensive weapons act, vandalism, bomb hoaxes and bringing prohibited items into Singapore.
- Larger increases were seen under the Computer Misuse Act (+249 cases or +7.2%) and causing hurt by acts which endanger human life (+163 cases or +13.7%).

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CRIMES AGAINST PERSONS

- Refers to crimes where the victim is an individual and suffers bodily harm as a result of the crime.
- Two sexual offences under this crime class registered increases, they were voyeurism (+73 cases or +18.5%) and outrage of modesty (+159 cases or +12.0%).



COMMERCIAL CRIMES

- · Comprises mainly cheating and related offences.
- The more significant scam types in 2021 were job scams, non banking-related phishing scams, e-commerce scams, investment scams, loan scams and banking-related phishing scams.
- Job scam cases increased by 4,422 cases (+3,350.0%), from 132 cases in 2020 to 4,554 cases in 2021.
- Non banking-related phishing scam cases increased by 2,139 cases (+332.1%), from 644 cases in 2020 to 2,783 cases in 2021.
- Investment scam cases increased by 1,380 cases (+125.9%), from 1,096 cases in 2020 to 2,476 cases in 2021.
- Loan scam cases increased by 296 cases (+15.0%), from 1,978 cases in 2020 to 2,274 cases in 2021.
- Banking-related phishing scam cases increased by 897 cases (+66.9%), from 1,340 cases in 2020 to 2,237 cases in 2021.



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VIOLENT/SERIOUS **PROPERTY CRIMES**

Comprises mainly robbery and extortion cases.

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- Attempted extortion and extortion cases increased by 62.7%, from 271 cases in 2020 to 441 cases in 2021, with the rise largely attributed to an increase in cyber extortion cases.
- Robbery cases decreased by 17.6%, from 34 cases in 2020 to 28 cases in 2021.

2021 AREAS OF INTEREST



• A total of 2,514 youths were arrested in 2021 compared to 2,422 in 2020, an increase of 92 persons. Youth offenders accounted for 14.1% of total persons arrested in 2021, compared to 16.1% in 2020. Youth arrests are over-represented in terms of the proportion of youth population in Singapore⁵. The most common offences that youths were arrested for were cheating and related offences, shop theft and sexual penetration.



- Outrage of modesty (OM) cases increased by 159 cases (+12.0%) from 1,321 cases in 2020 to 1,480 cases in 2021.
- The increase in OM cases in 2021 was partly due to fewer cases recorded in 2020 during the Circuit Breaker period.
- Of the 1,480 OM cases in 2021, 918 cases involved culprits known to the victim.

• Cases occurring within the public transport system, including at public transportation nodes and on public transport, remained a concern. There were 148 OM cases in 2021 involving culprits unknown to the victims and which occurred on the public transport system, compared to 145 the previous year.

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• A total of 4,157 foreigners were arrested in 2021 compared to 3,098 foreigners in 2020 (+1,059 persons or offences, theft as a servant, and affray.



CYBER EXTORTION

- Cyber extortion cases increased by 175 cases (+71.4%) from 245 cases in 2020 to 420 cases in 2021.
- In these cases, criminals typically befriended victims online and subsequently coaxed them into performing compromising or indecent acts in front of a camera. Thereafter, the criminals would use the video footage or images to extort money or online credits from these victims.

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- E-commerce scam cases decreased by 652 cases (-19.4%), from 3,359 cases in 2020 to 2,707 cases in 2021.
- Most of the cases involved victims who were cheated while buying or selling goods/services online. The victims either failed to receive the goods they paid for or the payment for the goods they have shipped out.



- Loan scam cases increased by 296 cases (+15.0%), from 1.978 cases in 2020 to 2.274 cases in 2021.
- In majority of these cases, victims were instructed to pay a deposit before they could receive their loan. Victims received these fraudulent loan offers via various means, the most common being SMS, WhatsApp, Facebook advertisements, or when sourcing for loans on the Internet/online search engines.



- Banking-related phishing scam cases increased by 897 cases (+66.9%), from 1,340 cases in 2020 to 2,237 cases in 2021.
- In majority of these cases, victims were tricked into disclosing Internet banking usernames, Personal Identification Numbers (PIN) and OTPs to scammers posing as bank staff or government officials. Scammers also sent unsolicited SMSes claiming that there were issues with the victims' banking account, and the victims were asked to click on a link embedded in the text message to resolve the issue. Subsequently, victims found unauthorised transactions performed on their bank accounts.



INVESTMENT SCAMS

- Investment scam cases increased by 1,380 cases (+125.9%), from 1,096 cases in 2020 to 2,476 cases in 2021.
- Such scams involved getting individuals to part with their money on the promise of a guestionable financial opportunity.



- 2.783 cases in 2021.
- In the majority of these cases, the culprits used ruses such as checks on the delivery status of a parcel or refunds debit cards.



- Job scam cases increased by 4,422 cases (+3,350.0%), from 132 cases in 2020 to 4,554 cases in 2021.
- social media reactions, pretending to purchase items). They were told to "purchase" various items using their own money, before receiving reimbursements plus commissions after completing a certain number of transactions. In some cases, victims were told to transfer funds to join tiered memberships to receive tiered commissions for their "tasks". Eventually, victims realised that they were unable to withdraw their funds.

CONCLUSION

Singapore remains a safe place to live and work, but this should not be taken for granted. In addition to the Police's tough enforcement efforts, the SPF will continue to invest in public education and community engagement initiatives as part of our overall strategy to combat crime.

Criminals, including scammers, remain an ever-present threat to public safety and security. The COVID-19 situation creates opportunities for them to exploit the public's fear and sense of uncertainty, and lead to the development of new ruses to prey on potential victims.

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


With the resumption of more activities, the number of road traffic accidents rose in 2021 as compared to 2020. However, it is still lower than the pre COVID-19 period.

While the number of traffic accidents involving elderly pedestrians² decreased in 2021, elderly pedestrians, as well as motorcyclists, remain groups of concern today, as they continued to account for a disproportionate number of traffic accidents resulting in injuries or death.



INCREASE IN FATAL TRAFFIC ACCIDENTS AND FATALITIES

The number of fatal accidents **increased by 25%**, from **80 cases** in 2020 to **100 cases** in 2021. The number of fatalities **increased by 28.9%**, from **83 persons** in 2020 to **107 persons** in 2021.



INCREASE IN NUMBER OF ACCIDENTS RESULTING IN INJURIES AND NUMBER OF INJURED PERSONS

The number of accidents resulting in injuries increased by 7.9%, from 5.476 cases in 2020 to 5.909 cases in 2021. The number of injured persons also increased by 7.7%, from 6,669 persons in 2020 to 7,184 persons in 2021.



INCREASE IN ROAD TRAFFIC FATALITY RATE

The road traffic fatality rate per 100,000 population increased from 1.46 in 2020 to 1.96 in 2021.




Figure 3: Road Traffic Fatality Rate Per 100,000 Population (2012 to 2021)



As part of the Singapore Road Safety Month 2021 campaign from 28 May 2021 to 28 June 2021, COVID-19 care packs with road safety collaterals were given out to motorists who were spotted displaying safe driving behaviour or performing a courteous act on the roads.

TRAFFIC POLICE'S THREE-PRONGED THROUGH EDUCATION. APPROACH ENGAGEMENT AND ENFORCEMENT

In 2021, Traffic Police, together with stakeholders and partners, organised road safety initiatives targeted at different road user groups across different age groups to educate, engage and remind them about the importance of road safety. Some of these initiatives include the "Singapore

Road Safety Month" in May 2021, the "Road Safety Event for Seniors" in July 2021, the "Use Your RoadSense" Virtual Show and "Singapore Ride Safe Campaign" in October 2021, as well as, the "Shell Traffic Games" and "Anti-Drink Drive Campaign" in December 2021.



The Road Safety for Seniors 2021 campaign is a collaboration between the Singapore Road Safety Council, TP, and Lions Befrienders. As part of the campaign, an online road safety programme was held for 33 seniors of the Lions Befrienders across nine Senior Activity Centres in July 2021. Road Safety banners were also put up at strategic locations to remind seniors to cross the road safely by using pedestrian crossings.





Anti-Drink Drive Campaign 2021 video in December 2021 - "What really happens when you are caught for drink driving?" This was produced as part of the campaign and published on Facebook.

«The TP and Singapore Road Safety Council (SRSC), with support from the Land Transport Authority (LTA), launched the Singapore Ride Safe Campaign 2021 on 29 October 2021 The campaign tagline, "Gear Up, Ride Safe", reminded motorcyclists to don protective riding gear such as approved helmets, riding jackets, gloves and boots. In addition to a road safety video, lamp post banners such as these were produced and hung at accident-prone locations to increase outreach efforts.



On top of education and engagement efforts, TP conducted 49 joint enforcement operations with the Land Transport Authority (LTA) and National Environmental Agency (NEA) targeting offences such as speeding and illegal modifications. More than 1,000 offences were recorded from these operations.

JOINT COLLABORATION WITH MINISTRY OF EDUCATION FOR NEW ONLINE **PROGRAMME — "THE ROAD SAFETY CHALLENGE!**"

In 2022, TP will work with the Ministry of Education to develop an online road safety programme ----"The Road Safety Challenge!". This programme is aimed at Primary Three to Six students and will be rolled out in the second half of 2022.

This interactive learning resource will educate these students on basic road safety rules and impart good road safety habits through storytelling, animated scenarios, and interactive guizzes.

"The Road Safety Challenge!" adds variety to the current suite of outreach programmes involving school children at the Road Safety Community Park and road safety talks. Interested members of the public will be able to attempt the online programme via the TP Online Learning Portal on the Singapore Police Force's website

ROAD SAFETY IS A SHARED RESPONSIBILITY

TP will continue its three-pronged approach of Education, Engagement and Enforcement to safeguard Singapore's roads. As road safety is a shared responsibility, all road users are reminded to continue practising good road safety habits and play their part in making Singapore's roads safe.




In 2021, 70,548 urgent incidents were reported by the public. Out of these, 64,953 or 92.1% of urgent incidents in 2021 were attended to within 15 minutes by patrol resources.

JANUARY - DECEMBER 2021

In 2021, the total number of feedback received by the Singapore Police Force (SPF) from members of the public was 170,221, a decrease from 190,565 in 2020. The SPF values feedback from the public as they provide valuable insights for our continuous improvement. The SPF consistently reviews our customer experience and strives to ensure that our services meet evolving public needs.

Most of the feedback had been received via emails and they were broadly classified under seven categories - Complaints, Compliments, Suggestions, Enquiries, Requests, Appeals and Others.



PLEDGE TO ANSWER '999' CALLS WITHIN **10 SECONDS AT LEAST** 90% OF THE TIME



In 2021, a total of 1,157,399 '999' calls were received by the Police Operations Command Centre (POCC). Out of these, 1,094,221 or 94.5% of the calls were answered within 10 seconds.

PLEDGE TO RESPOND TO LETTERS FROM THE PUBLIC

WITHIN **5 WORKING DAYS AT LEAST** 90% OF THE TIME



In 2021, members of the public sent in 16,139 letters. Out of these, 16,123 or **99.9%** of the letters received a response within 5 working days.

In 2021, a total of 67,648 crime cases were reported at the seven Land Divisions, Police Coast Guard, Criminal Investigation **Department and Commercial Affairs** Department. Out of these, 67,648 or 100% victims of crime were informed of the preliminary status of their cases within 7 working days.



Figure 1 – Total number of feedback received in 2020 and 2021, with a decrease of 10.7%


Figure 2 – Breakdown of total feedback received for 2021

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The SPF received 54,050 compliments in 2021, a decrease (-23.3%) compared to 70,450 received in 2020. The decrease can be attributed to the significant decrease (-48.7%) in the number of walk-in customers at SPF service counters due to the cessation of Change of Address (COA) services at our service counters with effect from 1 December 2020, following the introduction of the online COA service by the Immigration and Checkpoints Authority.

The public were also able to provide their feedback and rate their service experiences through the Integrated Queue Management System (IQMS) 'Smiley Faces' rating system at our Neighbourhood Police Centres' (NPC) service counters. In 2021, 96% of the customers who had provided their feedback through the IQMS rated the services rendered as 'Very Satisfied' and 'Excellent'.



The SPF received 3,359 requests from the public in 2021, a decrease (-5.2%) compared to 3,543 received in 2020. The majority of these requests were for updates on the investigation progress for police reports lodged and for more frequent police patrols in the neighbourhood.



The SPF received 372 suggestions from the public in 2021, a decrease (-7.2%) compared to 401 received in **2020**. Most of these suggestions were on crime prevention measures, as well as on traffic-related issues such as enforcement against errant motorists.

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
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

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
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The SPF received 34,787 appeals from the public in 2021, a decrease (-25.5%) compared to 46,711 received in 2020. Appeals against traffic summons remained the bulk of the appeals received by the SPF. Other appeals included appeals for the SPF to initiate or expedite police investigations, as well as appealing for a lighter sentence or for charges to be dropped in police investigations.

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
